

LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES, April 13, 1880. For the Middle Atlantic States warmer, partly cloudy weather, followed in the northern portions by rain areas, southerly winds and falling barometer.

HOUSE BREAKING.—A few days ago some thief entered a vacant house on Columbus street and carried off all the gas fixtures and water pipes, and about two weeks ago the synagogue of the Hebrew congregation was entered and some of its fixtures stolen. "Who are the thieves?" has been the question. One property owner went so far as to employ a private watchman to look after a particular house, and yet that same house was entered it is supposed early in the morning, the thieves having watched their opportunity, and everything that was portable carried off. There is no one to blame for these depredations for there are not policemen enough in this city to watch every vacant house in the city, and if there were it would be unreasonable to expect them to do so, for where a man is inclined to steal, he can always find an opportunity. George Swensberry was arrested this morning by the police authorities and brought before the Mayor, charged with breaking into a vacant dwelling house owned by Mr. Michael Pannoy, on Queen street, between Fairfax and Royal, and stealing therefrom the gas fixtures and water pipes. He was committed to jail for further examination, as he claimed that the articles found in his possession were purchased by him from another man.

THE COAL TRADE.—During this season 47 boats have left Cumberland, the majority of them carrying coal for the consolidation company to Williamsport. The Cumberland line says to Georgetown. Several boats carrying coal for J. P. Agnew & Co. went through to Alexandria. The rates paid to Williamsport were 62 cents per ton; to Georgetown \$1.14 and to Alexandria \$1.30. The boats went out on black mountains. The New Central, Consolidation, American and Maryland coal companies, and other principal shippers by canal, are not willing to pay more than \$1.10 per ton and are therefore not shipping coal by the canal. The same paper also says: On Wednesday the boat outward returned from Alexandria and was the first boat to make a round trip, the entire length of the canal, this season. She left as an individual boat and was weeks on her trip, having met with several delays on the way. The boat Exchange was the second to make the trip and was loaded with coal, consigned to the Washington Gas Light Company. The Alexandria Canal is reported to be navigable. The boat Richard Menzies arrived from Cumberland via Rock Creek, to Messrs. John T. Agnew & Co. yesterday.

Campbell, editor and proprietor of the Virginia Commonwealth, is visiting relatives in this city. Miss Clara G. Houshkin, sister of Dr. J. O. Houshkin, of Warrenton, is in the city visiting friends.

DELEGATES AND CHURCH OFFICERS ELECTED.—At a meeting of the vestry of Christ, Episcopal Church yesterday afternoon, Messrs. Reuben Johnson and Peter W. Jones were elected wardens, Mr. W. J. Estlin, treasurer, and Mr. E. S. Ledbetter, secretary. Mr. W. C. Yeaman was elected delegate and D. M. Blackford alternate to the Council of the diocese of Virginia, which meets in Petersburg on the third Wednesday in May. The vestry of Grace Church has elected Messrs. Wm. A. Snoot and Charles King wardens of that church, and Messrs. Wm. A. Snoot, delegate, and James H. Muir, alternate, to the Council. The vestry of St. Paul's Church will meet to-night for the purpose of electing wardens of the church and a delegate to the Council.

SUIT FOR BREACH OF CONTRACT.—Mrs. Susan Tronson appeared before Justice Thompson to-day and swore out a warrant against a young man charging him with a breach of contract, in not paying to her daughter \$25, as he promised to do, for the support of her daughter's infant child. The case was tried this evening before Justice Thompson, who gave judgment in favor of the complainant for the amount claimed, \$25.

FIRE AT RAVENSWORTH.—Capt. Robert E. Lee, who owns part of the Ravensworth estate, one mile south of Prince Georges station, and nine miles from this city, had two hundred parcels of fencing and thirty cords of wood, besides a large amount of growing timber, destroyed by fire yesterday. The fire is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary.

SINKING FUND COMMISSION.—The Sinking Fund Commissioners met to-day this morning in the Auditor's office and ordered that notices be given to bidders and whitewashers that sealed proposals would be received for painting and whitewashing that part of the market house building occupied by the butchers and hucksters.

