EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.—The Superintendent of Public Schools has received a circular from Prof. Thomas R. Price, President of the Virginia Educational Association, notifying him of the next meeting of that Association, which will be held at Hampton from the 9th to the 12th of July, and requesting a full attendance from this city.

The aim of the meeting is to promote discussion and to spread professional knowledge and fellowship among teachers of all grades and departments. With this aim, the new text-books will be criticized by committees of teachers that have examined them, and the methods and process of teaching will be discussed in careful reports. Besides this, many addresses, on questions of education, will be made by earnest and experienced men.

ELECTION RETURNS.—The commissioners appointed to examine and certify the returns of the late municipal election, met at the office of the clerk of the Corporation Court to-day, in accordance with the law. The returns were certified substantially as stated in the Gazette of yesterday, except that the candidates for Mayor were declared by the Mayor in the Second Ward instead of William N. Brown, his name having been inserted on a spurious ticket in place of that of Mr. Brown, the regular conservative nominee, and one hundred and thirty-five of the spurious tickets were cast, thus insuring an election. A Schofield and not J. H. Schofield in the Third Ward, and John W. Peake, instead of B. F. Peake, in the Fourth Ward, were elected to the Common Council.

THE ORPHAN ASYLUM.—The managers of the Alexandria Female Orphan Asylum have concluded to close that institution and rent out the house. The receipt of funds for the support of the institution has been very small for some time past, and a chance for securing good homes for all the children presenting itself, the managers have thought best to close up the building and to be re-opened at a reasonable rate and the proceeds applied to a charitable purpose. The asylum is an old Alexandria institution and its closing will be viewed with regret by many citizens.

NARROW GAUGE ROAD.—The construction work on the Washington City and St. Louis Narrow Gauge Railroad is now at work in Falls Church village. It is expected that all of the grading between Georgetown and that point will be finished within two weeks, and that the track will be laid and trains running by July 1st. The engine and other appointments for the road are already in Georgetown ready for use. A number of laborers are needed, for whom 75 cents per day and board will be paid.

CELEBRATING THEIR VICTORIES.—A number of bonfires were kindled in various portions of the city last night, and several of the successful candidates at the late municipal election were serenaded at their residences. Notable among the bonfires were those on Windmill Hill and at the Postoffice corner. A number of the friends of City Sergeant Lucas called on him, at the jail, and were handsomely entertained. The election fever has not yet subsided, and will probably last for several days.

PERSONAL.—Mr. D. W. Whiting, late proprietor of the Sunday Bulletin, will continue his editorial connection therewith. Mr. Whiting is an old newspaper man, and his many friends will be glad to hear that he is not to leave us.

Capt. Robert O. Lee has obtained a position as civil engineer in Minnesota, under Gen. Rosser, and will leave for his post in a few days.

THE COAL TRADE.—The Washington Republican says that several foreign vessels are expected to arrive at Georgetown in a few days to load with coal for Cuba and other Spanish ports. Most of these foreign shipments have heretofore been made from Baltimore, but the trade now seems to be diverted toward the Potomac river ports of Georgetown and Alexandria. The reason for this is the improved manner in handling the coal both in Alexandria and Georgetown.

PICTURE THIEF.—Some graceless thief, who had neither patriotism or the fear of the law before his eyes, entered the office of Justice Padgett, corner of Fairfax and Cameron streets, yesterday, and stole therefrom a chromo of Mrs. Washington. The Justice says that if he is opposed to parting man and wife, and if the scoundrel will come back he will give him the companion chromo of Gen. George Washington, and promise not to prosecute.

THE ALEXANDRIA POSTOFFICE.—The Washington correspondent of the Richmond Dispatch says: "I am very certain that the Senate will confirm Mr. Berkley nominated for postmaster at Alexandria, as both the republican and democratic members of the committee reported favorably on his nomination."

