

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

It was officially announced at the Treasury in Washington yesterday that the Treasury Department had accepted subscriptions to the 4 percent bonds amounting to \$150,000,000, and that a call had been issued for the redemption of \$100,000,000 of 10-40 bonds leaving only about \$50,000,000 of this class of bonds, or any other bonds redeemable by the Treasury at pleasure, still outstanding subject to call.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, April 19.—The market to-day is quiet, with a shade better feeling. The receipts of Wheat have increased, and to day 2100 bushels were offered, and sold at 103, 105, 107 and 115, as to quality, the latter being for choice Lancaster. Corn is easy, with sales of 700 bushels at 45 for yellow, and 454 and 48 for white. One small lot of Rye brought 60. No Oats reported.

THE TRADE OUTLOOK.—The revival which is now beginning steadily to appear in business makes itself, perhaps, most apparent in the iron industry. From all parts of the country in which they are numerous we hear reports of a healthful state of activity in the foundries, and the promise that the year is to be one favorable to the trade. The starting up of this industry, which supplies the means and contrivances on which nearly all branches of manufactures so largely depend, is an encouraging indication that the wheels of our factories are again turning with rapidity.—N. Y. Sun.

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COUNTY ITEMS.—As the county election which takes place on the 22d of May next approaches the excitement increases. Washington township on Monday evening last held its conservative convention and elected as delegates to the county convention Messrs. Robert Walker, James Gross and George W. Donaldson. Mr. Thomas Jewell was nominated for county supervisor, Mr. Samuel Birch for constable, and Messrs. Grumwell, Aiken and Minor for magistrates of that district.

Mr. James R. Mead, superintendent of elections for Arlington district, has announced that there will be a meeting of the conservative voters of Arlington district, held at Walker school house on Wednesday, the 23d inst., to elect delegates to the county convention to make nominations for county officers.

John R. Johnston, esq., superintendent of Jefferson district, will, it is understood, call a convention on Friday, the 25th inst., for the purpose of electing delegates, shortly after which it is proposed to hold the nominating convention when the candidates will be announced.

Those in favor of "local option" in the county are preparing a programme and deciding upon a plan of action by which they feel confident they will be able to carry every district. The ministers of all the churches have been requested to preach at least one sermon in favor of the non-sale of intoxicating liquors. Several public meetings will be held prior to the election, and distinguished speakers will address the people in favor of the prohibition of the sale of liquors in the county.
