BRIGANDAGE IN SICILY.—The arrangements made by the Mafia to insure the escape of the three chiefs among the captive brigands at Palermo may certainly be described as masterly and most efficiently carried out. It is well known that in Sicily the Mafia is everywhere. No one can be certain that his bosom friend is not a Mafia. The affiliated are found as much in the upper as in the lower ranks of society, so much so that the former is called the high Mafia; and yet, while it has this wide extension and almost unlimited influence, the authorities took no more trouble to safely guard the sixteen desperate instruments of this evil they had in their hands than was shown in their being confided to the care of three carabinieri and in a prison van with the prisoners handcuffed only. It is true the brigands were handcuffed to be locked; but the Mafia interested in the rescue knew how to reduce the value of these precautions to a minimum. The controlling power of Italian thumbers and mafiosi has often been described, and yet it is evident that when these confederates of Mrs. Rosa's captor, Leone, left the prison their handcuffs were as much within their individual command as so many ladies' bracelets. Moreover, each brigand had a part assigned to him, which he carried out with the precision of a soldier. One cleared the three chiefs—Sapiere, Randazzo and another whose name is differently given—all slipped quietly out of their cells, made good their escape and have not been heard of since. The Liberta, commenting severely upon the occurrences and upon the fact that no trace of the fugitives have yet been seen, says that it is clear a number of persons, and in all probability functionaries among them, were privy to this affair and engaged in it. It is stated that the carabinieri had unloaded carbines with them and were without their revolvers. It is very justly urged that this was not an affair to be passed over with one of the matter of course inquiries which leads to nothing.—Roman Letter to the London Times.
