SPIDER'S FEAT - If you anchor a pole in a body of water, I will place the pole above the surface, and put a spider upon it, he will exhibit marvellous intelligence by his plans to escape. At first he will spin a web several inches long and have to use end while he allows the other to float off in the wind in the hope that it will strike some object. Of course his plan proves a failure, but the spider is not discouraged. He waits until the wind changes and then sends another silken bridge floating off to another direction. Another failure is followed by several similar attempts, until all the poles of the compass have been tried. He then gets the resources for the resource power of the spider are exhausted. He glazes to the top of the pole and erects a chair to work to construct a silk balloon. He has no hot air with which to inflate it, but he has the power to make it buoyant. When he gets his balloon inflated he does not go off upon the mere supposition that it will carry him, as men often do, but he fastens to it a kite, the other end of which he attaches to the island pole upon which he is a prisoner. He then gets into his aerial vehicle while it is made fast and tests it to see whether its dimensions are capable of the work of bearing him away. He often finds he has made it too small, in which case he hauls it down, takes it all apart and constructs it on a larger and better sized paper. A spider has been seen to make three different balloons before he became satisfied with his experiment. Then he will get in, strap the kite and sail away as gracefully and as successfully as a bird, and of his surroundings as could well be imagined.
