A Romantic Wedding.

An exceedingly romantic wedding was sol-
emized yesterday afternoon at St. Barbara's
Episcopal Church. The bride was Mrs. Emma
A. Moore, of Jackson, Mississippi, a pretty and
accomplished widow of 23 or 24, and the groom
Mr. John T. Mayo, a young merchant of Nor-
folk, Va., who, singularly enough, is a widower.
On Saturday morning last Mrs. Moore arrived
in this city and registered as a guest at Ford's
Eutaw hotel. She appeared to be expecting
some one, and bore a look of disappointment
during the morning. After dinner she request-
ed a few moments' conversation in the parlor
with Captain W. J. Wash, manager of the hotel.
The captain granted her request, where-
upon she confided to him the romantic story of
her flight from friends in the extreme South in
order to marry the man she loved. She left
Jackson, she related, under promise to meet in
this city Mr. Mayo, who was to have joined her
at the depot. She expected to reach the city
on Thursday, but had been delayed by the re-
cent frost, and was terribly exhausted in mind
at the thought that her intended husband had
returned to Norfolk. She had been obliged,
she stated, to come on to Baltimore to be mar-
ried, to escape the importunities of a too ardent
lover in Jackson. She had been engaged to
the gentleman referred to in Jackson and in-
tended marrying him, but while at Saratoga
last summer she met Mr. Mayo, and both fell
desperately in love. She left the gay watering
place pledged to her new love and with the
unpleasant task before her of breaking the
news to the old one. When informed of her
determination, lover No. 1 raved, vowed that
she was false, and declared she should marry
no one but him. She at once determined upon
her flight, and by a preconcerted arrangement
with lover No. 2 agreed to meet him in Bal-
timore. Captain Wash expressed his sympathy
for her when she had finished her romantic
story, and promised to render her all the assis-
tance in his power to find the missing bride-
groom elect. Saturday afternoon and Sunday
passed away, however, without any trace of
him being discovered, and Mrs. Moore, in utter
despair and thoroughly disappointed, resolved
to return to her home. Accordingly she left
the hotel yesterday morning and at Camden
station, as she was about stepping on the train,
she, the missing and long looked for lover
made his appearance. Explanations followed
greetings, and the happy pair returned to the
hotel. Mr. Mayo, it appears, had arrived in the
city before his expectant bride, and had
been constantly on the lookout for her, going
to see the southern trains on the Baltimore and
Ohio. Mrs. Moore had, however, come from
Washington over the Baltimore and Potomac
road, and thus missed him.

Horrors of the Commune.

Ex-Minister Washburn, in a lecture, deliv-
ered at Cincinnati, Monday night, said:—
The great leader of the Commune, Raoul
Rogault, was one of the most desperate
and bloody men who ever existed. Bloody,
energetic and desperate, he was consumed by
the most deadly hatred to society and the most
intense thirst for blood. Mr. Washburn then
gave an account of the assassination by Rogault
of Chaudoir, a distinguished republican, and of
Bonjean, the Chief Justice of France, and af-
terward of the venerable Archbishop of Paris.
It was through Raoul Rogault that Mr. Wash-
burne was enabled to get access to the Arch-
bishop during his time of imprisonment at the
prison of Mazas. There he visited the Arch-
bishop frequently, and intervened, but without
success, to have him released. He then de-
scribed the several interviews he had with him,
the condition of the prison and the work of the
assassination of that great prelate who was so
beloved by all Paris. The situation of Paris
during the Commune was further described.
Fortune, business, public and private credit,
industry, labor, financial enterprise, were all
buried in one common grave. There was every-
where devastation, desolation and ruin. All the
gold and silver found in the churches, and all
the plate belonging to the government found in
the different monasteries, was seized by the
Commune and converted into coin, and the priests
were openly placarded as thieves. No less than
twenty three priests were shot, by order of Raoul
Rogault, the day before the entry of the gov-
ernment troops into Paris.
Mr. Washburn remained in Paris during
the entire Commune, and was the only repre-
sentative of a foreign Power who remained there.
He was charged with the protection of no
less than fourteen different nationalities. The
scenes which passed during the Commune
were described at considerable length. The
first act of the insurrectionists was to seize Cle-
ment, Thomas and Leconte, who were brought
to a mock court martial, condemned to death
and immediately shot. There were 15,000 of
the National Guard in Paris at that time, and
they threw off the government authority and
entered into the insurrection. The regular gov-
ernment having left Paris for Versailles, the in-
surrectionary government saw at their feet one
of the largest, richest, most beautiful and at-
tractive cities in the world, with its wealth,
splendor, refinement, intelligence and with all
the departments of the government fallen into
their hands, and authority and held the city for ten weeks
simply by force and terror. It was a fight on
the part of a great majority of the Communists
for power and plunder, and to force themselves
from the restraint of law. The reign of the
Commune was the absolute force of desperate
and wicked men, unlimited, unchecked, unre-
strained by any human power.
