The Battle of Yorktown.
A large number of French citizens met in
the rooms of the Cercle du Harmonie Tues-
day afternoon to complete arrangements for a
formal petition to the French government ask-
ing for an official representation at the celebra-
tion of the centennial anniversary of the battle
of Yorktown, which is to take place in October,
1881. M. Kintzer presided, M. Charlier
read an account of last year's celebration at
Yorktown. He was the New York delegate
on that occasion, and gave some interesting
information regarding the manner in which it
was proposed to commemorate the next anni-
versary of the famous fight. The Governor
of Virginia desires to have a meeting in this city
of the Governors and representatives of every
State in the Union on the 30th of April next.
At this meeting it is proposed to have all the
details of the celebration agreed upon. The
only point settled was that the celebration
should occupy three weeks. It is intended to
run special boats and steamers from New York,
Philadelphia, Norfolk, Boston and other lead-
ing points. Colonel Payton, of Pennsylvania,
intended, M. Charlier, said, to make a tour
through the country for the purpose of organiz-
ing Yorktown tea parties. The proceeds of
these entertainments would be given to aid the
State of Virginia to pay her share toward the
celebration. M. Millard made a short speech
and moved a resolution requesting M. Leon
Chatteau to represent the sense of the meeting
to the President, Senators and Deputies of
France. The resolution asked France to send a
regiment of infantry, a squadron of cavalry, a bat-
tery of artillery and her best military bands to
assist in the celebration. The resolution was
adopted unanimously, after which M. Leon
Chatteau made a long speech on the subject.
He stated that France would not
send a man to America without a formal
invitation from the American government.
The present petition to the French govern-
ment was merely in anticipation of the invita-
tion which would be extended beyond a
doubt by the government. Nearly a century
ago, he said, Congress passed a resolution
dealing a monument to be erected at Yorktown
in memory of the great fight. After the gov-
ernment had asked France to join in the cele-
bration it is proposed to ask for an ap-
propriation to carry out this order of Congress,
which is still in force. M. Chatteau said he was
an enthusiastic admirer of the old fashioned
American. He undertook to write a history of
the Revolutionary War once, but became so
excited in his labor that he was prostrated with
cerebral fever before it was concluded. He was
in favor of sending a fine military body to
America as proposed. The Statue of Liberty,
by M. Bartholdi, ought to be erected by 1881,
before French troops on their return from
Yokotown could stand at New York long enough
to assist at its inauguration. This, he said,
would make a grand and touching spectacle,
when the arms and colors of the two great republics
should mingle in friendship. After a short de-
bate over the means of raising funds in America
for the completion of the Statue of Liberty the
meeting adjourned.—N. Y. Herald.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S JEALOUSY.—Queen Vic-
toria reached the throne—adorable, charming,
Crowned at Westminster when just sixteen,
she married the husband of her choice—one of
these Coburgs, who were the handsomest men
of their time. She loved so passionately that
she poisoned her own life and that of her hus-
band, who was a martyr to her idolatry. Her
jealous imagination saw infidelity everywhere
and always; ladies once her dear friends be-
came odious to her. She drove away the ladies
of honor, and at a Court ball, she slapped the
face of a pretty girl to whom Prince Albert had
addressed a few words. A day came when
death called this husband, so fondly loved, and
on that day died, also, England's Queen. The
hero had gone out of the body of the woman,
and nothing was left. Everything seemed to
have been brutally torn away, and as great
years afterwards, they discussed a regency in
Parliament. The motion was defeated; but
after that the living corpse of her who had been
Victoria came, from time to time, to open Par-
liament. The English, who respect the dy-
nasty, lowered themselves before the eternal
grief of this old woman, for they saw still the
crown of the queen above the widow's cap.
But she never smiled save when, perchance,
the name of Prince Albert was mentioned.
