[FOR THE ALEXANDRIA GAZETTE. **The Masonic Apron.** WOODVILLE, RAPP, Co., VA., Feb. 14, 1880. "Why seek ye the living among the dead?" This institution of Freemasonry is moral, not material—theological, not philosophic—Divine, and not human. Its whole aim is to impress upon the heart the great truths of the existence of an Omnipotent, Omniscient and Omnipresent God—of His having created man in a state of moral purity and physical perfection—of man's fall through unbelief from that state of purity—his ruin, demerit, inability to save himself, and his redemption through the vicarious sacrifice of the Son of God (styled in ancient Masonry, the Lion of the tribe of Judah). Of His appearance upon and debt of gratitude to His Creator for all the blessings of this life and the hope of a better hereafter; and the obligations he is under to love that Creator supremely and his neighbor as himself. This is pure and unadulterated Freemasonry, and there is not a single genuine degree in it, from the Entered Apprentice to the Royal Arch, whose whole teachings are not essentially (and almost literally) theological. Whilst operative Masonry has been more or less connected with true or speculative Freemasonry, and its implements made use of to some extent as moral symbols, or monitors; yet a careful study of the whole system will convince any unprejudiced mind that Freemasonry never could have originated from mere mechanical pursuits, and is not a matter how elevated in the scale of architectural science; but from any erroneous idea or spirit of covetousness, unless it be upon the widest assumption that the operative Masons of the early ages, if the world were not only devoutly pious men, but also well versed in the only true theology. I mention these degrees also because they alone appear to be genuine ancient Freemasonry, and are inherently and essentially typical degrees, whilst the Templar degrees emanated upon them since the Christian era are more properly denominated *Commemorative* degrees. The 23 degrees of the Scottish Rite and of the "High Fraternity," the 90 degrees of the Egyptian Rite (not to mention some 4,000 more claiming to be Masonic) are not true degrees of ancient Freemasonry; and whilst some of them, especially those of Christian teachings and precepts, are very beautiful and instructive, many of them are only philosophic and some are absolutely atheistical. If, then, genuine Freemasonry be the symbolism of God's relations to man and man's relations to His Creator, and also a witness to the truths of the Bible, it is simply "seeking the living among the dead" to search for its evidences in the idolatrous practices and architectural ruins of Babylon, Egypt, Greece and Rome, instead of turning to the pages of Divine Revelation and the authentic records of the rites and ceremonies of the Jewish people. It is true that there are many striking analogies between the ancient heathen mysteries and those of Freemasonry; but those analogies, to use the language of the Rev. George Oliver, D.D., of the Church of England, simply prove that the heathen mysteries originated from the same primitive and pure source with the Masonic, but have been so utterly perverted and debased to suit the passions and vices of the idolaters who practiced them as to be totally untrustworthy in the elucidation of the sciences and principles of Freemasonry. I am induced to make these remarks from the opinions advanced in the New York World and other public prints, by many prominent Masons in reference to the discovery of Masonic emblems at the base of the Egyptian obelisk, and their apparent willingness to submit the claims of Masonic antiquity to the revelations of idolatrous structures and observances. Our Masonic text books inform us that the lamb skin of Masonic apron is "an emblem of innocence, more ancient than the Golden Fleece or Roman Eagle and more honorable than the Star and Garter, or any other order that can ever be conferred by king, prince or potentate." Now, if this be true—and if Masonry be not a fraud it is true—then it is equally true that the Masonic apron was in use over 3,100 years ago—1,100 years before the reputed erection of the obelisk and 300 years before the building of Solomon's Temple; for it is evident that the allusion in the text books is not to the chivalric order of the Fleece, established by Philip, Duke of Burgundy, in 1429, or it would not be so strangely associated with the Roman Eagle, or standard of Rome, which has never been a knightly order in any country, and it would, besides, be more appropriate, in honoring a spurious antiquity, to compare it with the Order of the Garter, which antedates that of the Golden Fleece by 55 years. The date referred to, then, is that of the Arconic expedition; and if the conjectures of some of the learned be true, that Jason's perilous sea voyage is but a figure of Noah and the ark floating over the world of waters, then the Masonic apron is antediluvian. If it is antediluvian then we must seek for its analogue in some antediluvian observance, and as the Bible is the only authentic history of the world before the flood, we must find it there or not find it at all. Let us try it and see what is the result. The Psalmist says, "Blessed is he . . . whose sin is covered . . . unto whom the Lord imputeth not iniquity." When Adam sinned he tried to cover his nakedness and guilt by an apron of fig leaves. The effort, however, was vain; and we are told (Gen. 1. 21) that God covered his nakedness and guilt with the skins of beasts, which (theologians and commentators inform us), taken from those animals which God had commanded Adam to offer as a typical expiatory sacrifice. Now if we go to notice of the kind of animals sacrificed from the first acceptable and accepted sacrifice recorded in the Bible, (that of Abel), the animals slain were *beasts*, and Adam was clothed in the lamb skin as an emblem of imputed innocence and his sin was covered. Here, then, we have the true origin of the Masonic Apron, to which in after ages the blue border was added (Numbers 15. 37-39) as a warning against idolatry. It seems to be true that among all nations, the lamb has been considered an emblem of innocence; but this cannot arise from any manifest quality in the lamb itself, inasmuch as the same

innocuous appearance and habits are to be found in the kid, the calf and other young and harmless quadrupeds. Nor is there such a marked difference between the dove and other varieties of non-carnivorous birds as to cause it to be regarded as the symbol "par excellence" of gentleness and purity. Then these qualities must have been ascribed to them from some commanding proto cause, which cause we find, also in the Divine scheme of the atonement by the offering of the Lamb of God, slain from the foundation of the world for man's redemption. Again, it is asserted that the Masonic apron is more honorable than any distinction which can ever be conferred upon man by any king, prince or potentate. Now, it is not to be supposed that any number of human beings, possessed of intelligence, and the virtues of modesty and humility, would lay claim to such pre-eminence and exaltation as to declare that they could confer honors far greater than any, or all of earth's most distinguished rulers. Fools might arrogate such super-excellence, but wise men never. The natural inference, then, to be drawn from the superior dignity of the Lambskin to any other distinction is, that it was the gift of the Lord of Lords and King of Kings. The proposition will admit of no other interpretation, and is too patent to demand further elucidation. Thus considered, the Masonic apron is a truly glorious emblem, entitled to our highest consideration, and well calculated to fill the heart of every true Mason with gratitude and love to God; inspire him with the three great theological virtues, Faith, Hope, and Charity, thus bridging the chasm which sin has interposed between this world and heaven, and securing to all who sincerely accept and wear it a happy transit from the weary labors of earth, to the glad refreshment of the blessed in the celestial Grand Lodge of Glory above. I fear, however, that there are many prominent and so-called *bright* members of our order who will scold and deride these ideas, and who would pride themselves more upon establishing a direct and unbroken connection between Freemasonry and the heathen mysteries, than with the inspiration of the only true and ever living Jehovah; but so far as I am able to judge, after having studied all the recognized degrees in this and other countries, and being somewhat honored by the fraternity here and elsewhere, if Freemasonry be not theological, pneumatical and typical of the Divine plan of human salvation; then it is a cheat and a fraud in all its pretensions and unworthy the serious consideration of any rational and intelligent being.
