LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES, May 10, 1882. For the Middle Atlantic States cloudy, rainy weather, easterly, veering to warmer, southerly winds and lower pressure.

THE NAMOUNA.—Mr. James Gordon Bennett's steam yacht Namouna, after getting out of the mud into which she was run in the Eastern Branch, yesterday, by the commander of the Tallapoosa, with the President and thirty other distinguished guests on board, steamed down the river and anchored in the stream off this city until about five o'clock this morning, when she quietly left for parts unknown. That was a great mishap yesterday, and Lord Mandeville, Mr. Bennett's English friend, is said to have derived much pleasure from the accident. The fact that three or four old Commodore and a commander of a United States steamer had to remain all the afternoon stuck in the mud a short distance from shore, was to him the "funniest thing he ever saw."

THE LINCOLN CONCERT.—The entertainment last night at the M. E. church, in this city, was certainly a delightful affair. The Lincoln were in splendid voice, and rendered the selections in the finest style. A large audience was present, and gave the fullest evidence of appreciation. Miss Nettie Paulson gave several readings in excellent taste and execution. Dr. Paulson related an amusing story in his own experience of singing in a rural congregation, and Prof. Lincoln interspersed the whole with pertinent incidents illustrating the songs that were sung. The entertainment to-night will consist of an entire change of programme. Among other things, Dr. Paulson promises an original story of a wedding ceremony. See notice in another column.

CHURCH NEWS.—Rev. Mr. Flippo, the pastor of the Baptist church in this city, has resumed his Wednesday night lectures on Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress. The subject of this evening's lecture will be "Christian and Faithful passing through Vanity Fair." These lectures suspended during the late protracted meeting have been well attended and greatly enjoyed. The result of the protracted meeting thus far has been the addition of eighteen believers to the membership of the church. There are others to be baptized. Rev. Mr. Hutson who aided the pastor in the early stage of the meeting, has labored with the church in Savannah, Ga., and Charleston, S. C., since he left this city, with great success.

POLICE NEWS.—The Mayor had before him this morning George Williams and Harriet Peyton, both colored, for disorderly conduct on the streets last night. The girls, who are well known street walkers, were fined \$2.50 each and discharged, their parents paying the fines for them. The Fitzgerald girl, committed to jail yesterday for sixty days for failure to pay a fine of \$10 for disorderly conduct Sunday last, has been released, her fine having been raised by subscription. A female friend gave her a hat, and she left the station house for her home in Washington declaring that she would never again visit Alexandria.

RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.—The passenger train on the Virginia Midland Railway, due here early yesterday morning did not arrive until half past seven o'clock last night. The train after being delayed at Danville for three hours waiting for connections, was further delayed at Stony Point Junction by the breaking of a tender axle. The freight train on the Manassas road bound west struck a cow on the track about a mile west of Marshall yesterday, and the engine and several cars were thrown from the track causing a long delay. No one was injured in either of these accidents.

INTERESTS MOVING AGAINST THE LIQUOR LICENSES.—The Commonwealth's Attorney, in accordance with the law on the subject, which has been sustained by the Court of Appeals Court, move that the licenses of all liquor dealers who have been fined for violation of the Sunday law since the issuing of the last liquor licenses, about ten days ago, be revoked. Three saloon keepers, two white and one colored, have been fined this week by the Mayor for violating the Sunday law, and, it is said, that Judge Meade can do nothing else but revoke their licenses.

THE RELIEF HOOK AND LADDER FAIR.—The fair for the benefit of the Relief Hook and Ladder Company was continued last night at Armory Hall. A good crowd was present and a very enjoyable time was had. The following is the result of the voting for the several articles named: For Gums—James Smith 10, R. W. French 3, Julian P. Young 2. For Baby's carriage—Birdie Selma Waterman 10, Geo. Fisher 6, Eddie Bohraus 8, scattering 4. The voting for the foreman's hat and belt will be commenced to-night.

DEATH IN THE COUNTY.—Mrs. Jane F. Corbett, an old and respected lady, died at the residence of her husband, Mr. S. B. Corbett, in Arlington District, Alexandria county, yesterday afternoon, from the effects of a stroke of paralysis received two years ago. The deceased was the mother of Mr. Fred S. Corbett, sheriff of the county, and was well and favorably known. Her many friends in this city will regret to hear of her death. C. F. Corbett, the second son of the deceased, left the county for Colorado two weeks ago.

THE A. M., M. & W. CO.—A charter for the Alexandria Mining, Manufacturing and Warehouse Company, having been granted by the Legislature, some of the incorporators of the new company, met in this city a few days ago for consultation. After a general conversation in regard to the prospects and objects of the company, a committee was appointed to wait on the citizens to solicit subscriptions to the capital stock of the new company.

OFFICIAL.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN. At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen held May 9, 1882, there were present: E. E. Downham, esq., President, and Messrs. Moore, Straus, Maryland, Risell, J. B. Smoot and Reid. The Finance Committee reported adversely on the petition of Henry Engelhardt for a reduction of assessment on his real estate property. A bill of J. Entwistle, Jr., of \$622.00 for medicine was ordered to be paid.

