**What the Autopsy Shows.**  
The autopsy of the President's body shows:  
1. That the bullet passed slanting inward on the right side of the back until it struck the eleventh rib.  
2. That it fractured this eleventh rib and then was itself turned slightly to the left.  
3. That it pursued its path to the left, passing in front of the backbone and splintering off some flakes of bone from it.  
4. That it did not penetrate the backbone or cross the spinal marrow.  
5. That it did not enter the abdominal cavity.  
6. That after splintering off a few chips from the thick surface of the backbone it passed on about a half an inch to the left, and lay there, deep beneath the muscles, but not in the abdominal cavity, or in direct contact with any vital part.  
7. That the bounding back of the fractured rib into its original place obscured the search after the real track of the ball and prevented the subsequent free exit of matter from that track.  
The conclusions to be drawn from this are that at first there was a splinter rib—a common enough injury. Then a chipping off from the thick surface of the backbone—a serious but not directly grave accident. And, finally, a bullet imbedded in flesh at an accessible though deep point from the outside—that is to say, where it might have been extracted without great difficulty. Now, what follows? The shock passes, and nobody puts his finger into the wound to probe it. Neither at first, which was judicious, nor after the shock, which was to say the least, very puzzling. Nothing is known of the track of the wound, nor even the broken rib, whose fragments lie within half an inch of the surface of the skin. At last, however, and other disturbances lead to the discovery of an almost closed pus cavity; it is this time the matter, which could not flow out, has burrowed a canal between the muscles, leading by natural gravitation downward. This is at once seized upon as the track of the wound, and washed out and disinfected, while the ball and the slightly splintered backbone, that manufacture all the pus, lie above and to one side. Then another circumstance occurs. The matter that burrows down and finds no outlet is not all successfully washed out. Some of it is absorbed and taken up, carried through the system by the absorbent vessels and the veins. It is left at various points and creates abscesses. As a consequence we have the abscess of the parotid gland, which was discovered and treated, being near the surface; and we have the large abscess under the liver, found in the autopsy, and the small abscess on the kidney. What follows? The splintered rib, the real one, with its sharp little splinters of bone half way and its encasing ball at the other end, goes on suppurating, rotting away its scabbles in the effort to nature to make it large enough to sweep out the foreign substance contained. At last, by chance, it is into an artery that happens to lie there. The walls burst, the blood escapes, and, like the pus previously, it finds no outlet to the surface, but has to make its own way. It bursts through the peritoneum and flows into the abdominal cavity. Now the case is lost. If the victim had been a drayman or a coal heaver the real path of the wound would have been probed and the bullet extracted the first week of the patient's suffering.—Harvard Times.

**A Curious Prediction.**  
In the year 1712, Mr. Whiston, having calculated the return of a comet which was to make its first appearance on Wednesday, the 14th of October, at five minutes after five in the morning, gave notice to the public accordingly, with this terrifying addition, that a total dissolution of the world by fire was to take place on Friday following. The reputation Mr. Whiston had long maintained in England, both as a divine and philosopher, left little or no doubt with the populace of the truth of his prediction. Several ludicrous events now took place. A number of persons in and about London seized all the boats and barges they could lay hands on in the Thames, very rationally concluding that when the conflagration took place there would be the most safety on the water. A gentleman who had neglected family prayers for more than five years informed his wife that he was deterred to resume that laudable practice the same evening; but his wife, having engaged a ball at her house, persuaded her husband to put it off till they saw whether the comet appeared or not. The South Sea stock immediately fell to five per cent, and the East India stock to eleven; and the captain of a Dutch ship threw all his powder into the river, that the ship might not be endangered. The next morning the comet appeared according to the prediction, and before noon the belief became universal that the day of judgment was at hand. About this time one hundred and twenty-five clergymen were ferried to Lambeth, it is said, to petition that a short prayer might be penned and ordered, there being none in the church service that would answer on such occasion. Three maids of honor burnt their collection of novels and plays, and sent to the bookseller to buy them a Bible and Bishop Taylor's Holy Living and Dying. The run upon the bank was so prodigious that all hands were employed from morning till night in discounting notes and handing out specie. On Thursday considerably more than seven thousand kept mistresses were legally married in the face of several congregations, and to crown the whole faro, Sir Gilbert Heathcote, at that time being director of the bank, issued orders to all the fire offices in London, requiring them to keep a good lookout and have a particular eye over the bank of England.
