A STEAMER STOPPED BY JELLYFISH. A correspondent of the Western Morning News gives an interesting description of the voyage of the Cradock. In the course of his observations, he says: "On September 21 the ship crossed the Equator early in the morning. On the following night a most curious circumstance occurred, which would hardly be credited. The ship was stopped by jellyfish, which, shortly after 1 o'clock, appeared in myriads as far as the eye could reach, and the thousands of millions of bodies floating upon the water gave the appearance of a snow from fairyland."

"Some of the fish got into the strainers of the condensers and blocked the holes so that the water could not enter, and the result was that the vacuum went down and then disappeared entirely. The condensers afterward became so heated that we had to stop steaming altogether, take off the strainers and clear them. Three attempts were made to steam, and each failed from the same cause. "In this way we were delayed on less than five hours, but at daybreak the fish sank and the ship was able to proceed. The same thing occurred again on the following night, the ship being delayed four hours."