The Committee on Claims reported in favor of paying the bill of G. W. Lash, \$2, as judge of election, and two bills of Perry, Smoot & Co., of \$7,928 and \$3,107, and the bills were ordered to be paid. On motion it was resolved, That the Mayor, Chairman of the Finance Committee, of the Committee on Streets, Corporation Attorney and Col. L. W. Reid, be appointed a committee to confer with the proper authorities of the Alexandria and Washington Railroad Company, and urge upon them the importance to their company, and to the desirability to this city, of a speedy and permanent resumption of the running of their local passenger trains, as formerly, to the intersection of King and St. Asaph streets, or some other central point to be agreed upon, to ascertain the nature of any difficulty that may be in the way and to see if the same cannot be overcome.

Petition of J. A. Seaton, in regard to his taxes, was referred to the Finance Committee. Petition of Geo. Stoenmager, for permission to erect a frame annex to the building lately purchased by him, was granted.

An ordinance to amend and reordain sections 6 and 7, chapter 5, city code of 1874, and of an ordinance amendatory thereof, approved August 7, 1879, was read and referred to the Committee on General Laws. Petition of J. H. D. Smoot for permission to board up the west end of his lumber shed to the height of 16 feet, was granted.

A resolution granting Officer John Lawler pay for 25 days sick leave by sickness; also a resolution in regard to repairs to a gutter on the corner of Payne st., between Duke and Princess; also a communication from the Mayor in regard to a nuisance, corner of Royal and Princess streets; also a resolution in regard to same nuisance; also a report from the Committee on Public Property in regard to the cost of repairing the Long wharf; also report of committee and resolution in regard to the repairing of Union street, were received from the Common Council and their action concurred in.

The estimate of the City School Board for the ensuing year was received from the Common Council, their action non-concurring in, and the paper referred to the School Board with the request that they endeavor to bring the appropriation within \$7,200; the common Council returned the paper, adhering to their action; this Board reconsidered their action and concurred in the action of the Common Council. The Board then adjourned. J. W. JAMIESON, Clerk.

COMMON COUNCIL.

At a regular meeting of the Common Council of the city of Alexandria, held May 9th, 1882, there were present: James S. Douglas, esq., President, and Messrs. Moore, Herbert, Burke, Lambert, Beach, Rice, Marlbury, Eichberg, McLean, Natis, Sweeney and Peake. A resolution to have repaired the gutter on the corner of Payne street, between Duke and Princess, was referred to the Committee on Streets. A resolution was adopted directing that officer John Lawler be paid for twenty-six days lost from duty by reason of prolonged sickness.

A communication from the Mayor in relation to the nuisance existing upon the lot of A. J. Fleming, at the corner of Princess and Royal streets, was received and read, and a resolution to appropriate \$40 to abate the same was referred to the Committee on General Laws. An estimate for the expenses of Public Schools for the next fiscal year was received from the School Board and referred to the Committee on Finance, and the Board of Aldermen non-concurring, the former action of this Board was adhered to.

The Committee on Public Property, upon the resolution to enclose into the cost and advantage of rebuilding the Long wharf, reported that to be built with pine lumber, will cost \$1,244.42, and with oak lumber \$1,657.44, which report was received. The joint committee, appointed to confer with the Va. Midland Railway Co., as to the repair of Union street, reported that said committee agreed to pay one-half the cost thereof, and that the committee recommended the work be done; which report and resolution, that Union street be repaved and repaired from the south side of Wolfe street to the north side of Monroe street, curbed and renewed where needed, and monuments made in conformity with act of Council, at a cost not exceeding \$15,000 to the city, were adopted.

The following were received from the Board of Aldermen and their action thereon concurred in, viz: Petition of J. H. D. Smoot for permission to board up the west end of his lumber shed; petition of George Stoenmager for permission to erect a frame annex to his property, on Royal street, between King and Cameron streets; petition of John A. Seaton for an abatement of taxes on real property; an ordinance to amend and reordain sections 6 and 7 of chapter 5 of the city code of 1874, and of an ordinance amendatory thereof, approved August 7, 1879; bills of Perry, Smoot & Co., amounting respectively to \$33,07 and \$7,928; petition of Henry Engelhardt for a reduction of assessment; bills of Geo. W. Lash, \$2, and of Jas. Entwistle, Jr., \$62, and a resolution appointing a special committee to confer with the A. & W. R. Co. in relation to running their local trains to the corner of King and St. Asaph streets. The Board then adjourned. JAMES R. CATON, Clerk.

Flour is dull and heavy. The receipts of Wheat continue light, and 1150 bushels were sold at 123¢ at 7 for Fultz, and 130¢110 for mixed, with no Lancaster offering. Corn is scarce and wanted, with small sales of white at 95¢96. No Rye or Oats reported. Country produce is tending downward.

Hogs.—Live Hogs were dull at 6¢50¢87 1/2 per 100 for poor to fair. Good and prime corn-fed quoted at 7.35¢87.50.

QUEENSTOWN CATTLE MARKET, May 9.—Offerings of 345 head of Cattle, 330 of which were sold at 7.5¢77 1/2 per lb; most of the sales were at 7a 7 1/2¢; market slow and in many cases 4¢ lower than last week. 900 Sheep and Lambs were offered and sold: old Sheep, clipped, sold at 5¢48¢ per lb and dull, and Lambs sold at 6¢46¢ per lb, with but few at the outside figure. Milch Cows sold at 25 to 85¢ each.
