

Electric Lamps.

If we examine one of the electric lamps in the streets, we shall find it consists of two rods, one pointing upward from the bottom of the lamp, the other hanging downward. The rods seem to touch, and the brilliant flame is exactly where they seem to meet. Once a day a man comes around with a bag of the rods. He takes out the old rods that were burned the night before, and places a new set in each lamp. After he has gone about, as if he were putting new wicks into the lamps, and each is ready for its night work, all the lamps are lighted in broad day to see that every one is in proper trim. They are allowed to burn until men have walked about in the streets and looked at each lamp. If all are burning well, they are put out till it begins to grow dark. If one fails to burn properly, a man goes to that to see what is the matter. The rods are made of a curious black substance, like charcoal, that is called carbon. When the lamp is out, the two rods touch each other. In order to light the lamp, they are pulled apart; and if you look at the flame through a smoked glass, you will see that the rods do not quite touch. There is a small space between their points, and this is filled with fire. Look at the other parts of the rods, or the copper wires that extend along the streets. They have no light, no heat, no sound. The wires are cold, dark, and silent. If we were to push the rods in the lamp close together the light and heat would disappear, and the curious hissing sound would stop.

The electricity passes down one wire into the other, through the lamp, in silence and darkness, so long as the rods touch and the path is clear. When the rods in the lamp are pulled apart, there is a space to be got over, an obstruction, like rocks in the bed of the brook. The electricity, like water, struggles to get over the hindrance in its path, and it grows white-hot with anger, and flames and hisses as the rods are pulled apart. There is another kind of electric lamp, used in houses; it has a smaller and softer light, steady, white and beautiful. In these lamps, also, we have something like the narrow place in the brook. They are made with slender loops of carbon, inclosed in glass globes. The electricity, flowing silently through a dark wire, enters the lamp, and finds only a narrow thread on which it can travel to reach the home-going wire, and in its struggle to get past, it heats the tiny thread of carbon to whiteness. Like a live coal, this slender thread gives us a mild, soft light, as long as the current flows. It seems calm and still, but it is enduring the same fury of the electricity that is shown in the larger lamps. This is the main idea on which these lamps are made: A stream of electricity is sent flowing from a dynamo machine through a wire into the lamp. Then it seeks to get past the obstruction, and there is a grand putting forth of energy, and in this way the electric force, although itself invisible is made known to our eyes by a beautiful light.—Charles Barnard, in St. Nicholas for May.

WEATHER PROGNOSTICATIONS.—Many so-called weather prophets make numberless guesses, the public frequently applauding those which happen to prove correct, while generously forgiving the much larger percentage of errors. The following described colors of the sky, at different times, are a wonderful guidance, as many an observing farmer knows from experience. Such observations, and others of similar nature, confirmed by daily experience of farmers and mariners, are better and safer to follow than the prognostications of the weather by any professor who foretells a rainy or windy day twelve months in future. A clear sunset not only indicates fair weather, but there are other tints which speak with clearness and accuracy. A bright yellow sky in the evening indicates wind; a pale yellow, wet; a neutral gray tint, in the morning, a dry, calm day; in the evening, very unfavorable weather. The clouds are also full of meaning, and are in themselves very safe guides. If they are soft, indefinite and feathery, the weather will be fine; if the edges are hard, sharp, and definite, it will be rainy and windy. As a general thing, deep, unusual hues betoken rain and wind, while more moderate tints bespeak fair weather. If a dense, cloudy sky suddenly clears up in the north or northwest at sunset, it indicates wind from the direction of the clear space. A luminous circle, known as a halo, around the sun or moon, caused by the reflection of light through the crystals of ice in the atmosphere, foreshadows a storm—wind, rain, or snow. When the atmosphere is dense and in a condition to convey ordinary sounds long distances, foul weather is sure to follow.—American Cultivator.
