

LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES. April 8, 1880. For the Middle States increasing cloudiness, possibly followed by rain areas, warmer, north-west to northeast winds, followed by stationary or falling barometer.

REPUBLICAN WARD MEETINGS.—The Republicans of the city met in their respective wards last night and elected delegates to a county convention to be held at the colored Old Fellows' Hall, in this city, on Saturday next at 12 m. The county convention will select two delegates to the State convention, which meets in Staunton on the 21st instant, and elect delegates to the Chicago convention. The meetings in some of the wards were quite spirited, and the light seemed to be between Grant and Bisbee, as there were no other candidates named.

The first Ward meeting was held in Zion Church, with Ben Corum chairman and Thos. Lee Secretary. The following delegates, all from Ward No. 1, were elected: W. P. Graves, Ben Corum, Augustus Ramsey, Thomas Taccell, Richard Tate, Peter Smith and Henry Newman. Alternates, Geo. Turner, Anthony Bowman and John B. Lee.

The meeting in the Second ward was held in the house of Henry Lewis, colored, near the court. Lewis presided, and Albert Luzzo, colored, acted as secretary.

The call for the meeting was read by George H. Hays, after which the following delegates were elected: Henry Lewis, Geo. W. Hobday, Henry Johnson, Geo. W. Franklin, R. L. Singleton, and Wm. Jackson, colored, and F. J. Corbett, white.

A colored man asked if it was certain that Mr. Corbett would serve as a delegate, and was informed by another colored man that he thought Mr. C. would, but that he did not see any reason to take his place in the convention.

F. M. Johnson, Geo. Grayson and Albert Luzzo were elected alternates.

A discussion then ensued in regard to instructing the delegates, in which it was clearly revealed that Bisbee was the first choice of those present, but it was finally decided to allow the delegates to go to the convention unincumbered, and the meeting adjourned.

The meeting in the Third ward was held in the Court House, and was largely attended. Ralph Thompson presided, and Louis E. Payne acted as secretary. The following delegates were elected: James M. Buckner, Ralph Thompson, Henry Bailey, McKenzie Ware, T. J. Hedin, Judge Williams, Jas. Ross, John Scroggins, Harriet King, Charles Jackson, Alfred Jones, R. D. Beckley, Louis B. Payne.

The meeting in the Fourth ward was held in the colored Old Fellows' Hall and was largely attended.

After a simple organization was effected by the election of R. H. Lyles as chairman and George Monday secretary.

The following delegates to the convention were then elected, amidst the greatest confusion: B. H. Gaines, Sista Madella, R. L. Mitchell, A. W. Harris, John Montgomery, H. L. Harris, and John H. Madella.

Before the result of the election was announced, the delegates were objected to on the ground that they were all colored men, and a motion was made to reconsider the vote by which they were elected, but the chairman declined to entertain the motion, and his decision was appealed from, but Lyles held out firm.

While the meeting was wrangling over the motion to reconsider, John A. Seaton entered the hall, and the crowd yelled for Seaton.

Lyles vacated the chair, as the meeting had transgressed the business for which it had been called.

John A. Seaton then addressed the meeting, counselling harmony and urging them not to draw the color line, &c. He was then called to the chair that Lyles had vacated, and the vote by which the above delegates were elected was reconsidered, and the following new set chosen: L. C. O'Neal, John A. Seaton, A. W. Harris, R. L. Mitchell, John Montgomery, H. L. Harris, and John H. Madella.

The delegates were then instructed to vote for Grant men to the State convention, and John A. Seaton was endorsed as the grand and nominal candidate for Congress from this district.

The meeting then adjourned with cheers for Grant and Seaton.

The meeting in Jefferson District was held at the School House with Henry L. Hahn, chairman, and W. C. Reeves, secretary. The following are the delegates elected: H. L. Hahn, W. A. Rowe, Beep, Austin J. B. Smith and W. C. Reeves; alternates, W. H. Lamm and George Kinsom.

PRESBYTERY OF WASHINGTON CITY.—The second and last day's session of the spring meeting of the Presbytery of Washington City, which with the old First Presbyterian Church, in this city, is concluded, was held yesterday morning at the New York Avenue Church, Washington, with Rev. Mr. Grimke, the newly elected moderator, in the chair.

After devotional exercises the several standing committees were reported.

Rev. Dr. John H. Paxton and Dr. S. H. Howe were elected delegates to the General Assembly, and Rev. S. Samuel Murdoch, Dr. Paxton, and R. V. F. M. Todd, for Dr. Howe, were elected moderators. On the part of the ruling members, Rev. T. G. Jones and Abraham D. Jones were elected delegates, and Mr. J. D. W. Moore, for Mr. Jones, and Mr. J. T. Swanson, for Mr. D. Jones, were appointed alternates.

