A WILD CARER.—The Earl of Londale, whose death has been announced, succeeded in the short period of six years, since he came to this city and estate, in distinguishing himself in a number of ways not before attempted by any member of the Lower family, of which he was the head. The late earl was one of the richest peers in England, one of the hardest drinkers, one of the most reckless gamblers, and an unrivaled speed-bribe. These distinctions he acquired within two years after attaining his majority and he then added to them the additional distinction of becoming the husband of Lady Louisa, one of the most beautiful and accomplished beauties of the age. The young bride and groom ran a race in prodigality, and the earl was said to have lived three millions in his first year. While the earl kept up an enormous steam stud and one of the most expensive steam yachts in the world. Inside the year "La Gioia," as the countess was familiarly called, returned to her mother under a cloud, and the earl cheerfully advertised the fact to the world, and with this admission that he would thereafter "pay no bills of honor," which, as he was even then professedly a bankrupt, was not of much account to him. He has since gone on from bad to worse, and wrecked not only his fortune but his health by his excesses. He had not yet reached the age of 27.
