A Well Planned Suicide.
Dr. G. J. St. Louis, who was convicted of poisoning his wife in May, 1878, shot himself in his prison cell, at Omaha, Neb., on Friday, April 18th, which was the day appointed for his execution. It was reported at the time that the wound was not fatal, and Gov. Vance resented him until May 16th, but he grew rapidly worse and died on the 20th. On Thursday Father Greenbaum visited him to offer the consolations of the church, but found St. Louis in a wild state of mind. He was seated on the side of his bed dressed in an undershirt and drawers, with a handkerchief around his neck. He raved about messages coming the wrong way by telegraph, and as the night drew on became more wild and frantic. Soon after midnight he became somewhat quieter, and the reverend father undertook to prepare him for his death, which he avoided with evasive answers. He talked of his trial and the incidents done him.
At 1 o'clock on Friday morning Dr. St. Louis sent for the sister of his wife, Mrs. John Gleizes. Before she came he took a seat at a table and commenced to write to his father and mother. He only wrote a few lines and stopped, and then went and lay down on his bunk until she came. Mrs. Gleizes then talked very earnestly and pathetically about his fate, his orphaned children and his aged father and mother. He requested Mrs. Gleizes to have his body buried beside his wife, and gave her all his private papers and all his money, about \$150.
After Mrs. Gleizes left, the preparations for the execution were commenced. Dr. St. Louis was to be taken to Waboo to be executed. He asked if he must go, and raised to a sitting position. When asked if he wanted his boots, he replied "Yes." Just at this instant St. Louis suddenly drew a revolver from beneath the bed quilt, and in the twinkling of an eye placed it to his head and fired. Officer Greig leaped to his side at once bound, but was too late. The prisoner had laid his plan well, and the deed was accomplished within two seconds. He dropped back on the bed without uttering a groan. The wound that produced death is said to be the same as caused the death of President Lincoln. When Sheriff Johnson arrived, a dispatch was received from Gov. Vance ordering a delay of the execution.
Fearing the prisoner would attempt to commit suicide a strict watch had been kept on him. It is supposed the pistol was given St. Louis about 12 o'clock Tuesday night. It was a small pistol and could have been handed the prisoner who shaking hands. Two persons were arrested on suspicion of furnishing the weapon to the doctor. He left a statement in which he sought to demonstrate his innocence. The crime for which St. Louis was condemned to die was committed in 1877. About the middle of May, 1877, Mrs. St. Louis, who was the doctor's second wife, was suddenly taken ill. She recovered and was almost well, when an item appeared in the local paper to the effect that during a severe thunder shower a flash of lightning had penetrated into the sick room and had caused Mrs. St. Louis to suffer a relapse. She grew rapidly worse, and her death resulted on June 1.
During the last days of her illness she and her children were neglected by St. Louis, who spent most of his time in the companionship of Mrs. Bloomer. His unnatural behavior excited suspicion, and Walter S. Haines, Professor of Chemistry in Russ College, Chicago, was sent for. He made an autopsy twenty hours after Mrs. St. Louis' death, and reported, as the result of his analysis, that he had found evidences of arsenic in the system, from the presence of which death had probably resulted. At the request the Doctor testified to find 9,259 grains of arsenic, and it was further reported that an attendant had noticed St. Louis putting a powder in his wife's medicine. He was found guilty of murder at the request. The jury at his first trial disagreed, his defense being that his wife died from the shock by lightning. In April he was tried again and found guilty, and sentenced to be hanged April 18th, 1879. Dr. St. Louis was born in Wisconsin, and was 40 years old. He was educated for the priesthood, but ran away from his study, and went to Sioux City, where he was married at the age of 19. His wife died, and he went to Montreal and studied medicine. During the war he enlisted in a Chicago regiment. In 1864 he met with an accident, got an honorable discharge, and received a pension from the government to his death. He married again in 1869, and published a Catholic paper in Milwaukee for a year. Soon after moved to Fremont, Neb. He was a handsome man, light build, medium height and dark complexion. His second wife, and the one he murdered, was a small black eyed, thin faced woman, of positive temper and vivacious manner. They seemed to live happily, and on the day of his wife's death sent a series of verses to the local paper, to be published in his wife's obituary.
