A Suicide Letter. The man who committed suicide in New York, last Tuesday night, wrote the following letter a short time before his death:—

DEAR MR. UNDERHILL—I trust you will excuse my writing to you, as I shall not probably bother you for some time. I have advertised repeatedly to try and get steady work, but I have not been able to get it. My money is running out, and I think it is best for me to end my life before I am dependent upon any one and while I have enough money to pay my funeral expenses, I wish first to thank you for your kindness to me since I have known you and to assure you that I feel sincerely grateful to you. I have done my best to qualify myself in my business, thinking that if I did not succeed I would at least deserve success; but it is not my fate to succeed, and I may as well accept it without whining.

I know that when I commit suicide people will say I am a fool and a fanatic and such complimentary terms, but I don't care for the kick of an ass, though I can't help feeling it. I will be beyond all that very soon, however. I have minded my own business in life, have paid my own way and done as much good as I could, and will put my trust in God for the next world. Perhaps I may find out that there is a hell, though I think we have hell enough on earth without manufacturing one for the hereafter. At any rate, if there is a hell it is a comfort to know that "there will be no more winter there." Thanking you once more for your kindness to me,
