SHRINKAGE OF CORN.—The following statement of the experiments of J. T. Thomas, one of the most observant farmers of this country, is worthy the attention of corn growers. He says corn in the ear, after an unusually damp season was weighed the first of January, and by the following October had lost one fifth part of its bulk. The weight of corn in the ear, of the Northern eight rowed variety, varied all the way from eighty eight to seventy five pounds, to yield a shelled bushel of sixty pounds. Ears with small cobs, well dried, afforded scarcely eight pounds of cobs to the bushel; with larger cobs, freshly husked, they may weigh twelve or thirteen pounds. A moist cob is, of course, far heavier than a dry one; hence, farmers who sell corn in the ear should know the amount of loss from drying. As a general rule \$1 per bushel for corn in the ear in summer is better than seventy five cents in husking time. Sold in the ear corn should always be weighed, not measured. A full, compact, heaped half bushel of moderate size, eight rowed ears containing fifty six ears, weighing twenty four pounds; thrown in loosely and heaped there would only forty four ears, weighing nineteen pounds. Shelled corn shrinks in bulk and loses in weight by long drying. In one case it lost 1 20 of its bulk and 1/3 of its weight in three weeks, in a room heated with a stove. It would lose more in greater time, and it would be better to sell shelled corn early in winter at eighty cents than the following summer at \$1.
