### ABILITY.

Webster tells us that ability "implies not only native vigor of mind, but that ease and promptitude of execution which arise from superior mental training." This would seem to indicate that the learned lexicographer believed that ability is an exceedingly rare quality, and in its highest sense this is true. But there is a business ability that is possible without the unusual advantage of "superior mental training"; an ability that is recognized, admired and emulated by all. It is a natural capacity and shrewdness; combined with business experience and energy; an adaptability to circumstances, a readiness and boldness in emergency, all regulated by a proper degree of caution. Still, men of this stamp are too rare for the needs of our national growth. While we unquestionably have much ability among us, yet, for the work before us, for the places to be filled—we speak always in a commercial sense—it is a matter of great difficulty to find capable men. The Nation of a year ago said: "Good material for lawyers, doctors, judges, editors, ministers, farmers and mechanics abounds among us; but men to whom we can entrust a large sum of money in some undertaking that is likely to pay, and manage that undertaking with prudence, sagacity and honesty, are extremely scarce, and their scarcity has been made increasingly manifest by the great growth of wealth in the last forty years. Indeed, it is literally true that we have more money than we know what to do with, and that we can find men fit to manage it. This is doubtless true; but if we deplore the fact, we do so unreasonably, because we ask for something very exceptional. These great enterprises require an ability which approaches genius, talents of the highest order—qualities glowingly described by "Christopher North"; "Mental perception clear, quick, acute as one's very eye; conception prompt, vivid and complete as if the past and the present were all one, and the shadow of reality as good as the substance; memory like a great mirror of plate glass, never dimmed either by damp or frost; judgment discriminating by lines of light all the relations of things and things which they are at once connected, and all separated; their way most wondrous and beautiful to behold." That is an ability pleasant to read about, but it is a rare gift to most of us. We must, then, be content with less brilliant qualifications and cultivate these sturdy, faithful, common sense faculties which we find in the average every day business man.

There is, however, and we presume always will be, one great difficulty in this matter of ability. There are too many people out of place, too many "round pegs in square holes." If it were possible to reconvert the various communities of the world with due regard for the fitness of things, thereby placing each person in his proper position, socially and commercially, we would be surprised at the amount of mediocrity that would develop into ability; but such a state of things would render impossible the oft quoted reproach, "The world knows nothing of its greatest men." As it now stands, the boy just from school is generally placed into the first opening—we admit it is usually a necessary—by hard work and prudence, saves a little money. He has no special ability, or apparent adaptability for the business, but in the course of time he brushes out on his own account. He takes no thought of local trade necessities; forgets, if he ever knew it, that "some ones, always a good many, is now, when crowds of woeful have made his saucy, harder than ever to win"; but he starts in business because others have done so, because it is the way of the world, perhaps because he is expected to do so; his venture terminates in helping to keep good the average of the ninety-five per cent. of failure. This is something of a test of his capacity in this direction, but it is unfair to accuse him of lack of actual ability.

Much of course depends on the application of ability. We constantly see men of capacity either frittering away their talents on unimportant matters, or applying them to unworthy aims detrimental to the best interests of society and commerce. Our professional swindlers are usually men of more than average ability—some of them commanding from us a sort of admiration for their shrewd, but peculiar, methods; but their success is not permanent; honest men are forced into an alertness which is a sure foil to their schemes. But ability in right place, properly applied to honest ends, is irresistible, and will force its way in spite of all obstacles.

If, after all, we find that we really lack ability let us substitute other qualities—hard work, economy, faithfulness, thoroughness, honesty. Indeed, we are not sure that we are always correct in our ideas of this matter. Is not ability often an aggregation of other qualities rather than a single, distinct endowment? Bulwer believed that "what men want is not talent, it is purpose; in other words, not the power to achieve, but the will to labor." Goethe believed not so much in brilliant talents as in sterling work.  
"If thou art anything, keep it still,  
In patience all will work out well,  
For you may place him where you will,  
The real man will always tell."