ACCIDENT.—Henry A. Simmons, a young man employed on the steam tug Kate, running fish from the lower fishing shores, fell down a couple of steps on that boat yesterday while on his way down the river, and sprained his back. When the boat arrived here to-day he was unable to walk, and had to be conveyed to his home, on Franklin street, in a carriage.

FIRE.—The alarm of fire this morning was caused by the burning of the roof of the frame house opposite the new block, foot of Wolfe street, partially destroyed by fire Saturday evening last. The fire department was not called, as the flames were extinguished immediately by some of the hands engaged at the above named establishment. Some excitement was excited last night by the burning of a curtain in the window of J. Stabler & Co's, apothecary store, on King street, which caught from the gas, but the flames were smothered before any damage was done. No alarm was sounded.

TEMPERANCE.—The arrangements for the grand rally of the Alexandria Reform Club, in the M. E. Church, next Friday night, are nearly all completed, and the meeting is said to be a very interesting one. The colored Reform Club held a large meeting at the Third Baptist Church last night, with Rev. Fields Cook in the chair and R. D. Ruffin secretary. After the transaction of some routine business, addresses were made by Dr. Joseph Bates and Mr. James Curcigham, of Washington.

ARRESTED.—George Newland and Robert Ballenger were arrested this evening by Officer Lawler, on a warrant sworn out by Mr. Booth Cook, charging them with throwing overboard the edition of a weekly paper printed in Washington but circulated in this city while being brought to Alexandria by an agent. They were carried before Justice Thompson, and bailed in the sum of \$500 each for their appearance to-morrow evening at 3 o'clock.

WHIPPED.—Ellisworth Cooper and Frank Parson, the two colored boys arrested yesterday by Officer Coleman, charged with stealing lead and copper from the ship yard, were tried this morning at the Mayor's Office, found guilty, and sentenced to be whipped, which sentence was executed at once, the former receiving thirty lashes and the latter twenty.

FROM WASHINGTON. Special Correspondence of the Alex. Gazette. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 13, 1880. The Senate Finance Committee to-day agreed to report favorably upon the bill for the relief of certain tobacco merchants of Lyceburg, who, with the consent of the internal revenue officer, sold tobacco to a speculator with the understanding that he was to pay the tax on it, but who afterwards compelled to pay that tax when the speculator failed to pay it. The committee also agreed to report favorably upon a bill creating a commission of nine members to take into consideration the whole subject of tariff, but adversely upon the bill for the creation of a commission to inquire into and report upon the manufacture and sale of liquor. These bills were subsequently reported to the Senate. The Education Committee of the House agreed to-day to report the resolutions they adopted last week, with the reports thereon—on the effect that Mr. Washburne of Minnesota, was not entitled to the seat he holds, and the other that Mr. Donnelly, his contestant, was also without a title to it. The subcommittee of the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds agreed to-day to report favorably to the whole committee bills appropriating \$125,000 for a public building at Galveston, \$100,000 for one at Frankfort, \$200,000 for one at San Francisco, \$75,000 for one at Dallas, \$50,000 for one at Jefferson, \$50,000 for one at Oxford. At the meeting of the Committee on Indian Affairs, Mr. Hendon, a clerk in the Indian Bureau, appeared and suggested amendments to the Indian appropriation bill, by which the appropriation of that bill would be increased \$600,000. The President of the Panama Railroad Co. appeared before the Committee on Postoffice, and recommended a subsidy for a mail steamship line between the U. S. and Central and South America.

The following charges were made in the Virginia postoffice to-day: Geo. W. Keller, assistant postmaster at Mine Run Furnace, Shenandoah county, vice A. J. Boyer, resigned; a postoffice was established at Occida, Franklin Co., with S. W. Williams as postmaster, and one at Babby, Middlesex Co., with J. M. Revere as postmaster.

