There are two women across the water the melancholy of whom is well calculated to excite the deepest commiseration. Charlotte, the widow of Maximilian, hopelessly insane in her castle, and Mrs. Abraham Lincoln, the widow of the assassinated President, living secluded in an interior town of France, declining to return to America, lest she may again be indulged in a lunatic asylum. It is said that she still indulges, to a moderate extent, her propensity of purchasing things for which she has no use, which was one of the forms her mild lunacy at first assumed. It will be remembered that in 1853 Robert, Mrs. Lincoln's oldest son, commenced proceedings in the Chicago courts to have his mother adjudged insane, in view of her rooklike expenditures and her many acts inconsistent with sanity, and to have a person appointed to take care of her property. The Court, after hearing the evidence, pronounced her insane, and appointed a trustee to manage her estate. About \$50,000 in Government bonds was found on her person. After the decision by the Court she left her room, at the Grand Pacific Hotel, in Chicago, and endeavored to procure laudanum at a neighboring drug store, but received only a needle and thread, and was prevented from committing suicide. The next day she was conveyed to a private asylum in Northern Illinois, and after a few months was placed in charge of her sister at Springfield, from thence she sought a quiet retreat in France. The loss of her husband bore heavily upon her, but the blow which wrecked her mind was the shaft of death that fell upon her loved child Thaddeus, or "Tad," as "everybody's pet" was affectionately called. There is but little hope of her recovery. Robert, the only son now living, is engaged in the practice of law in Chicago, and holds high rank in his profession.—Phil. Record.

MALE AND FEMALE AILMENTS.—It is well known to botanists that aloe trees are of two kinds—male and female—and that the ones that bear staminate blossoms are responsible for the evil odor of the tree, the pistillate blossoms having no scent. Hence it has often been proposed to cut down all the trees that bear staminate blossoms and plant in their place the pistillate. It is believed that such a course would redeem the reputation of the tree, as it is useful for shade purposes and is of good shape. But there is an instance recently recorded by the Botanical Bulletin, of an abnormal performance, that makes it doubtful whether permanent success would attend the proposed remedy. An aloe which has hitherto borne staminate flowers last year produced pistillate blossoms on one branch, succeeded by perfect fruit. Now, if the pistillate trees should take to similar freaks, there would be nothing gained by substituting them for the small producers.—N. Y. Tribune.
