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THE WASHINGTON RIVER FRONT.

A delegation of the prominent business men of Washington waited upon the House Committee on Commerce yesterday and were cordially received. Mr. C. B. Church was the object of the visit.

COMMISSIONER PHOENIX, who was present, was invited to speak. He said that the terms proposed by the Board of Survey contemplated an appropriation of about \$600,000, but that amount had now been modified to about \$2,000,000.

MR. CHURCH called his attention to the fact that the bill now proposed by the committee embraced only the section above and west of the bridge, and that the embankment the portion below or east of the bridge.

UPON inquiry by one of the committee if the plan of the Commissioners was satisfactory to the citizens, Mr. J. L. Barbour answered negatively that the action of the committee appeared always antagonistic to the business interests of the citizens of Washington.

MESSRS. STEPHENSON and JOHNSON, representing the coal and shipping interests, stated that the commercial interests of the city imperatively demanded that the Washington channel should be kept open.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7, 1878. SENATE. Mr. Hamble, of Mo., from the Committee on Foreign Relations, reported back a number of amendments favoring legislation to restrict the immigration of Chinese to this country.

MR. HARRIS, of Tenn., from the select committee to inquire as to the best means of preventing epidemic diseases, reported a bill to prevent the introduction of contagious diseases to the U. S., and to establish a bureau of public health.

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The Cipher Dispatches.

The Potter sub-committee at New York yesterday heard the testimony of Colonel W. T. Pelton in relation to the cipher dispatches. He admitted that there were negotiations for the purchase of the Florida returning board, but when Mr. Tilden heard of them he denounced them, and was very angry with Pelton, and declared he would sooner die than allow himself to be put in the presidential chair under false pretenses.

Pelton testified in regard to a telegram, signed by Marble, calling for \$200,000. Q - State exactly what conversation took place between you and Gov. Tilden on this matter. A - He was exceedingly annoyed, and denounced my action in the matter; in fact he was very severe. I left for Baltimore without his knowledge or consent, and he was much surprised at my return.

Chairman - Did Mr. Tilden have any idea you were performing or attempting to perform negotiations for buying the returning board? A - He had not the least idea of what was going on.

Q - Did you tell him anything about the Weed correspondence? A - I did not. The correspondence and arrangements were carried out solely by me.

Q - Do you mean to say that you had no conversation with Mr. Tilden on this matter until after your arrival from Baltimore? A - Yes, sir, that is the fact. Mr. Tilden was much annoyed. I do not know that he yet forgets it. He told me distinctly that he wanted no such work, and would sooner die than allow himself to be put in the presidential chair under false pretenses. When I subsequently showed the Governor the whole correspondence he was still more exercised, and denounced the whole proceeding emphatically.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7. - The Potter investigating committee resumed its session this morning. Nanton Marble was examined. His answers were given with marked precision, and his manner was thoroughly self-possessed. Said he went to Florida to look after the electoral vote. Could not say he went there under instructions of the democratic committee. Did not go at the request of Mr. Tilden or any one. Called on the Governor the evening he left, and simply bade him good bye. We had no conversation. Talked with Knodloch Blair and Fox on the subject of his journey. "I think I got a cipher from Mr. Pelton at the Everett House, and used it subsequently. Sent no telegrams and received none from Gov. Tilden. Addressed his telegrams to Pelton. My object in going to Florida was to take care of the electoral vote. Let me here suggest that the cipher dispatches as published in the Tribune, through Messrs. Harlow Bros. The Philadelphia time of steamers will resume their trips on Saturday.

This has been a bright and beautiful day, and the streets have been correspondingly gay. Joseph Stewart, an aged and well known citizen of Charles Co., Md., died on Sunday last. Embezzlement. - WASHINGTON, Del. Feb. 7. - Evan Rice cashier of the Wilmington and Brandywine National Bank, was arrested last night on a warrant issued by U. S. Rice is confined to his bed by nervous prostration and is in charge of a deputy marshal. He has been required to furnish \$15,000 bail.