THE THOMPSON CASE.—JUDGMENT OF THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THIS CITY AFFIRMED.—A dispatch from Richmond announces that the Court of Appeals has unanimously affirmed the judgment of the Circuit Court of this city in the case of Thompson vs. R. J. Dainoffield, in which the damages were assessed at \$8,000. This was an action brought by D. G. Thompson against Messrs. R. J. Dainoffield and George W. Harrison for injuries received from a pistol shot, fired by Geo. W. Harrison, on the night of the 5th of March, 1877, making the amputation of Thompson's leg necessary. Thompson died last Saturday, leaving a widow and one or two children. The counsel for Thompson were Judge A. W. Chilton, Judge Chas. E. Stuart, Messrs. H. O. Cloughton and Edmund Burke, and the counsel for Mr. Dainoffield were Judge Robertson, Messrs. S. Ferguson Beach and J. M. Johnson.

CORPORATION COURT.—Judge A. W. Chilton presiding.—In the case of Thos. Warner, tried yesterday for burglary, the Court set aside the verdict of the jury and granted a new trial, and set the trial for Monday next.

A MUCH FRIED MAN.—Thomas Warner, who was convicted yesterday of entering the dwelling house of Mrs. Catharine Usher with intent to commit larceny, and his term of imprisonment fixed at three years in the penitentiary, was this morning upon the motion of Messrs. A. W. Armstrong and Leonard Marbury, his counsel, granted a new trial. The trial yesterday was the second time the case has been before the court, the jury in the first having failed to serve upon a verdict. His third trial is set for Monday.

ARRESTED ON SUSPICION.—An old colored man from Fauquier, giving his name as Walter Walker, was arrested this morning by Officer Smith, on suspicion of having obtained wrongfully some clover seed and orchard grass, which he had in his possession. The old man stated that on his way to this city he met a colored man near Broad Run station, with the seed and orchard grass, and purchased them from him, thinking he could sell them here, and "make a little something." He was released this evening, no one coming forward to claim the seed and grass.

THE FISH TRADE.—A gentleman from the fishing shores on the lower Potomac this morning, said that the fishermen were not doing as well as they expected when the season first opened, but on the whole there was not much reason to complain, as the prospects were better, so far, than they were this time last year. Since yesterday's report three thousand shad and forty thousand herrings have arrived at Fishtown, and sold as follows: Shad, \$12 1/2 to \$13; herrings, \$8 1/2. The supply of tucen fish is sufficient to supply the demand.

HYDRAULIC STEAM FIRE CO.—The regular monthly meeting of the Hydraulic Steam Fire Company was held Tuesday night with R. L. Carre in the chair and John Linnon secretary. A vote of thanks was tendered Messrs. Harlow & Bro., Mr. James Chatham and Hon. S. C. Neale, for the favors rendered the company in the rebuilding of the engine, &c.; also to Mr. Joseph H. V. Moore, contractor, and Mr. J. Frank Taylor, driver, for the splendid appearance made by the engine and apparatus of the company in said parade.

J. C. DECKER AGAIN.—J. C. Decker was arrested this morning and brought before Justice Thompson, charged with a breach of the peace in threatening to shoot one Charles E. Kennedy, his man Friday, but between whom and himself a "coolness" has existed of late. After hearing the evidence in the case Justice Thompson put the accused J. C. Decker under bonds in the sum of \$100 to keep the peace for two months and required him to pay the cost of the case.

TEMPERANCE.—The Women's Christian Temperance Union held a large and interesting meeting yesterday afternoon in the rooms of the Alexandria Reform Club.

A large crowd assembled at Strepia Hall last night to listen to an address by Dr. McKendry Riley. The address was a very interesting one.

BOATMEN'S STRIKE.—A dispatch from Cumberland says: "Boatmen held a meeting here to-night and decided to hold out for \$125 freight to Georgetown, and appointed committees to confer with the coal companies to meet."

The alarm of fire last night, about seven o'clock, which brought out the entire fire department, was caused by the explosion of a lamp at the residence of Mr. Wm. A. Morris, on Lee street. The fire expired did not go into service, as the flames were extinguished immediately. The damage caused was very slight.

A. M. & O. R. R.—The Norfolk Virginia publishes a comparative statement of the business and the revenue of the Atlantic, Mississippi and Ohio railroad for the five months of October, November, December, January and February of the years 1878-'79 and 1879-'80, from which we learn that the traffic East and West, through and local, for the present year is an increase over that of the corresponding period of 1878-'79. The increase in through tonnage is 27,719 tons, and in revenue \$113,173.90; in way tonnage 18,093 tons, and in revenue \$50,934.37—making a total increase in tonnage of 45,812 tons, and in revenue \$144,268.27.
