THE IVY CLUB.—This association, which is composed of some of the best talent in Alexandria, and which has for its object the promotion of the dramatic art among the colored race, gave an exhibition of tableaux and a musical concert at Odd Fellows' Hall, in that city, on last Monday night, for the benefit of Meade Chapel, P. E. Church. The entertainment was largely attended by the elite of the city—the audience being one of the largest and most select that has been brought together in that city for a long time. Financially and otherwise, it was a grand success, and reflects much credit on its manager, Miss Lizzie A. Piper. The following are the names of some of the pieces that were well rendered, as were all:—"Innocence," by Florence Chapman, a little Miss of about nine years. "Bluebeard" was performed in five acts, Messrs. A. B. Hopkins and Wm. Waters taking the character of Bluebeard and his wife's brother respectively. We failed to get the names of the other actors in this piece, but they all acquitted themselves creditably. A very laughable picture, that of "Open your mouth and shut your eyes," by Master Sammy Burke and Miss Addie Ware. Miss Gussie Madella deserves special mention for her acting in the character of the aged mother entreating her wayward son, "Don't you go Tommy, don't go." Miss Abbie Piper, as "Pocahontas, pleading the life of Captain John Smith," acted her part so well that we were made to feel that she was a real Pocahontas, and that the life of Captain Smith was then about to be taken. Miss Helen Morton presided at the organ and sang several solos; she also sang several pieces with her sister, Miss Lucy, and as usual they carried off the laurels, for their good singing. We learn that ere long the club will favor the public with a tragedy.—*Wash. Plain Dealer.*

A VERY picturesque story is told by a White Sulphur Springs correspondent of the Louisville Courier Journal regarding the widow of Governor Pickens, of South Carolina. "She was very much grieved," says this correspondent, calmly, "at a newspaper article concerning herself, which spoke of her accepting Gov. Pickens on condition that he obtained a foreign mission. She said that it seemed so mercenary and calculating in a girl of eighteen. The truth was that she was only a child, and the mission to Russia was the mother's objection to the marriage. Governor Pickens was rejected, and had taken his passage for Europe. He wrote a farewell letter to his lady love, but before concluding said it was too late for her to change her mind, for if she would telegraph him after receiving the letter, and accept his proposal, let the steamer sail without him. She did accept, and a few weeks afterward they sailed together as man and wife. The marriage proved happy, nothing but the war interrupting the course of true love. Governor and Mrs. Pickens returned to South Carolina about the time that State seceded. During their residence in Europe they had made many purchases of pictures, statuary, furniture, rare lace, and jewels. These arrived at the port of New York in a sailing vessel, a month after their arrival. Everything was confiscated. Among the articles were busts of the Governor and his wife by Powers. A New York gentleman purchased these at the sale, and after the war was over sent them to the owners in South Carolina."

THE NOVELIST "OUIDA."—"Ouida" is the nom de plume of Miss Louisa de la Rime. As she is known to the world, so she has been known to her friends from a baby by the name of "Ouida," an infantile corruption of her baptismal name, as "Bess" was in Charles Dickens's childhood. Her present abode is Villa Parolua, a most beautiful place somewhat less than three miles from Florence. Authorship of some sort or other has always been the gratification of her natural impulse, and at four years old she wrote in printed characters a little child's story. She has always been something of a student. When very young she was trained to masculine modes of culture and of thought by her father, who had a lofty and polished intellect. As a child she acquired a smattering of algebra and mathematics, and delighted to trace on ancient maps the campaigns of Alexander and of Cesar. This love of study has never left her, for all adds to it a great and reverent love for all arts. She has, as her novels conclusively prove, a strong belief in "race," and what the Westminster Review, in an article upon her, called remarkable freedom from the bonds of any kind of prejudice. "Ouida" is not tall; she is slightly built, fair, with an oval face and large eyes of dark blue; her hair of a golden brown color, which used to hang loose over her shoulders, is now braided a la Catogan.
