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THE AMERICAN EPISCOPAL CHURCH.—The Bishop of Niagara (Dr. Fuller) recently spoke at a Dublin meeting in aid of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts under the presidency of the Archbishop of Dublin. The Bishop, in the course of a long address, gave some interesting particulars of the growth of the Episcopal Church in America. He said that when he was born there were only two dioceses connected with the Church of England in North America. When he was ordained there were 3; now the number had increased to 70. In 1704 the Society planted a mission at James River, then a colony of the State of Virginia, now forming part of the United States. It sent out missionaries, and when the American war broke out in 1776, there were 91 missionaries in 13 colonies. At the close of the war their number was reduced to 81. Such, however, had been the teaching of the Church that the number of clergy in the United States had increased to 3,500 while there were 60 bishops laboring in different parts of the Union. They erected very handsome churches all through their land. It was no uncommon thing in America to have \$5,000 on a church collecting plate, that being equal to about £1,000 English money. Occasionally, the collections amounted to \$15,000 and \$25,000; and on one occasion, after an appeal from the rector for the discharge of a debt, no less than \$82,000 were placed on the plate. The Indians were a very interesting race. There were thousands of Indians ready to receive the Gospel. They were not the drunken, worthless people that some imagined. In 1874 the Bishop of Minnesota told him that in nine years it had cost the United States Government ninety millions of dollars to restrain the Indians. He (the Bishop of Niagara) was proud to be able to reply, as a British subject, that it had not cost his Government nippence to do so. (Applause.) They treated them well; they assisted them when they needed it; they kept their treaties with them; and, consequently, they had no difficulties with them. They had their confidence, and the Indians looked on the white man as a superior being, and were ready to receive instruction from him.

—The varying influence which music has upon different kinds of animals forms a subject possessing considerable interest. Desiring to test the effect of the blowing of a trumpet upon a horse, an ass, a dog, a cat, a deer, and some small birds, a certain writer states that he once collected one of each of these animals together for that purpose; and the following was the result. "The horse, he tells us, stopped short from time to time, raising up its head as if he were feeding on grass; the ass appeared totally indifferent to the sound, and continued to eat his thistles peacefully; the dog continued for a long time seated on its hind legs, looking steadily at the player; the cat was not in the slightest degree affected; the deer lifted its ears and seemed very attentive; while the small birds, which were in an aviary, were so pleased and excited, "that they almost tore their little throats with singing."—Little Folks' Magazine.

—The Bishop of Manchester, at the Church Congress, maintained that ladies might reform the theatre by declining to enter it when objectionable plays were performed. The *Reverend* replies: "Experience has proved that a drama defaced by indecencies does not act as a deterrent to ladies. Whether it be a lascivious ballet or whether it be a suggestive French comedy, maids and matrons flock to witness it, and what is more, appear to enjoy it. This not only applies to comedies and ordinary stage representations. The aristocracy flock to the opera to see and hear 'Don Giovanni,' many scenes from which cannot be described to a decent woman, and they excuse themselves on the ground that they go to hear Mozart's immortal music." What will the Bishop say now? And what will the ladies say?—*Hand and Heart*.

—Damascus has been ruined by the opening of the Suez Canal. The overland trade, both Oriental and European, by caravan with Bagdad, and the Persian Gulf has been diverted to the water way. House rent has declined 30 and 50 per cent; and large numbers of empty shops and houses in every part of the city, indicate the general decline. The streets are filled with beggars, both Moslem and Christian, and that, too, in a city where eighteen months ago a beggar was a rarity. The more elevated districts of Lebanon, which formerly contributed the principal portion of the mendicants during winter months, have this year sent double the number to swell the amount of local indigence. The far famed Eye of the East is now dull and lustreless.

—On the suppression of the Commune in Paris, 600 boys were among the prisoners taken, and it was proved that large numbers of the murders and incendiarisms were committed by them. They were sent to a reformatory, at Rouen, and on being carefully inspected by two eminent physicians, it was found that 337 were of very delicate form and stunted growth. They were, however, among the most mischievous, and all the children of *debauched mothers*.
