FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3, 1880.

The result of the election was known last night, when the streets were thronged with eager and anxious crowds, awaiting the reception of the telegraphic bulletins.

New York Papers on the Election.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The Sun of to-day says regarding the election: James A. Garfield, of Ohio, was yesterday elected President of the United States, as successor to Mr. Hayes, of Ohio, the fraudulent President.

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THE ELECTION.

The Presidential election of 1880 has resulted in the choice of Gen. James A. Garfield, of Ohio, as President, and Gen. Chester A. Arthur, of New York, as Vice President.

So far as the returns at hand enable an estimate to be made the republicans will have at least 200 votes in the Electoral College, viz: Colorado, 3; Connecticut, 6; Illinois, 21; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 11; Kansas, 5; Maine, 7; Massachusetts, 13; Michigan, 11; Minnesota, 5; Nebraska, 3; New Hampshire, 3; New York, 35; Ohio, 22; Pennsylvania, 29; Rhode Island, 4; Vermont, 3; Wisconsin, 10.

TRENTON, Nov. 3.—The Legislature is likely to be very close on joint ballot with the probabilities that the republicans will have three majority.

TRENTON, Nov. 3.—Both parties agree that Ludlow, democrat, is elected Governor, the democratic State committee say by 900 to 800. The republican committee say from 600 to 800.

The State committee of both parties admit that the republicans have 9 majority in the Senate of 21 members. In the House of Assembly of sixty members the republicans have 31 and the democrats 25.

Donnelly, democrat, is elected in the Trenton district to the Assembly. The congressional delegation stands as last year.

JERSEY CITY, Nov. 3.—Senator Hobart, chairman of the New Jersey State republican executive committee says he has positive information that Pot is elected Governor by a majority of 400, but contends that the democratic presidential electors have carried the State by a small majority.

TRENTON, Nov. 3.—The democrats claim the election of Ludlow for Governor by 1,000 majority. The republicans say it is still in doubt.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—Returns from Interior (327 precincts) show Garfield, 150,000; Hayes, 140,000; Tilden, 140,000; Weaver, 910,000. The returns to come in are likely to increase Garfield's majority.

It is reported here that Lincolnism was carried to an almost unlimited extent in Alexandria yesterday, and that even the Mayor of the city and his police assisted in driving republican voters away from the polls, and is boldly asserted that it was necessary to score a republican majority in the House Mr. Barbour would not be elected upon this ground.

HARTFORD, Nov. 3.—With five votes to hear from the State gives Garfield, 65,740; Hayes, 63,570; Weaver, 709,240; Tilden, 1,120,727; Garfield's plurality 2,867. For Congress, Bigelow, rep., 64,873; English, dem., 62,157; Sturges, 14,841. Bigelow has 1,672 plurality. For Congress, Bank, rep., 1st district, 1,934 plurality; Wait, rep., 3d district, 2,666 plurality; Miles, rep., 4th district, 677 plurality.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—Returns have been compared from half of the State of Illinois, but comparison has been made with only 297 towns and precincts outside of Chicago. These show republican gains of 2635. At the same rate in the rest of the State the plurality in the State for Garfield would be about 44,000. The vote on Governor and Congressmen is a tie.

NASHVILLE, Nov. 3.—3.30 a. m.—On Garfield's majority in the State there will be a slight majority off from the Union vote of 1876. The result for Garfield is still in doubt, and will not be decided to night.

WILMINGTON, Nov. 3.—Returns from all eleven districts in the State report two in Kent county, the majorities of which are called upon the vote of the election last September, show a democratic majority of 1,045. Two thirds of the legislature is democratic, insuring the return of Bayard to the Senate.

MASSACHUSETTS. BOSTON, Nov. 3.—With 28 towns to hear from the returns up to 7 o'clock this morning give Garfield, 155,900; Hayes, 105,805; Weaver, 34,060; Dow, 419. Garfield's plurality is 49,107. The republicans will carry every congressional district excepting the 4th, and that is in doubt.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 3.—Complete returns show the vote in this city: Garfield, 17,089; Hayes, 12,052; Weaver, 306; Dow, 40; Garfield over Hayes, 4,937 over all, 4,592—a republican gain of 1,170 over the vote for Supreme Judge in October.

NEW YORK. NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The latest returns show the vote on the Majority to be as follows: Hayes, 3,000,000; Garfield, 2,800,000; Weaver, 300,000; Dow, 300,000; Green's majority, 1,203. Fifteen electors in New York are republican. Garfield's majority in the State will probably reach 20,000.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 3.—The following is the total vote in the city of Philadelphia: State presidential electors—Garfield, 96,794; Hayes, 76,069; Weaver, 261, Dow, 45. Republican plurality, 20,727. Garfield's majority in this State will be about 30,000.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 3.—Almost complete returns in this city give Garfield a plurality of 433. Crittenden, democrat, for Governor, a plurality of 514 and the remainder of the democratic State ticket.

LAKE CITY, Nov. 2.—Florida votes for Hayes and elects the democratic candidate for Governor and also democratic Congressmen. The legislature is also democratic.

MAN FRANCISCO, Cal., dispatches in received indicate that the state of Nevada has gone democratic. The majority will probably exceed 500.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 3.—Garfield's majority in the State 73,000—majority of 20,000 over last year. Solid Congressional delegation.

THE ELECTION IN VIRGINIA.

Returns from various parts of the State, so far as heard from, indicate the triumph of the regular democratic ticket over both the republican and Mahone ticket. In the first district, Garrison, dem., is elected; in the second it is generally conceded that DeZandort, rep., is elected; in the third, George D. Wise, dem., is elected; in the fourth, Jorgensen, rep.; in the fifth, Cabell, dem.; in the sixth, Allen, dem.; in the seventh, Tucker, dem.; in the eighth, Barbour, dem., and in the ninth returns are meagre but indications are that there is a close contest between Frigg, dem., and Falkerson, rep., The Mahone vote in the State falls far below even the republican minority.
