Letter from Gordonsville.

(Correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette.)

GORDONSVILLE, VA., June 12, 1880.—The closing exercises of Gordonsville Female Institute began Friday evening, with a fine display of drawings and paintings by the art class (Miss Parker, of South Carolina, teacher). Scores of persons from the town, surrounding country, and neighboring cities, who were present, appeared to enjoy these beautiful specimens of art in oil and water colors and crayon. About 100 pictures were placed on exhibition. The music by the class in that department was fine; given at intervals during the evening. Saturday afternoon, from 5 to 7 o'clock, a matinee and exercise in esthetics. On Sunday evening the annual sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Petre, of Charlottesville. Monday the celebration of the Young Ladies' Gynaeptrological Literary Society will be addressed by Rev. C. S. Backwell, of Norfolk. On Tuesday evening the grand instrumental and vocal concert. On Wednesday evening the commencement exercises proper will come off, when Rev. T. T. Eaton, D. D., of Petersburg, will deliver the annual address.

Approx. a few days ago the principal of this institute was elected president of the Female College in South Carolina. This, your correspondent has been informed, is the college par excellence a few years ago by the venerable Peter Connor, of New York, and turned over to a large South Carolina association. It has not yet transpired what Dr. Vaughan will do; but he has been urged to accept there is no doubt, but we know he declines to do so.
