SCHOOLSHIPS.—The Evangelical Educational Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church has resolved that the Board of Managers be empowered to find three prizes (scholarships) of \$50 each, one for each class in each of the Episcopal Theological schools of Cambridge, Philadelphia, Alexandria and Gambier, to be awarded at the close of the year, by the trustees of the respective institutions to such students as in their judgment shall best deserve them on account of their industry and success in the pursuit of the studies of their respective classes.

FISH-TOWNS LOTS.—The Committee on Public Property of the City Council met last evening. The matter of renting the lots at Fishtown belonging to the city was brought up, and it was determined to take some action at the next meeting, to be held in a few days. These lots are the same on which the buildings of Messrs. McGraw and others formerly stood, before their destruction by fire, some two years ago. The lots have been idle, and have brought no revenue to the Corporation, since the buildings were burned.

THE OUTLET LOCK.—Scarcely a week passes without one or two accidents to the new outlet lock above Georgetown, on the C. & O. Canal. Now that the Alexandria Canal is closed all boats for this city have to come by way of that lock or Rock Creek. There is so much trouble by the former route that most of the boats have to come by the latter, involving much delay. No boats were passed through the lock between Tuesday morning and Wednesday noon.

DEAD.—Celia Brown, an aged and well known colored woman of this city, died yesterday and was buried this evening from the Roberts' M. E. Chapel on South Washington street by Rev. G. T. Picoke, the pastor. She was formerly a slave of Benjamin Cotebe, but was emancipated by him in the year 1849. The funeral was largely attended by the old residents among the colored people.

M. P. CHURCH.—The revival at the Methodist Protestant Church, under the direction of Rev. W. R. Graham, still continues, with satisfactory results. About fifty persons have professed conversion since its commencement and upwards of forty have been added to the church. Mr. Graham's sermons are highly spoken of.

LATE TRAIN TO WASHINGTON.—Owing to the exertions of Mr. J. K. Sharp, the efficient agent of the Alexandria and Washington Railroad at Washington, it has been determined to put on a night train between this city and Washington, after Sunday next. The train will leave Washington at 11:30 p. m. and this city, at 12 m.

TEXAN ROBBERS.—A startling robbery and bloody tragedy occurred Tuesday night three miles north of Bryan, the oldest settled portion of Texas. About midnight a gang of five masked men, mounted and well armed, went to the house of Thomas Higgs, broke in and tied him to the bed post, hand and foot.

The villains then robbed the house of four hundred and fifty dollars. They took Higgs and made him walk in front to the house of his brother, Samuel Higgs, a quarter of a mile distant, and forced him to knock at the door and ordered him to make no reply. His brother Samuel not receiving any answer, seized a six shooter and fired, mortally wounding Tom Higgs.

The robbers then opened fire, completely riddling the house with bullets. The occupants miraculously escaped. The robbers mounted and rode away southward.

AN amusing case has ended in Somerset county, Md., by the sentence of John McIntyre, colored, to three and a half years' imprisonment for stealing a hog belonging to another colored man. The thief is what is called a local preacher, and has the reputation of a pious, cut-siding and out-preaching anything of his riches and age down in his neighborhood. He had eaten part of it, and the rest was found in his bed, hid away under the covering, and he declared to the officer who arrested him that it was a sick child in the bed. He had stolen the hog with which to feast the presiding elder of his church, who was then on his rounds and expected there.

The Union Pacific Railroad.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—A special meeting of the Union Pacific Railroad directors was held in this city yesterday.

The question of the debt due the government was discussed, and it is stated that the directors unanimously expressed a willingness to settle the debt in full. The plan proposed is for the Union Pacific to issue new bonds for the entire debt and interest, the bonds to bear 4 per cent interest, with provisions for a sinking fund, and to be secured by the existing government mortgage. It is also stated that there are to be several changes in the directory, and that men of large means living in this city, are to be made directors in order to bring fresh capital and influence into the company. It is said also that the future meetings of the executive committee will be held alternately in this city and at Boston. Gen. G. M. Dodge, of Iowa, having resigned as a director and member of the executive committee, Russell Sage was chosen yesterday to both vacant positions. The other changes in the directory, it is understood, will take place next week, when two or three large stockholders in the Western Union and New York Central Companies are to be elected members of the board and of the executive committee.

COMMUNICATED. OUR MARKET.—Almost any kind of "doings" are tolerated in our market. What is a Market Master for? Is that functionary elected simply to draw his little salary, or to attend to the interests of the people—to stand between them and wrong doers? These questions are indeed by the constant perpetrating of at least two flagrant violations of law. Section 5, Chapter XVI. of our laws say that "all butter exposed for sale shall be sold by weight." But parties are allowed to sell "prints" of butter at a certain price, and will tell you, if you inquire, that they do not weigh a pound, but so much for the "print"—a clear violation of law. And these "middle men" in the market still continue in violation of Sec. 9, same chapter, to give fifty [50] lbs. of Irish potatoes for a bushel when the law says it shall be sixty! B.
