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THE RICHEST YOUNG MAN IN NEW YORK.
William Waldorf Astor early developed a taste for art and study. When abroad he cultivated sculpture, worked hard under some of the best modern masters, and achieved very considerable success. Had he not been born a millionaire, he would most undoubtedly have made himself a name as a sculptor. He is fond of all athletic sports, is a good boxer, and excels at fencing. While moderately fond of horses, he has of late developed a strong taste for yachting. His yacht, the *Albatross*, was the London Cup in the outside race this fall. Young Astor is, however, more of a man of business than a man of pleasure, and in this respect he is a thorough Astor. He studied law in the office of Lord Day & Lord; was admitted to the bar some two years ago and is still with that firm, which transacts a very considerable portion of the law business arising from and connected with the Astor estate. When in town, young Mr. Astor is very regular to be seen wending his way down to the "office" every day at about 9:30 a. m. Most frequently he stops at the office of the Astor estate, on the north side of Prince street, just west of Broadway, makes a short halt, and then repairs to his own place of business. He is not much of a club man, though belonging to our principal up town clubs. Though not a dancing man, he goes very faithfully into general society during the gay season. This past summer, at Newport, he was much gayer than usual, and drove all the belles out in turn in his dog cart. In appearance, Mr. Astor is tall, slightly built, distinguished looking; in manner, gesture and walk he quite reminds one of the young Prussian officer of the present day—correct in deportment, reserved to a degree, courteous and polite to everybody. In a word, William Waldorf Astor, when compared with the general run of our rich youths, is justly entitled to be considered a model young millionaire. Everything he does is fitting, proper and decorous.—*N. Y. Sun.*

JUDGE BOND.—Col. Donn Platt says, in a letter to the Cincinnati Enquirer: When fortifications were ordered for the better protection of Baltimore Judge Bond impressed the negroes to the service of digging trenches. It is quite easy to arrest negro laborers on their way to or from labor. "Don't do that," said Bond to me; "these free negroes are laboring for themselves; instruct your officers to take only slaves, then the Seceh fellows will suffer." THE BOATMEN'S TROUBLES.—The Cumberland Allegiance gives the following items as to the status of the boatmen on the Chesapeake and Ohio canal:

"For some time past the New Central Company has been paying to outsiders, that is, to boatmen not in its regular line, the handsome sum of 80 cents a ton to Georgetown. Orders are now reported to have been received from headquarters instructing the officials of the company here to pay to boatmen in its regular line only 50 cents a ton. If the men in the regular line refuse to boat for this money, then the plan will be to go out in the highways and headgear and employ whoever will come. The Maryland Company has pursued a very creditable line of policy toward the boatmen this season. Though some companies were taking 'cut' rates as low as 65 cents, yet the Maryland had been steadfastly rigorous in giving its boatmen \$1 a ton to Georgetown. The sheriff is kept busy gobbling up the mules of the boatmen and the equipments of their boats. The bombardment, as the season approaches a close, has commenced all along the line, and the canal supply men and mule dealers are pouring in paper bullets in the shape of executions. This sort of thing has gone on at such a rate that there is now on the canal scarcely one-half the stock with which the season was begun. An instance of the general destitution among the boatmen is shown in the case of one of them the other day, who was compelled to give to the owner of a boat a mule for trippage free."
