### Wit and Wisdom of Lord Chesterfield.

1. Pleasure is the rock upon which most young people split; they launch out with crowded sails in quest of it, but without a compass to direct their course, or reason sufficient to steer the vessel; for want of which pain and shame, instead of pleasure, are the returns of their voyage. Do not think that I mean to snarl at pleasure like a Stoic, or to preach against it like a person; no, I mean to point it out, and recommend it to you, like an Epicurean: I wish you a great deal, and my only view is to hinder you from mistaking it.  
2. I always naturally hated drinking; and yet I have often drunk, with disgust at the time, attended by great sickness the next day, only because I then considered drinking as a necessary qualification for a fine gentleman and a man of pleasure.  
3. I have been even absurd enough to swear, by way of adorning and completing the shining character which I affected; but this folly I soon laid aside, upon finding the guilt and indecency of it.  
4. The pleasure of learning of virtue, and of charity, is true and lasting pleasure, with which I hope you will be well and long acquainted.  
5. A showish blinding attracts the eye, and deceives the attention of everybody; but with the difference, that women, and men who are like women, mind the blinding more than the book; whereas men of sense and learning immediately examine the inside; and if they find that it does not answer the fiery on the outside, they throw it by with greater indignation and contempt.  
6. Attic salt seasoned almost all Greece, except Pontia, and a great deal of it was exported afterwards to Rome, where it was counterfeited by a composition called Urubity, which in some time was brought to very near the perfection of the original Attic salt. The more you are powdered with these two kinds of salt the better you will keep, and the more you will be relished.  
7. At a ball, a supper, or feast of pleasure, were a man to be solving, in his own mind, a problem in Euclid, he would be a very bad companion, and make a very poor figure in that company; or, if in studying a problem in his closet, he were to think of a minuet, I can apt to believe that he would make a very poor mathematician.  
8. Take care to be very clean, well dressed, and general; to have no disagreeable attitudes, no awkward tricks, which many people use themselves to, and then cannot leave them off.  
9. Take care to keep your teeth very clean by washing them constantly every morning and after every meal. This is very necessary, both to preserve your teeth a great while, and to save you a great deal of pain.  
10. My Lord Bacon says that a pleasing figure is a perpetual letter of recommendation: It is certainly an agreeable forerunner of merit, and smooths the way for it.  
11. Errors and mistakes, however gross, in matters of opinion, if they are sincere, are to be pitied, but not punished or laughed at. The blindness of the understanding is to be as much pitied as the blindness of the eye; and there is neither just nor reasonable cause for laughing at either. Charity bids us set him right in either case, by arguments and persuasions; but charity, at the same time, forbids either to rebuke, or to ridicule his misfortune. Every man's reason is, and must be his guide; and I may as well expect every man should be of my size and complexion, as that he should reason just as I do. Every man seeks for truth, but God only knows who has found it.  
12. Fear, instead of avoiding, invites danger; for concealed cowardice will insult known ones.  
13. If any one has had the misfortune to be in the wrong, there is something noble in frankly owning it; it is the only way of atoning for it, and the only way of being forgiven.  
14. A conformity and flexibility of manners is necessary in the course of the world; that is, with regard to all things which are not wrong in themselves. The versatile in genius is the most useful of all. It can turn instantly from one object to another, assuming the proper manner for each. It can be serious with the grave, cheerful with the gay, and trifling with the frivolous. He who is by all means to acquire this talent, for it is a very great one.  
15. Beware of professed friendships; receive them with great civility, but with great incredulity; and pay them with compliances, but not with confidence.  
16. Merit and good breeding will make their way everywhere.  
17. To do as you would be done by, is the surest method that I know of pleasing.  
18. Do not tell stories in company; there is nothing more tedious and disagreeable.  
19. Of all things, banish egotism out of your conversation, and never think of entertaining people with your own personal concerns or private affairs; though they are interesting to you they are tedious and impertinent to every one else. Besides that, you cannot keep one's own private affairs too secret.  
20. Women have, in general, but one object, which is their beauty; upon which scarce any flattery is too gross for them to swallow.—Compiled by the Virginia Courier.
