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LOCAL MATTERS.

THE GULFAR WELLS. SAH.—There is now no doubt but that the steamer Gulfar will make the voyage to the Arctic region. The vessel is now lying at the foot of 7th street wharf, Washington, and the work of loading and provisioning her was completed last night. She will be ready to sail some time this week.

The expedition will sail direct for Lady Franklin bay, without stopping until the coast of Greenland is reached, and it is proposed to depend mostly on the sails for propulsion and to raise the coal to deposit at the colony stations. Supplies for the crew have been prepared for six months, although it is not expected that the voyage will take half that time. When the steamer arrives at her destination, the wooden houses are to be immediately erected and the colony put on a permanent basis. After seeing them well started, the vessel will return for more stores and new recruits for the colony—the latter taking the place of the former, who are to be advanced further toward the north pole.

At the meeting of the Cabinet officers, in Washington, yesterday, the suitability of the Gulfar for the Arctic expedition was again discussed. Secretary Thompson thought she was wholly unfit for the purpose, while Secretary Ramsey was of the opinion that she was a safe and staunch ship. Another objection was raised, when the vessel question as to her soundness will be finally decided. If the government refuses to accept the steamer for the trip the expedition will be made at private expense.

ENGINEER YOUNG SUSPENDED FOR THIRTY DAYS.—A meeting of the Board of Fire Wardens—Messrs. J. R. Snoot, Chairman, G. E. French, secretary, and Stephen A. Green and E. E. Curbert—was held last night at the hall of the Relief Block and Ladder Company, to investigate the charge of disobedience of orders, preferred by Chief Engineer E. S. Leadbeater, against Joseph H. Young, engineer of the Hydraulic Steam Fire Company, in putting his engine out of service without permission. All parties interested being present the investigation was entered upon by statements of the parties in chief, and the examination of witnesses. After a full and patient hearing of the case, the warden's jury met this morning at 8 o'clock for the further consideration of the subject. Pursuant to adjournment a meeting was held, at the order of Board was directed to notify J. H. Young, engineer of the steamer Hydraulic, of his suspension for thirty days, without pay, for disobedience of orders, and to turn over the property of the Fire Department under his charge to Wm. G. Simpson, appointed to fill his place during that time.

SAD SPECTACLE.—If persons disposed to fret at every little annoyance would think for a moment of the myriads of human beings who are daily called to endure much more trying ordeals and afflictions, it would doubtless cause many a fretful knee to be strengthened, and hands which habitually hang down would be held aloft in thankfulness and the slight inconveniences, which attend all things would be endured patiently and with a Godly spirit. Late yesterday evening in a misty rain, there might have been seen a middle-aged colored man trudging along with down cast and sorrowful look toward his humble abode at the bottom of Wiedmull Hill. Under his arm he carried a coffin, of the commonest kind, which he had just purchased for one of his deceased little ones, and as he heaved and poverty stricken parent, with his ghastly burden, obliged by his indigence to act as undertaker for his own offspring, passed along, he excited the sympathy of all whom he met.

RELICS OF BYE GONE DAYS.—The two old trees at the northwest corner of Royal and Duke streets are objects which vividly recall to mind the school boy days of scores of citizens. These trees are all that now remain on that corner to bear witness of the fact that there once stood on it a school house, teeming with life, and around which in merry glees, oblivious to care and anxiety, hundreds now scattered throughout the world whiled many happy hours away in the various modes of juvenile diversion. What renders these relics, though perishing, mementoes of especial interest to former students is the fact that their trunks are almost entirely covered for many feet with letters, initials of names, the possessors of which cut them deep in the bark a quarter of a century ago, and which now appear in bold relief. While the task of determining what names or some of the characters of the former would be as difficult as the deciphering of hieroglyphics on an Egyptian sarcophagus, yet in numerous cases the lettering is legible and the name borne by the "cave" easily ascertained.

THE CANAL.—The damage to the gates at Brodigan's lock, on the Chesapeake and Ohio canal, near Cumberland has been repaired, and boats are now passing as usual. There were a large number of boats delayed by the accident, and heavy shipments are expected.

DEATH AT THE ALMS HOUSE.—Mr. Samuel B. Corwell, superintendent of the alms house, reports that John Smith, an old colored man, for a long time an inmate of that institution, died there last week.

REPUBLICAN WARD MEETINGS.

Republicans were held in all the wards of the city last night by the republicans for the purpose of electing delegates to a city republican convention to meet at the colored Old Fellows' Hall, on Friday next, at 12 m., to select delegates to a convention to be held in this city July 1, to nominate a candidate for Congress from this district.

At the meeting in the First ward Benjamin Cornish, Richard Tocco, Thomas Tocco, Augustus Rainey, John Bell, Edward Fry and Ben Smith were elected delegates, and Samuel Chase alternate.

The meeting in the second ward was held at the house of Henry Lewis, but owing to the small attendance the election of delegates was postponed until to night.

The meeting in the Third ward was held at the Old Court House, Rudolph Thompson presided and A. W. Armstrong acted as secretary. The following delegates were elected: G. A. Langhain, L. C. Wilson, A. W. Armstrong, Rudolph Thompson, R. J. Beckler, Geo. H. Thompson, Melk. Ware, James Branch, T. J. Edelin, Jas. M. Buckner, H. Page, James Ross, and Wm. Laws.

At the Fourth ward meeting, held at the colored Old Fellows Hall, Richard Lyles presiding and J. N. Nickens acting as secretary. The following are the delegates chosen: Wm. Miller, A. W. Harris, H. L. Harris, George A. Griffin, Robert Gaines, George Cooper, Wm. H. Madella and Robert Mitchell.

CENSUS OPERATIONS.—The census enumerators for this city, with the exception of the enumerator for the 4th ward, have completed their enumeration, and will place their books at the office of the clerk of the Corporation Court in order that corrections, if necessary, may be made at the request of persons whose names have been omitted or added erroneously. The enumerators in the county have a longer time to do their work in. With but one or two exceptions the enumerators have been treated courteously, and their questions answered with satisfaction. One or two ladies desired to know that their answers were not intended for publication, they responded cheerfully. The enumerators have, as yet, made no report of the population of the city, but it is thought will be about as follows: 1st ward, 2,700; 2nd ward, 2,800; 3rd ward, 4,500; 4th ward, 4,000; total, 14,000. The population of the city, according to the census of 1870, was 13,570. There have been but forty deaths in the 1st ward since June 1, 1870. The enumeration in the 4th ward will not be completed before next Friday.

FIGHT BETWEEN CANAL BOATMEN.—A dispute arose between two canal boatmen, Nick Chopper and Joe Downey, yesterday evening, at the American coal wharf, about some money. Downey who was standing on the wharf at the time, invited Chopper, the captain of the boat, on the dock, which invitation was accepted, when Downey picked up a large lump of coal and struck Chopper on the head with it, inflicting what was thought to be a serious wound. Downey then walked up to a magistrate's office, coolly stated his case, and asked for a warrant for Chopper's arrest, but being informed that if a warrant was issued at all it would be for his, Downey's, arrest, he departed in a hurry.

Branch and Sias Harris, two colored men, were arrested on suspicion of being the guilty parties, and locked up in the station house until this afternoon, when they had a hearing before the Mayor, Justices Thompson and Hawkins, and after a thorough examination both men were dismissed as there was not the slightest evidence to incriminate them.
