The aggregate census returns show the population of Massachusetts to be 1,783,812, an increase of 19 percent over the figures of the last census.

The annual session of the American Bankers' Association commences at Saratoga to-day. It is said that over six thousand banks will be represented directly or indirectly at the meeting...

Two women waking on the track of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, near Kearsburg, Preston county, W. Va., were struck by a train on Monday.

The fire at Hunter's Point, New York, noted in yesterday's Gazette, destroyed a lumber yard and damaged several vessels.

Three servants belonging to the Bellevue Hotel, Bellevue, N. J.—one chambermaid, a hotel boy and a waiter—went out rowing in the Shrewsbury river last night.

Brigadier General C. C. Auger, U. S. A., has been ordered to proceed to Newport Barracks, Ky., and resume command of the Department of the South until the reassembling in Washington of the board of officers of which he is a member.

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Ex Gov. Bowie, of Maryland, sustained a serious loss at the Saratoga races on Monday in the crippling of his famous mare, Belle, whose leg, however, was not broken, as reported, and although the tendons of one of her fore-legs were severed, which will prevent her again appearing on the turf...

FROM WASHINGTON.

A telegram from Aden reports that the steamer Jeddah, from Singapore, founder off Guardant on the 8th, with 953 pilgrims for Jeddah.

In course of the celebrations of the centennial of the Sunday schools in London, there was a gathering of 25,000 children in the grounds of Lambeth Palace.

Joseph Gregory has been appointed mayor of the 2nd district of Virginia. The reorganizers of King George county, in county convention assembled, passed a resolution that the reorganizers may vote as they prefer for presidential electors.

There was a political discussion at Louisa, Va., on Monday, the meeting being one of the largest ever held there, between Messrs. Geo. D. Wise and Massery, in which the former achieved a signal triumph for himself and the true democracy.

Dr. Charles Pitts, member of the Legislature from Richmond county, died at his home, at Fernham Church, last Thursday afternoon, of a week.

The democratic meeting at a pole raising at Lacey's Springs, Rockingham county, yesterday, was very largely attended, and there was much enthusiasm for the regular democratic electoral ticket.

The twenty-two hour trial of the engine and machinery of the new war ship G. L. Hancock, commenced at the Norfolk navy yard last night, and several accidents happened.

A handsome statue of the late Senator Callahan, of Vermont, by P. Powers, was erected to the Statuary Hall of the Capitol to-day.

The Foundered Steamer. LONDON, Aug. 11.—A dispatch to Lloyd's from Aden says: "Upwards of one thousand passengers and crew were drowned by the foundering of the steamer Jeddah on the 8th instant, on Cape Guardafui. The vessel was bound from Singapore to Jeddah."