The intention of Mr. James Barber, of Culpeper county, Va., one of the original and conscientious reformers of that State, to support the nomination of the Cicero Anti Convention, whoever he may be, while just what was expected of him, affords much gratification to the numerous Virginians now here. Mr. Barber is one of the most influential men among the readers' party, and his determination not to let his opinions on the State debt question affect his loyalty to the national democracy will unquestionably produce a beneficial effect.

The Senate Expenditure Committee to-day examined Messrs. Porter and Hicks and a colored man named Falker, all from Louisiana, and whose testimony was of the same character as that which has preceded it—namely, that the negroes were not free from Louisiana under the impression that they would better their condition, and that this impression was produced by false representations.

Senator Withers has returned from Wytheville, which he has been for some time past in attendance upon his sick wife, and was in his seat to-day. The condition of his wife, her numerous friends in Alexandria will be glad to learn, has improved considerably.

The Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs was considering the proposed new Belgian treaty to-day, but came to no conclusion thereon. The general impression about the Spofford-Kalshoff election case now seems to be that that case will not be further considered in the Senate any more this session, but the reported intention of the democratic members of the Election Committee to resign, if that the case is not credited, for nothing to warrant it was said in the last caucus, and Mr. Saulsbury, the chairman of the committee, went home immediately after that caucus and has not returned since.

The Sixth Massachusetts Regiment, the regiment that was fired on when passing through Baltimore on the 19th of April, 1861, has been invited to visit this city on the coming anniversary of that day, and has accepted the invitation. It will be entertained by the Grand Army of the Republic at that point.

At the hour of noon to-day, when the opening prayer should have commenced by the chaplain, Rev. Dr. Bullock, who was ready, there were but two senators present, and the President pro tem, Mr. Thurman, said, with a usual, "and the prayer did not commence until a quarter of two." In this connection it may be stated that Mr. Wheeler intends to commence his vacation on the 1st of May, and as nearly the half of April has gone, it is thought probable that he may not return again this session.

The trial of Smothers, the negro who brutally outraged Miss Liles, commenced in the original court here to-day. The examination of the witnesses is conducted in the presence of a small number of spectators, only about twenty-five being admitted.

Mr. John Bassett, of Alexandria, has been appointed clerk of the agency of the Virginia Midland railroad in this city, vice Mr. Max Daniel appointed agent.

With regard to the Curio-Yeum contested election case it is supposed the House will declare the seat vacant and order another election. The democrats are in favor of this, and the republicans will not oppose it, as they are not favorable to republicans when they consider white-washed democrats.

LOUSE REVETTES. The City Council will meet to-night. See notice of City Treasurer M. B. Harlow, in another column. The Pioneer Mills received a parcel from another column. Col. M. D. Ball, Collector of Customs, at Alaska, will deliver a lecture at Willard's Hall, Washington, on Alaska, next Thursday evening.

NEWS OF THE DAY. Mrs. Mary Schwartz, of Philadelphia, who was bitten by a spitz dog during Christmas week, died Saturday at great agony from hydrophobia. Mr. John Hurst, a well known citizen of Baltimore, a prominent Methodist, and president of the National Exchange Bank, died last night, in the 73rd year of his age. Mayor Lattrobe's veto of the resolution to permit the erection of a Confederate monument on Euclid square, Baltimore, was last night sustained by the City Council. Gen. Grant was formally welcomed at Vicksburg, Miss., yesterday. In his response he said he knew nothing could again array the blue against the gray; believed the day of general prosperity was dawning, and that the next few years would do more toward making a wretched people than the past had done.

At the town election in Edgefield, S. C., yesterday, an altercation occurred in which Dr. W. E. Bland and A. A. Glover were shot in the bowels, and probably mortally wounded. A. A. Clisby was shot in the thigh in two places. The quarrel grew out of the proposed reduction of the whiskey tax, and occasioned a general row at the polls. All the wounded persons are whites.

An adjourned meeting of Protestant clergymen of Washington was held yesterday morning, to receive the report of a committee appointed to consider the alleged intention of the National Board of Health to license prostitution. The report of the committee, embracing resolutions protesting against the passage of any law by Congress permitting the licensing of the social evil, was adopted.
