

LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—Nov. 12, 1878. For the Middle Atlantic States rain early, followed by clearing weather, warm southwest, veering to colder northwest winds.

GAME PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION.—A meeting of the Alexandria Game Protective Association was held last night.

Messrs. J. S. Beach and J. F. Young were appointed a committee to procure a trap and a supply of glass balls for the club and their friends to practice with.

It was requested that all of the members be present at the next meeting in order to make arrangements for a general re-union.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing term: Peter Aitchison, President; R. T. Lucas, Vice President; M. B. Harlow, Secretary; W. F. Crighton, Treasurer; C. H. Collins, J. F. Young, M. Schuler and R. H. Aitchison, Executive Committee.

The Association is in a most flourishing condition, and is accomplishing much good.

PARTRIDGE SHOOTING.—The recent experience of some of the sportsmen of this city is not dissimilar to that of a party of Washingtonians as narrated by the Republican of that city: "On Monday last Messrs. John Roach, Thos. Athey, and Dr. Wilfred McLeod started on a bird hunt as far as Goose Creek, Va. Each claimed that he had the best hunting dog. The party proceeded no further than the Seven Locks, when they trailed a rabbit, which, as a matter of course, took flight. Dr. McLeod fired at the running game, and as soon as he fired his weapon the dogs took to their heels and ran faster than the rabbit, only in an opposite direction. At this time the sportsmen heard from a distance a partridge being shot. The sportsmen concluded to go no further, purchased a partridge, brought it home, and placed it in front of a regular hunting dog. The dog snuffed the bird, took to heels, and hasn't been seen since."

THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR.—When the Alexandria Light Infantry, who were escorting Old Dominion Commandery, Knights Templars, reached the wharf yesterday evening, they were addressed by Eminent Commander Joseph Horkins, who thanked the company for its polite attention, and said that the Light Infantry would ever be appreciated in the hearts of every Templar. The remarks of Mr. Horkins were received by the military with three cheers, which were heartily responded to by the Knights. The salute from the "Knights" gave the Knights a parting adieu from home. The very handsome appearance of both commands was the subject of general comment. The Light Infantry on their return to their armory marched like old veterans.

HYDRAULIC FIRE CO.—The Hydraulic Fire Company held an adjourned meeting last night, with Benjamin Barton, President, and John Lannon, Secretary.

The committee on uniforms, appointed at the preceding meeting, reported in reference to a uniform, and their report was received.

It was ordered that if any active member fail to fully equip himself within ninety days, his name be stricken from the roll.

One person was proposed for active membership, and his name referred to the committee on elections.

Some other routine business was transacted, and the meeting adjourned.

Y. M. C. A.—The young men's meeting last night in the Methodist Episcopal Church was an exceedingly interesting occasion. Speeches on the topic, "Young men—their power for evil," by Rev. Messrs. Pearce and Penick, and the President of the Association, were effectively delivered, and a full representation of the churches was present. To-night the topic will be, "Young men—their power for good." Sermons next Sunday night to young men will be preached by R. V. Henderson Sater, at Christ Church, and Rev. D. Bullock, in the Union Presbyterian Church.

PERSONAL.—Miss Sallie L. Ball, formerly of this city, has been appointed postmistress at Sitka, Alaska. Miss Ball is a cousin of Col. M. D. Ball, now Collector of Customs at Sitka. Mr. George H. Watkins was removed by a horse and cart, at West End, yesterday, and severely bruised.

The Mayor, upon his departure for Norfolk with the Knights Templar, committed the charge of the city government to Alderman Strass, of the Second Ward, who is acting Mayor.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—A colored boy named Lee Davis, residing in Washington was accidentally shot in the face and seriously wounded at Four Mile run yesterday by Mr. James Kline, with whom he was hunting. He was at once removed to his home in Washington and received surgical attention. Mr. Kline offered to give himself up to the police, but as the shooting was clearly accidental, he was not detained.

THE OUTLET LOCK.—Now that the Alexandria Canal is closed, all boats for this city have to come through the new outlet lock of the C. & O. Canal, above Georgetown. Considerable complaint is made of the slowness with which things are conducted there. One company here has had boats waiting since Saturday to pass through the lock. It is said also that the channel in the river, outside of the lock is very narrow and tortuous, and difficult to navigate.

LAND SALE.—The Scandling farm, lying on the Plains and Middleburg graded road, two miles from Middleburg, containing about 143 acres, has been bought by Thos. J. Skinner, of Clarke county, late of Alexandria, for \$42 per acre. The Scandling farm has long been known as one of the most productive little farms in Fauquier. With the judicious management of Mr. Skinner it will blossom as a rose.

A SECOND CROP.—Mr. James R. Caton, Deputy Treasurer, received this morning from the farm of his mother, Mrs. E. A. Caton, near Centerville, Fairfax county, a lot of apples, the second crop from the same tree this year. The tree was stripped of fruit in August, and is now again covered with perfectly formed fruit.

POLICE ITEM.—Alderman Strauss, acting Mayor, had before him this evening the case of Ben Saunders, colored, for violating the law relative to porters, &c. Saunders was sent to the chain gang for fifteen days, in default of payment of fine.

BEACON REPAIRED.—The day beacon at Matompkin Shoals, near Matthias Point, which was partially overturned by the ice last winter, has been righted up and put in position by the Light House Board.

Mr. Boutwell on the South.

Mr. Boutwell, who is trying to go back into the Senate from Massachusetts, made speech in Boston last Saturday night, in which he said that had General Butler died in July the republican party would have been beaten. We are, he said, indebted to him and the elements brought into the campaign for the necessary activity which enabled us to win this victory. The administration since last July, I think has done its duty in regard to Southern affairs; but there is one idea predominant, more important in the estimation of republicans than the financial question even, and that is, whether the million of men, enfranchised American citizens, are to be extinguished as a political power. Now, for two years the republican party of Massachusetts has been very silent upon that subject or have not given an unqualified approval of it. I say to all my political friends who have hesitated upon that point that the time is near, if it has not already arrived, when there will be no future for the republican party unless it develops itself to the maintenance of the rights 4,000,000 human beings. I say to all that if another convention of the Massachusetts republican party is held and that convention is silent upon this question of human rights a more formidable foe will attack that party than General Butler.

KENTUCKY'S PATRIARCH.—Charles Addington, esq., was born in Culpeper county, Va., October 10th, 1777, and moved to Scott county, Kentucky, where he now lives, about 60 years ago. He has been married three times, first in 1803, second in 1810, and the third time in 1870. He raised seven sons and eight daughters, and has 167 grandchildren, 450 great grandchildren, and 31 great great grandchildren now living. On his centennial anniversary his relatives and friends gave him a grand dinner, at which about 2500 persons attended. The old gentleman, while enjoying the bountiful repast, told many pleasant recollections of the past. He had been a consistent member of the Baptist Church for fifty years, and the family have the reputation of being orderly and law abiding citizens. Not one has ever been known to be guilty of any penal offence. They have filled public offices of trust with honor and dignity, and are noted for their mathematical talents, many of them teachers in the best schools.—Mount Sterling Democrat.
