

LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—War Department, Office of the Chief Signal Officer, Washington, D. C., May 7, 1877.—10:30 a. m.—For the Lower Lakes and Middle Atlantic States, falling barometer, northeast to south east winds, increasing cloudiness, with rain or showers at the western stations, and falling temperature in the former, and stationary or rising in the latter.

St. JOHN'S ACADEMY.—The Academy Journal has the following items:—

Julian Taylor, esq., of the class of '68 has accepted an invitation to deliver the annual address before the Patrick Henry Society, at the commencement, which has been fixed for June 25th. Mr. Taylor made the best record as a student which has ever been made here, about 90 per cent. in his last year, and subsequent took the degree of A. M. at the University of Virginia, a distinction attained by few of its students.

Just as our paper goes to press, we learn that the Boat Seneca, Capt. Castle, has been wrecked for a trip up the canal. Co. A., thirty five or forty strong, will leave for Shepherdstown on Monday, June 4th, arriving there on Wednesday, the 6th, and remaining there until the morning of the 8th, and returning to Alexandria by the night of Saturday, the 9th.

SWIMMING.—Now that the season for swimming is about to commence, the advantage of this accomplishment to boys and young men cannot be too much impressed on parents, and the following, from the Academy Journal, on the subject is commended for their perusal:

Some mothers are very unwise in this matter. They forbid their sons to go into the river, and even when they can have the care of a teacher to keep them out of danger, and thus incur a serious risk of losing them by some unexpected accident. Some years ago a young gentleman of this city was traveling to Texas. The steamer caught fire on the Gulf of Mexico, but being a good swimmer he seized an ear and saved his life by swimming, as Columbus did under similar circumstances. Had he not previously learned to swim he would not be now a useful and respected citizen of Alexandria.

MATRIMONIAL.—The current topic of conversation among the younger portion of the community, this morning, was the marriage last night of a well known King street clerk and the daughter of one of the city officials. The young couple, who it seems have been keeping company for some time past, concluded last night, that they would put an end to the state of suspense, and have a quiet wedding, and themselves. Accordingly, after attending services at one of the churches, they walked to the residence of Rev. Mr. Webb and were quickly bound together in the sacred bonds. They then went quietly home and told the old folks what they had done, and it is to be hoped, secured the forgiveness and benediction which they asked.

THE CHURCHES YESTERDAY.—The churches yesterday morning were not very well attended, notwithstanding the fact that it was Communion Sunday, which usually brings out large numbers. No services were held in Grace Church last night, owing to the indisposition of the pastor. At St. Mary's Church, in the morning, a sermon on the duties of parents to their children was preached by Rev. Father Rochford of Galway, Ireland. At the Communion service, in the M. E. Church, South, at night, Rev. Mr. Hays, the pastor, was assisted by Rev. D. L. Pedoe and Rev. F. M. Mills; the sermon in the morning was preached by Rev. Dr. Bledsoe. The usual services were held in the other churches by the regular pastors.

TRAMMIS.—The tramp nuisance is again becoming very troublesome in this city. Every night the streets are infested with them and in many cases they take possession of outhouses attached to dwellings and have to be forced to vacate. On Saturday night a gentleman residing near the corner of King and St. Asaph streets, discovered one of these vagabonds in an outhouse, and on accosting him, was cursed and threatened with assault if he ventured to disturb him. The rascal was afterwards arrested and sent out of town.

ASTRONOMICAL.—The most interesting event that will occur among the planetary brotherhood during the month of May is the superior conjunction of Venus with the sun. It took place today, when the earth, the sun and Venus were in the same straight line, the sun being in the centre. The planet will no longer be visible in the morning, but passing to the east side of the sun, will reappear as evening star, and during the whole summer will be the most brilliant object in the western sky.

RENWAY.—Mr. Samuel Pullman, while on his way home from market, on Saturday night, was compelled to alight from his wagon some distance from his house in order to open the gate which crosses the road. While he was out the horses became frightened and ran away towards home, leaving Mr. Pullman to make the best of his way on foot. The only damage done was the breaking of the tongue of the wagon by violently coming in contact with the fence.

Uhler. The meeting then adjourned.

SAD AFFLICTION.—Rev. W. C. Webb, the esteemed pastor of the M. E. Church in this city, received, on Saturday, through an English paper, the sad news of the death of his only child, a little girl of three years, which occurred at Capetown Africa, on the 22d of March. Mr. Webb's sister-in-law also died on the same day. He has the sympathy of his many friends here in his sad bereavement.

REGISTRATION.—Registration will commence in the various wards to-morrow morning, and continue three days. At this registration the names of all those who have become disqualified under the lately adopted amendments to the State Constitution will be stricken from the roll.

OCCOQUAN BRIDGE.—The joint commission for Fairfax and Prince William counties met at Occoquan on Friday for the purpose of making arrangements and submitting proposals for building Occoquan bridge.

From Washington.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE GAZETTE.) WASHINGTON, May 7, 1877.

There is much comment here to-day upon the new departure of the President in attempting to carry the army for several months without an appropriation. It is contended that the main reason why the framers of the Constitution placed the support of the army in the hands of the House of Representatives was to prevent it from being improperly used by the Executive. In this view it is said that the attempt to run the army on credit is a most dangerous precedent, and may, some day, in the hands of an unscrupulous man, prove dangerous to the liberties of the people.

REMOVED.—G. H. Butler, the late Consul General at Egypt, whose appointment to a special mail agency a few days since created such general animadversion, was to-day removed from office.

MURDER CASE.—The testimony in the trial of Ellison for the murder of Small, at the U. S. Capitol, was concluded to-day.

VIRGINIA NOTES.—The Postoffice Department is now making arrangements to use the mail route established some days since on the Fredericksburg and Orange Court House Narrow Gauge Railroad. A new postoffice has already been established on that route and two or three more will be established this week.

It is now considered as certain that no Virginian will be appointed Register of Deeds. Mr. Schurz is understood to be pledged to Mr. Wolf, the present incumbent.

All the Highwood, Petersburg, Norfolk and Lynchburg postoffice papers are sleeping in official pigeon-holes and there is as yet no probability of an early movement.

Liquor Licenses.—To-morrow is the last day for taking out liquor licenses, and those dealers failing to do so then will be closed up and proceeded against according to law.

Local Brevities.—Hannah Howard, the negro girl who attempted to poison the family of Mr. H. W. Eddins, formerly of this city, in Baltimore, last February, was sentenced by the grand jury of that city yesterday.

The Circuit Court of Prince William, which will commence next Monday, will be held by Judge Bird, of Winchester, in the absence of Judge Keith, who is detained by the continued illness of Mrs. Keith.

The farm of Innan H. Evans, near Warrington, has been sold to Amos Jolliffe, late of Baltimore, for \$1,600.

Mr. George Payne, Division Supervisor on the Midland Railroad, has resigned.

The meeting of the stockholders of the W. & O. R. R. will take place at the office of the company, on north Fairfax street, to-morrow.

The liquor dealers of the city will meet at Harlow's Hall to-night.

Eight carloads of stock passed through to Baltimore last night via the A. & F. Railroad, the first that have been received for several weeks.

The story of Mr. John R. Johnson, in the county, was broken into for the fourth time last Saturday night, and robbed of a portion of its contents.
