### S. S. Cox on Tammany's Defeat.

During his speech, at Tammany Hall, Thurs-  
day night, S. S. Cox, who was re-elected to  
Congress, said:  
I came here to-night to make some remarks  
about the organization of Tammany Hall. I  
don't see any necessity for speaking to that  
point. Tammany Hall is organized. Tam-  
many don't die easy and is not dead yet. There  
must be in its veins some of the old celestial  
color of which Milton speaks in his immortal  
poem. No bob tailed or speckled combination  
can beat it. You survive because you have in  
your keeping the old ark of the party. I don't  
refer to the Shekinah and the other ark re-  
ferred to in cipher dispatches, but the old ark  
that came down to us from the earlier and the  
better days. You are not beaten except tem-  
porarily. I know we have a funeral in the  
family, but my friend Mr. Wood and myself  
don't belong to the corpse. But you never  
saw such a lively "wake" as we have. No  
other party ever could come together as we do  
after a defeat. Those who have gone around  
with the republicans or whatever you call  
them may stay with their new allies. We can  
survive them. I made some remarks about a  
deluge the other day. Well, we have had a  
sort of forty days' shower, but the animals will  
all come out of the ark. The other side may  
think it's a deluge, but it isn't, and that con-  
cerns when it commences to give out the soup  
will find that the soup will give out before they  
do. You have no idea how hungry they are.  
This Federal officer by the name of  
Davenport shall not be authorized  
with impunity to carry on these out-  
rages upon the voters of this city. I don't  
want to try him with Mr. Phelps as District  
Attorney. I don't want to try him by any court  
made by this combination; I want the Position-  
ers doors to open; I want the Federal Congress  
to repeal this law by which he acts and if no  
other member of Congress from New York  
offers the bill I will offer it. Oh! they think  
they have got the old days again. Have they?  
The Senate will be democratic after the 4th  
of March next, and the House is already demo-  
cratic; and I think we elected a president, al-  
though [with a laugh] I swear I don't know  
whether we did or not. When a man is natu-  
ralized in this country, whether it be in 1855  
or 1818, his papers import absolute right to  
vote and so the Court should recognize until it  
otherwise appears. Instruct your members of  
Congress in this city; instruct the democratic  
members all over the country; instruct the  
democratic House and the Senate to put the  
knife clear through the Johnny Davenport's of  
this country. We are not yet dead. We had  
the cross the other day, but we shall wear the  
cross to-morrow. Oh! they talk about a "one  
man power," and some Colonel from Arkansas  
called it a "one horse power," insulting the  
man whom he all know to be honest. One  
man power! You can't make an army without a  
general. Power is lodged somewhere in every  
organization, and the final judgment must be  
vested in one even if you go to the Upper  
Throne. I have heard of "one woman power"  
in a family. I know a man who defers some-  
times to his mother in law. If we must have  
a one man power it is not better to have an  
honest one man power than 20,000 dishonest  
soudredels combined against the one man? Our  
organization can't be broken up by that sort of  
talk. No organization, from the legion of Caesar  
to the supreme court is without a one man power—  
some judgment of power as the last resort.  
I never knew Mr. Kelly to control my district;  
I never knew him to defer me or I to him  
very much; and this talk about his dictation is  
far-fetched. I sat this talk in Congress in  
1855 and 1857, and there as well as since, I  
found him an honest man. No one can say  
we are elected, and we have now to go to our  
respective duties. This combination will last  
about forty days and forty nights. It is not  
great because it is not generous. It was not  
made to the right way and will soon go to pieces.  
Oh, sure, how? These factions that went  
philandering all over the city after Mr. Cooper  
went to pieces. And why? Corruption never  
holds together. When we meet to fight again  
next year we will strain ourselves kicking at  
something which will no longer exist.  
There could be much said of the daring ex-  
ploits of Joe Lee and his band of freebooters,  
but one adventure deserves especial mention,  
since it is not known how near came to affect-  
ing the destiny of the nation. It appears that  
after Vicksburg had been invested, and the  
South threatened at other points, Governor  
Allen, of Louisiana, conceived the desperate  
idea of capturing the person of General Grant.  
He believed that Grant was the evil genius of  
the Confederacy, and that if he could be  
killed or taken prisoner the siege of  
Vicksburg would be raised and the federal army  
driven back. He sent for Joe Lee and imparted  
to him his thoughts, and asked him if he  
could devise a plan. It was readily taken to  
Lee who immediately proposed to execute  
the daring enterprise. At that time—that is,  
in the spring of 1864—Grant and his army were  
encamped at Milligan's Bend, near Young's  
Point, on the Mississippi, some eighteen miles  
above Vicksburg. General Grant's headquar-  
ters were in the dwelling house that belonged to  
a magnificent planter, much of which could  
be seen from the deck of a passing steamer.  
Joe Lee proposed to go to that house and bring  
away the body of General Grant, dead or alive.  
He chose five of his most trusty men. They  
were the two James brothers, two of the Young-  
er brothers and John Jarrett. These with him-  
self made six. There never were six better  
men for such an expedition. They were young,  
strong and as brave as the bravest. They had  
already seen all there is in war. They had been  
tried in the most trying places; had suffered all  
manner of hardships; did not care much wheth-  
er they lived or died; were the quickest and  
best shots in the world, and rode the fleetest  
horses in the land. It was just before the Fed-  
eral army set out on that surprising march  
down the west side of the river. The country  
was all full of marshes, bayous and morasses,  
so that the natural advantages for the execution  
of the plot were great. The plan was for Joe  
Lee and his five trusty followers to dress up in full  
Federal uniform, ride on horseback to Milligan's  
Bend, go direct to the house where General  
Grant was stopping, rush in and secure his per-  
son, put him on a spare horse and then escape  
to the swamps, which were near by. On one  
Saturday evening late the party set out from  
Dixon's house, near Delhi, and rode toward  
the Mississippi. There was not a soul on earth  
besides themselves and Governor Allen that  
knew of their desperate mission. It was  
something over twenty five miles they had to  
go and the night was a dark one, but long be-  
fore day they were at the edge of the woods  
that bordered on the plantation on which Grant  
was quartered. There was no enemy to attack  
from the west side, and there was no particular  
precaution about guards. The pickets were  
placed before sun up, and, while the General

was yet asleep, the guerillas rode boldly up  
through the open field toward the house.

There they were, six men, seven of the hun-  
dred thousand men who were camped about in  
every direction. They approached within al-  
most a stone's throw of the house, when they  
met a negro. They were discovered. It was  
an old man whom they've men had run  
away from Delhi not ten days before. He  
knew them all and immediately gave the alarm.  
In a moment there was a great tumult, and  
the six guerillas had nothing to do but save  
their lives. They broke through the field and  
into the twinkling of an eye were back in the  
woods, but not until a hundred shots had been  
fired after them. Before the sun went down  
they were safe at their favorite rendezvous.—  
Thus was frustrated one of the most daring  
plots of the war.—New York Herald.
