A ROMANCE IN REAL LIFE.—We take the following from the Charlotte Observer:—
A romantic incident has been developed in our neighboring county, Cabarrus. About seven years ago one Wm. Eurnhardt, a farmer of the county named, a man with a wife and perhaps children, became enamored of another woman, and with her eloped. Time went on and nothing was heard of him. Mrs. Eurnhardt, a very excellent woman, buffeted along the waves of adversity, and by dint of hard work and close economy, made a support for herself and family. Four years passed away, and a neighbor, Mr. George Misenheimer, a farmer well-to-do in the world, paid his addresses to Mrs. Eurnhardt. Meantime she had received news of the death of her husband, and when Mr. Misenheimer proposed to her, three years ago, she accepted him and their nuptials were duly celebrated.
They have lived happily together raising a young family, and everything was lovely until a week or two ago, who lo! and behold, who should step upon the scene but Eurnhardt. There he was, and he demanded his wife. The case was a perplexing one, and what to do nobody knew. In his perplexity, Misenheimer applied to a lawyer in this city for legal advice. The attorney told him he was illegally married; that in a case of absence of husband or wife the law, after seven years, supposed death and allowed marriage of the party deserted; but that in this case Eurnhardt, having been absent but four years when his wife married, he was entitled to her again as against Misenheimer.
The lawyer advised further that the woman apply for a divorce from Eurnhardt on the ground of desertion, and the papers being fixed up the case will be regularly docketed in Cabarrus court. EDINBURGH'S BEAUTY.—A correspondent of the Philadelphia Enquirer gives the following striking sketch of Scotland's pride:—
"And Reekie!"
Now, just as Paris is France, so is Edinburg Scotland. It is, in fact, the very top and crown of cities; if not as magnificent as Paris, it is a hundred fold more picturesque. It is a succession of the finest architectural edifices in the world, mingled curiously with the finest natural effects. To day Mr. Joseph Jefferson and I lost ourselves in a great park, from which we could obtain no glimpse or landmark of the city, and yet we were in the city's very heart. So, standing on Prince street, looking over towards the great castle on the cliff opposite, one sees a noble hill, covered only with grass and trees, not laid out in walks, but left as nature left it. It looks like the far-away country with the sunshine and the shadows of the clouds upon it; but you may stand here, in the most busy street of all, and cast a stone into it. Such effects are common in Edinburg, and to no other city. Up there on Carlton Hill is a group of buildings and monuments which seems like a great city in itself—like Athens, with its pure Grecian architecture. Athens itself is not so fine. On the opposite hill from the new town is the old, having for its crown the castle perched high upon its rock. Around and about it rise towers, domes, pinnacles, spires, battlements and gables one above the other in endless succession. The effects are marvellously beautiful and picturesque, and at night, when the lights shine from the casements, the old town is as fair as the fairest city of the poet's dream.
I leave it to the guide books to tell you of the wondrously curious and interesting character of the things to be seen here, and few cities have so many places of historical interest as Edinburg. Outside of all that I know of no city in Europe is so well worth visiting as it. But, as I have said, Edinburg is Scotland; at least, to me it is.

TOILETS AT SARATOGA.—The description following represents three of the most beautiful costumes worn at the United States Hotel, Saratoga, during the summer.
Each toilet was worn by a wealthy lady, who possessed diamonds and lace enough to make an ordinary person rich, and the descriptions were written by a well-known fashionable lady out of courtesy to the Home Journal.

Breakfast toilet.—This toilet consisted of a cream white French hunting, elegantly trimmed with Smyrna lace. The underskirt was made quite long, with side plaited flounces, edged with lace, the plaitonise very closely fitting around the hips. There were two rows of insertion around the bottom, running up the front to the neck; it was finished with wide lace around the bottom. The toilet was dressed with a wide cardinal sash, cardinal bows on sleeves, parasol and polonaise. Worn with it was a very stylish Leghorn hat, trimmed with straw-colored feathers, and caught up on one side with red roses. Cardinal silk stockings with dainty Louis XVI slippers, completed this simply, yet elegant toilet.

Race Toilet.—The material of the race toilet was a light olive (tulle) green a la prairie, parasol to match; a Gainsborough hat trimmed with feathers of the dress, straw-colored gloves, Chatelaine watch, and silk bag (same stuff) with monogram on it. The sleeves were close fitting and perfectly plain. This dress hung plain in front and at the sides, falling in long rich folds in the back. It was one of the most striking dresses worn this season, and looked as if it had stepped out of a picture of the seventeenth century. It was an old fashion reproduced.

Ball Toilet.—This consisted of a very pale shade of blue gros grain, intermixed with cream color; a rich brocaded apron front of cream color; edged with Valenciennes lace, and caught together at the back with loops of blue and cream color. The plaited flounces on the very long colored feathers, and caught up on one side with a light fitting cuirass watch, with lace straps to the elbow; long cream-colored mitts, reaching the elbow, and blue silk slippers and cream-colored silk stockings, embroidered with blue. The suit was completed with ornaments, turquoises, and diamonds.—Home Journal.

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