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.—The General Association of the Baptist Church, in Virginia, will meet at Portsmouth, on Wednesday next. Rev. Mr. Penick will represent the church in this city and Messrs. John Perry, J. T. Nalls, J. W. Nalls, Jr., and Giles Penick, the Potomac Association, of which the church here is a part.

KICKED BY A HORSE.—Mr. Henry Hair, a well known young man, who lives near Chantilly, was kicked in the forehead by a young colt on Thursday evening and severely wounded. It was at first thought that his injuries would prove serious, but yesterday his condition was much improved.

THE J. S. BEACH spoken of in yesterday's issue as an independent candidate for the City Council, from the Second Ward, was not Mr. John S. Beach, that gentleman having declined a re-nomination for that position from the Third Ward.

From Washington.

SPECIAL TO THE ALEXANDRIA GAZETTE. WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25. SENATE.

In the Senate, to-day, the bill to confer judicial powers upon consuls, where such powers are not now exercised, was passed.

Mr. Withers, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted adverse reports upon several private pension bills and one favorable report.

A memorial from the Superintendent of Schools of Washington, asking for a lot of ground for school purposes, was referred.

Mr. Sargent called up the resolution calling the attention of the President to the present treaty stipulations between this country and China, in reference to the emigration of Chinese, which was passed without debate.

A bill for holding courts of the United States Circuit and District Courts at Toledo, Ohio, was passed.

A bill for the refunding of taxes to the Union Transfer Company of Philadelphia and Baltimore and others, was passed.

Mr. Sargent introduced a resolution instructing the Judiciary Committee to inquire into the expediency of restricting the jurisdiction of United States courts, so as to relieve the courts of the present pressure of business therein, which was adopted.

The Senate then proceeded to the consideration of the District of Columbia government bill.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

In the House of Representatives, after the reading of the journal.

Mr. Hartridge, of Georgia, introduced a resolution for reference to the Committee on Post-offices and Postroads, directing that committee to investigate certain frauds in the postal service.

On motion of Mr. Bridges the resolution requesting the Secretary of State to furnish the correspondence relating to the claim of Charles Butterfield & Co., against Denmark, was passed.

A bill providing that the proceeds of the sale of public lands shall be devoted to the education of the people, was reported by Mr. Goode, from the Committee on Education and Labor, and placed on the public calendar.

The House re-considered in the Senate amendments to the bill for the completion of the Washington monument, and Messrs. Foster, Clymer and Goode were appointed to confer with the new Senate committee.

Mr. Knott asked unanimous consent to take House bill 25 for the repeal of the bankrupt law from the table and agree to the Senate amendments. But Mr. Waddell, of N. C., objected.

The regular order was then called for, which was the inter-State Commerce bill.

The Appropriations Committee opposed the regular order and it was voted down. The House then went into Committee of the Whole on the Army appropriation bill which was further amended.

A proposition to reduce the pay of the General of the Army to \$12,000 per annum was laid, Messrs. Goode and Cabell, of Virginia, voting in the affirmative and Mr. Tucker in the negative.

NOTES.

Mr. Potter's investigating committee met yesterday, but without organizing adjourned until Monday. Mr. Hiseock, of N. Y., who has been detained at his home by sickness, returned to-day, but General Hunt, another member of the committee, went home last night on account of indisposition. It is understood that the latter will be chairman of the sub-committee to investigate the Louisiana fraud. On Monday Mr. Potter says the committee will certainly organize and at once proceed with the work before it.

It is expected that McMahon and Baker will be the leading spirits on the committee to bring out the points upon which the democrats hope to make their "jack."

This is the first Saturday since the opening of the present session of Congress that the Senate has been in session.

The Committee on Privileges and Elections of the Senate were to-day considered the contested election case of Corbin vs. Butler from South Carolina to-day, but owing to the session of the Senate it was again postponed.

During the discussion on the Army bill to-day in the House Mr. Foster made a good point when he argued that while the House was reducing the salaries of officers and others it should cut down the pay of its own members, the point was well put, but not so well taken.
