



The Glucose Mystery.
The glucose manufacturers have risen to the importance and dignity of annual conventions. Fifteen of them have lately met in Chicago and congratulated each other on the flourishing condition of their business. They are all oversold, and the only thing that troubles them is to provide means to meet the mysterious increasing demand for their imitation sugar and syrups. No one knows exactly what becomes of the enormous quantity of the fifteen glucose factories. Nothing by the name of glucose or corn syrup is for sale at any grocery, or is in the acknowledged use of any confectioner. It is probably impossible to buy a pound of the one or a quart of the other at retail in any store in the United States. The glucose is surreptitiously mixed with cheap brown sugar, whitening it up to a higher priced white grade; and the syrup, either mixed or unmixed with the true saccharine article, is palmed off as genuine cane or maple syrup. As for the confectioners, a large percentage of their candies is believed to be composed of the cheap and comparatively worthless substitute for the only element that makes candies desirable. Anyhow, a great many somebodies work off enough of these false sugars and syrups to keep 15 factories in full blast day and night and still unable to catch up with the demand. A new one, which exemplifies the magnitude of the glucose interest, is now going up in Chicago. The main building will be 160 feet square and thirteen stories high, with filter buildings and boiler houses in proportion, and will cost all told about \$400,000. The works will employ from 700 to 1,000 men and consume 15,000 bushels of corn a day. A bushel of corn yields about thirty pounds of grape sugar or three gallons of syrup. The sugar costs 35 cents a pound, and can be sold at about 7 cents; and the syrup is proportionately profitable. The glucose people do not deal in open market and above board like other manufacturers. The lists are unknown to market reports and only can be ascertained by their initiated. They may make less, or they may make more money out of their business than outsiders suppose. But it is unquestionably a lucrative line of manufacture and more and more deserving the attention of the legislatures. Every State should have a law requiring glucose and its associated products to be labeled and sold under their own names. We ask for glucose, as for oleomargarine, a fair field, and no favors and no chance for false pretences. Let them both sink or swim by their own merits—such as they are.—N. Y. Journal of Commerce.

Laws of Digestion.
1. Food for the supply of the daily wants of the system is most rapidly and thoroughly digested when taken early in the day, ere the nervous and selective forces are exhausted by toil.
2. Rapid digestions in the early part of the day contributed to the immediate demands of motion and enervation.
3. Food for the repair of the continuous wear and tear of the tissues is in less immediate request; the completeness of its solution is of more importance than the rapidity, and it is best taken toward the evening when an opportunity is offered for its leisurely absorption during sleep.
4. The duration of digestion bears a proportion to the quantity of food eaten.
5. In youth the digestion is quicker, and the stomach sooner emptied than in grown up persons.
6. Rest before meals makes digestion more complete. Exertion immediately before meals retards digestion, and exertion immediately afterward deranges it.
7. Sleep retards digestion, but makes it more complete.
8. Alcohol retards digestion, and renders it also incomplete.
9. Earnest preoccupation of mind retards digestion, and may even quite annul it.
10. Water weakens digestion, and encourages the absorption of fatty and saccharine matters; but its effect on the complete solution of albumen is doubtful.
