

Exciting Scene in a Church.

A dispatch from St. Louis says: The conference of this district of the Methodist Episcopal Church adjourned yesterday. The last business before the adjournment was the reading of the assignments of ministers for the coming year. The church was thronged, and the announcements for the city pulpits were awaited with special interest. Not a little surprise was manifested when it became known that the Rev. Dr. W. Hughley, who has hitherto had charge of Trinity, one of the largest Methodist churches in the city, had been transferred to the Carondelet Church, a charge not nearly so important, and yielding only half the salary of Trinity. As soon as the conference was declared adjourned, Dr. Hughley, accompanied by his sons, met Presiding Elder Hagerty and the Rev. Dr. B. St. James Fry in the aisle. In an excited manner Dr. Hughley charged the other two preachers with undermining his character and improperly influencing the bishop to have him assigned to Carondelet. "That is a nice way," he exclaimed, "to shove a minister with a ministerial record of thirty-three years as good as any in the conference." Dr. Hughley's three sons were present, and one of them, George, 14 years of age, denounced Dr. Fry in vehement and profane language. Dr. Fry replied to the boy: "I suppose you are a son of Hughley, as you act and talk like that breed." The boy immediately drew a clasp-knife and was in the act of opening it when his sister detected the movement. Other members of the family seized him and pulled him away from Dr. Fry. Dr. Hughley, realizing how his son's rashness had done his own cause harm, said to him: "You villain! what did you do that for?" The lad replied: "Why, father, I want to cut Fry's liver out, and I'll do it yet." All of this took place in the presence of the congregation, causing great confusion. Some of the ladies screamed and fainted.
