**Cremation.**  
The cremation ceremonies at Washington, Pa., are expected to take place to-day, according to previous announcement, and the remains of Baron de Palm have already been forwarded. They have been deposited in a vault in the Lutheran cemetery at Williamsburg, New York, since his death, last May, and would have before this been cremated, at his request, but for the fact that no suitable furnace was ready. That deficiency has now been supplied by Dr. F. Julius de Moyno. The remains were conveyed to Washington by rail, and were enclosed in a rosewood coffin with silver mounts, enclosed in a suitable box. Before being cremated, however, the corpse will be taken out of the coffin and wrapped in folds of white linen cloth, and will then be placed on an iron cradle, made for the purpose, which will be inserted into the furnace. This cradle is so constructed that the ashes of the deceased will be kept separate and can be easily gathered after the furnace cools. Care has been taken to remove all offensive features from the operation. Besides the white cloth to which it will be enveloped, the body will be covered with flowers, and aromatic spices and gums, such as cinnamon, saecia, frankincense and myrrh, will be strewn over it. After the cremation, which it is supposed will occupy about three hours, the ashes will be collected and placed in an antique vase, procured for the purpose from the region of the Upper Nile by Col. O'Leary. This vase is of plain red clay, and has a short neck, with a handle on each side, and in shape is very like those recently found in the excavations at Cyprus. On one side of the vase a brass plate, bearing the name, age and title of the deceased, will be attached. The ashes, which it is thought will weigh about five pounds, will be sprinkled with perfume before being inclosed in the receptacle provided for them, after the manner prescribed by the ancient Greeks and Romans. There will be no services performed over the remains at the crematory, as the executors say it will be simply and solely the act of cremation for the decent disposal of the body, which should have occurred immediately after the services in the Masonic temple of the Theosophical Society, last May, but which were delayed for the season already given.

Col. O'Leary and his fellow executor have carefully secured the statutes and ascertained that no legal difficulties are in the way to prevent cremation, and they have invited representatives of the Board of Health from Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Cincinnati, New Orleans and other cities. It is supposed public discussions in regard to the ceremony as a sanitary measure will be held at Washington, and the whole subject will be reviewed. It is said the idea of cremation is not as much a variety of opinion about it among the members as there is about any other matter. As stated some days ago, this is not the first act of cremation practiced in the United States. In the year 1792 the body of Henry Laurens, the American patriot and statesman, was burned on his plantation in South Carolina, according to the express directions to his son, left by him in his will. They were very explicit and minute, and left the young man no discretion in the matter. Following is the full clause of the will:

are a very imitative people to say the least, and it would not be surprising if, in the course of time, many of our great cemeteries will be furnished with fur cases, as well as vaults, and that those who prefer the speed method of dissolving into ashes will express their preference in ample time to allow their loving friends an opportunity of preserving in a compact form, and in an ornamental vase all of their mortal remains that will be able to withstand the fiery ordeal, to which they will be subjected. After all, shocked as we have been by the Hindu custom, and the dreadful funeral pyre, they only excelled us in the important fact that the surviving partner was compelled to be yielded up as a sacrifice. It is to be hoped that our refinement and intelligence having adopted the process of consuming by fire as rapidly as possible the remains of the dead may out with the advancing strides of civilization ever tempt us to follow the romantic fancy which induced the poor breathers to compel the wife to mount the pile of faggots and refuse to live after a Divine Providence has ordered his removal. It is by no means probable that we will ever arrive at this condition, and yet since cremation, an idea at first so repugnant and terrible, and so directly at variance with our customs has become the fashion, there is no telling what we may do next.—*Wash. Critic.*

Von Palm was a Baron of the holy Roman Empire, and during the earlier part of his career, was a diplomat. He was born at Augsburg, Bavaria, educated at Heidelberg, and entered the diplomatic service as Secretary of Legation at Karlsruhe. He subsequently rose to the rank of ambassador, and at one time he was sent as special envoy to Ferdinand II. King of Naples, by his brother, to negotiate a settlement of family difficulties, including, among other things, the legitimacy of the Prince's son. The Baron traveled very extensively, and it is not surprising that a man so ecclectic as he should find his way to this country and succeed in converting the queerest specimens in it. It was not long after he came to this city that he fell in with Col. H. S. O'Leary, and became much interested in the Theosophical Society, of which Col. O'Leary is the President. The Theosophical Society did the business for him, and when he died in May last he left the society the charge of burning his body.—*N. Y. Herald.*

CINCINNATI, Dec 5.—A dispatch to the Commercial from Washington, Pa., says the body of Baron D. Palm arrived there to-day, accompanied by a delegation numbering about twenty persons, from New York. The remains were taken to once to the cemetery, where the lid of the casket was removed, and the shrunk and dried remains of the late Baron were exposed to a crowd of spectators. The furnace is now to be heated to 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit, and at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning it will receive the body. No services will be performed. During the afternoon and evening addresses will be made in the City Hall by leading scientists. The town is full of strangers, and the hotels are over crowded.
