THE VIRGINIA SCHOOLS.—The reports made to the Governor by the Superintendent of Public Education, and by the various Boards having charge of the educational interests of the State, all show a degree of activity in education, which, amid the adverse surroundings of the State, is as surprising as it is gratifying.

The Board of Visitors of the University of Virginia report 333 matriculations during the year, over one half of these students coming from outside of the State. A distinguished English divine, who within a few years past made a visit to the University of Virginia with a view to examine its organization and practical operations, expressed the opinion that the English universities of Oxford and Cambridge might learn some useful lessons by studying its structure. The report, in speaking of the free education to Virginia students over eighteen years of age, says:

"At the last session of the General Assembly an act was passed making an addition of \$15,000 to the annuity of the University, upon the condition that it would receive into all its schools, except the professional, free of charge for tuition, all Virginia students who had attained the age of eighteen years, and had made such proficiency in their studies as would enable them to profit by the course of instruction afforded by the University."

"The partial experiment which has been made tends to prove that the decision of the visitors was wisely adopted. A sufficient time has not yet elapsed for a full test of the practical operations of the law of last winter, but as far as the faculty have been enabled to judge they are unanimously of opinion that it will be productive of beneficial results."

During the year a generous donor, residing in Rochester, N. Y., who refuses to allow his name to be disclosed, gave the University some \$60,000 to be applied to the purchase of a cabinet of mineralogy, geology, zoology, and to the erection of a suitable building for the reception and display of the cabinet. The visitors without delay contracted for the erection of the building, and considerable progress has been made in the work. Under the terms of the contract it is to be under roof by the 1st of January, and completed by the 10th of May, 1877. It is known that, in consequence of the impoverished condition of the Commonwealth, adequate provision has not been made for the increase of the library of the University. It is therefore deficient in many of the valuable contributions to science and literature which have been published since 1860. Mr. W. W. Corcoran, of Washington, a gentleman whose many noble benefactions to public objects have made his name almost the synonym of enlightened generosity and benevolence, by a letter addressed to the rector a few weeks ago, tendered to the University a donation of \$5,000, payable in five equal annual installments, to be applied to the enlargement of the library. A letter from the University to a citizen of Lynchburg states that Mr. Corcoran has presented, through Hon. A. H. H. Stuart, rector, the sum of \$50,000 to the University, in addition to the five thousand recently given by him to the endowment of the schools of history and literature and moral philosophy.

The report of the Board of Visitors of the Virginia Military Institute shows that institution to have total liabilities of all kinds, \$200,104.82, a portion of which is in a funded debt. The committee appointed on finance and reduction of expenses recommended that such steps be taken immediately as will bring the annual expenditures within the annual receipts; and to do this a general reduction of salaries or consolidation of departments is recommended. They also call "attention to the evil of permitting cadets to run up their indebtedness to an amount exceeding the limit positively prescribed by the board at previous sessions," and recommend that the superintendent be authorized to "compromise the amount due on account of ex cadets."

Dr. Kuller's report of the condition of the public schools gives the following:
"Percentage of school population in average daily attendance: White, 76.3, colored, 75.4. Number of teachers: White males, 2,495; white females, 1,489; colored males 418; colored females, 218. Average monthly salaries from all sources: Males, \$34.95; females, \$30.57. Of the school houses, 2,084 are log, 1,824 frame, 136 brick, 51 stone; 1,750 have good furniture, and 1,499 are owned by districts; 333 were built during the year. The value of school property owned by districts is \$521,750. The number of county and city superintendents, 91. Average of county superintendents' salaries from State, \$330, and from counties, \$195. Average of city superintendents' from State, \$245; from State and city, \$118.74."

He regrets that the school fund has not been kept intact and urges that all funds which have gone to the credit of other accounts may be again placed to the credit of the schools. He adds:
"Primary education has entered a higher sphere in Virginia. Well informed persons, even if unsympathetic, admit this with respect to the schools in many of our large towns and cities. Teaching in these schools is a distinct science reduced to successful practice. Altogether the school system was never so prosperous, so well managed, or so strong in public favor as it is to-day."

Dr. H. says: "Our receipts from the Peabody money have diminished from \$38,875 in 1874 to \$19,800 in 1876, and there is reason to apprehend a still further reduction in future years."
The Lunatic and Deaf and Dumb Asylums are reported to be in good condition.
