LOCAL NEWS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES, May 16, 1879. For the Middle States rising and high barometer, brisk and high northerly winds, cold and generally clear weather, except in southern portion, local rains and with easterly winds.

THE CULPEPER SHOOTING AFFAIR.—George W. Jamison, charged with the shooting of D. M. Ream at Culpeper, Va., last week, was brought here by the Sheriff of that county on Saturday night, and placed in jail. A reporter of the Gazette called upon the prisoner this morning at the jail. He evinced a disinclination to talk on the subject of the shooting, but said that Jones was named and in the custody of Deputy Sheriff Ayr, when Ream fired upon him. He says that Ream accused him (Jamison) of having struck him, which was not true, and advanced upon the party in which he was standing, firing as he approached them. He further claims that Ream had been making incendiary speeches to the negroes and others during the entire day, had accused the county officials of being thieves, &c., and announced his intention to have them sent to the penitentiary. Jamison does not admit the shooting, but says that several persons fired at the same time. He expects to apply for bail in a few days. The officers who brought him here say that he can secure bail to any amount. The accused seems to be a very intelligent and quiet man, and is evidently unconscious of having done any wrong.

LARGE FREIGHT.—The steamer Jane Mosey of the Norfolk line on her down trip Friday evening carried one of the heaviest freights which has passed between the two cities for a long time. The steamer was detained about an hour getting in on board, although a large force of laborers were at work.

CONDITION OF JUDGE LOWE.—Dr. Bedford Brown, the attending physician, reports this morning that the condition of Judge Lowe is most favorable than it has been for the past three days, the violent fever, from which he has been suffering, having much abated since last evening.

THE MARKET opens dull and quiet. The receipts of Flour are light, but prices are unchanged. Wheat is off, and 1530 bushels sold at 112, 114, 115 and 117, as to quality. Corn is a shade better, and 830 bushels sold at 46 for white, and 43 for yellow. No Oats reported, and one small lot of Rye brought 70. Country produce is in light receipt. Butter and Eggs are dull at quotations. Chickens are 25c per doz low.

FLORAL AND FRUIT EXHIBITION.—The directors of the Alexandria and Fairfax Agricultural and Industrial Association held a meeting to day to transact on business of public interest. The Executive Committee met subsequently and made arrangements for a grand floral and fruit exhibition to be held at the Fair Grounds on Wednesday, June 4th. In another column will be found the notice of the secretary giving the rules and regulations adopted for the occasion. It is hoped that the gardeners in the city and surrounding country will make this exhibition a grand success.

REHEARING WANTED.—It will be remembered that some time since, Judge James Keith, in the Circuit Court of the city, in the case of John C. Graham vs. the V. M. & G. S. R. Co., decided that the claims for wages due employees of the road did not take precedence of the bonded debt secured by mortgages. Since that decision was rendered, there has been another decision in the Supreme Court of the United States in which a contrary opinion was held. In view of this fact Mr. John M. Johnson, representing the employees, this morning moved Judge Keith to grant a rehearing in the matter and the motion is held under advisement.

COUNTY COURT.—Judge Sangster presiding.—An account of Edmund Burke, Attorney for the Commonwealth, was allowed. Joseph Gardiner was relieved from the payment of capitation tax on account of bodily infirmity. The estate of Aquilla Emerson, was committed to the sheriff for administration de bonis non. Licenses to keep bar rooms were granted to S. Johnson, Annie Hillis, E. H. Willard, Elizabeth Raba and Wm. Prelip. Court adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

RESTITUTION.—In the Circuit Court of Alexandria county, just closed, Judge Keith presiding, the final report of Commissioner Kemper for \$39,142.04 in favor of Mr. W. N. McVeigh against John B. Alley and the representatives of Oakes Ames and Samuel Hooper, was confirmed. Messrs. Alley, Ames and Hooper were members of Congress from Massachusetts during the war, and got possession of a large portion of Mr. McVeigh's real estate in this city, which was withheld from him some fifteen years. This decree is for back rents, damages, &c., on a part of it.

YESTERDAY.—The weather yesterday morning was what interfered with the attendance at the various churches, but in the evening and night the congregations were large. Rev. E. A. Peck preached in St. Paul's church, both morning and evening, and in Christ church at night. Rev. Mr. Williams preached in the Methodist Episcopal church in the morning and in the M. E. church at night, both times to large congregations. In the evening, he delivered an address to the Y. M. C. A. prayer meeting, and will conduct revival services during the week in the M. E. church.

FARMER'S AND MECHANIC'S SAVINGS BANK.—The report of James H. Reid, receiver of the above bank, was filed in the Circuit Court to day. Among the matters reported upon is the sale of "Warwick," the farm of T. L. Sander, near this city, to Mr. Robert Porter. Mr. Frank Hume, of Washington, also filed a petition in opposition to the confirmation of the report, so far as it relates to the sale, which will be passed upon during the term.

DEMURRES.—The Macassar Gazette says: "Demurres, though evidently in the rear and 'yellow lead,' looks fresher than it has been looking for some years past. Mr. A. Lee McIntire has built a fine structure on Main street and Mr. M. J. Keys, jr., will shortly build him a dwelling house on the hill overlooking the town. The merchants in the old burg are complaining of dull times, though the fishing season had not fully closed."

SOUTHERN MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION.—A meeting of the Southern Memorial Association will be held at the Sun Boogie House to night, to make arrangements for decorating the graves of their departed comrades in the cemetery near this city. It is earnestly hoped that every ex-Confederate soldier in the city will be present and that the demonstration may be made worthy of the cause.
