LOCAL MATTERS.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES, JUNE 9, 1882. For the Middle Atlantic States, partly cloudy weather, local rains in the northern portion, stationary or a slight fall in temperature, variable winds and slight changes in barometer, except in the northern portions, slight rise in barometer.

A CUTTING AFFAIR.—A number of river men congregated on "Wind Mill Hill," in the First Ward, this morning for the purpose of mending their fishing nets. In the course of the discussion which took place on the various topics of the day, one of the party, Will Travers, remarked that if spies had not been appointed to watch the saloon keepers on Sunday the excursion given by Potomac Tent of Rechabites to Marshall Hall yesterday would have been more largely attended. John Thomas Roberts, another of the party, understanding the language used to be that the Rechabites had appointed "spies," called Travers a liar. Travers replied, "you're another." Roberts, who is a member of the order of Rechabites, then made for Travers, and a fight ensued, during which Travers drew a knife and stabbed his assailant in the arm inflicting an ugly wound, from which the blood flowed freely. This ended the fight, and the wounded man went to the office of Dr. Brown, where he received surgical attention. The circumstances of the affair were reported to the station house by officer John Nightingale, and the combatants will probably be arrested.

A SOCIETY OF STRAIGHTOUT REPUBLICANS.—From the several unsuccessful attempts to get up straightout republican meetings in this city, it would appear that the much talked of Virginia republican mountain had at last gone to Mahomet Mahone. Straightout republican meetings to nominate delegates to a convention to be held in Staunton were called for last Monday night, but no straightout republicans responded, and of course no delegates were appointed. The meetings were called again for last night, but with the exception of the First ward, where three or four colored men assembled, nobody responded to the call, and the election of delegates had to be again postponed, this time indefinitely. One colored republican said this morning that the Staunton convention was only a scheme gotten up by two or three "nobodies" for the purpose of raising a little cash and getting a good square meal.

LOST HIS WIFE.—A newly wedded pair from Rapidan Station, Va., visited Washington yesterday for the purpose of viewing the city and making some purchases. The happy couple would have returned to their Virginia home this morning but for a little mishap, which caused the gentleman considerable consternation. They arrived at the Baltimore and Potomac railroad depot safely and happily. The groom left his bride to look after the baggage, and when he returned, behold—his bride was gone. "My wife is lost," rang through the depot. Soon, not however, until the train had pulled off, the lady was found and restored to her grief-stricken husband. The missing was a happy one. The loving pair acted just like all other newly married couples would have acted under the same circumstances.

THE EXCURSION SEASON.—The excursion season has fairly commenced. For some time past the different steamers have been carrying large crowds down to the several lower Potomac resorts. Yesterday Potomac Tent of Rechabites of this city gave an excursion to Marshall Hall on the steamer Mary Washington. There was a good attendance, and the day was most enjoyably spent. The match game of base ball on the grounds, for a silver cup, between the first nine of the Base Ball Association and the Alexandria Drivers, resulted in a victory for the Association nine by the following score: Association nine 23; Drivers 3. This morning the Mary Washington carried a large crowd down to Occoquan Falls.

PERSONAL.—The New Orleans *Picayune* in noticing the arrival of Mr. Charles Dimity, a resident of this city, says: "Mr. Charles Dimity, a distinguished writer, an inspired poet, and the son of the renowned sword, Prof. Alexander Dimity, has recently returned to this city from the North, where he, for several years, has been engaged in literary pursuits. Mr. Dimity is a thorough scholar and a man of genius without any pretensions. Some of his works, both in prose and poetry, will make his name remembered not only in his native State of Louisiana, but in the United States." All those acquainted with Mr. D. in this city heartily concur with the *Picayune* in its opinion of his genius.

A SAD SIGHT.—There arrived here this morning on the train over the Washington and Western (late W. & O.) Railroad from Loudoun a young woman, in charge of two officers, madly deranged. The unfortunate, upon landing from the train, was at once placed in a hack, which was in waiting, and driven rapidly through the streets to the Virginia Midland Railway depot, where she was forced on the cars. Her destination was the Staunton Insane Asylum. The wild shrieks of the woman as she passed through the streets, and at the depot, and her dazed look and disheveled long black hair made a sad scene. The deranged lady was Miss Foley, of Gum Springs, Loudoun county.

THE CLOSING OF GRACE CHURCH FESTIVAL.—The festival and musical and literary entertainments at Armory Hall for the benefit of Grace Church closed last night, after a very successful run of four nights. There was a good attendance, and a most pleasant time was spent. During the evening there was instrumental music by Miss Carrie Medley and others, and vocal music by Mrs. Berkeley and Mrs. Smithers, and recitations by Mrs. H. T. Sharp ("A Ride to Strasburg," by request) and Miss Nicholas ("Engaged," also by request). The Church realized about \$150 from the festival, which was one of the most pleasant ever given in this city.

The Simms woman got very drunk, and after stumbling about the neighborhood for some time, fell on a little girl named Clements breaking her (the little girl's) arm, besides other bruising, the child about the body. Dr. Jones, who was sent for rendered the necessary surgical assistance, and made the little sufferer as comfortable as possible.

POLICE ITEMS.—There were before the

Mayor this morning John Dorsey, colored, for threatening to beat Mollie Davis, also colored, and a young man charged with an assault on a colored wagon driver at the ferry wharf. John Dorsey was fined \$5 and discharged, and the young man was made to pay the costs of the case.

INJURED.—Albert Purvis, a brakeman on the Virginia Midland Railway, material train, had his hand badly mashed while coupling cars at Barboursville yesterday. The injured man reached his home in this city last night and received surgical attention.

RESIGNED.—R. H. Haver, esq., this afternoon resigned his position as Superintendent of the Washington and Western Railroad, and it is understood that Mr. Hector McLain, of North Carolina, will be appointed to fill the vacancy.

LOCAL BREVITIES.—The Washington and Western Railroad depot building in this city is to be repaired and repainted. The weather to-day was oppressively warm. A shower this afternoon had the effect of cooling the atmosphere slightly. Rev. W. H. Forsyth, Presiding Elder of the M. E. Church, will speak on temperature at the hall of the Reform Club to-night. C. R. Magilton arrived here to-day from North Carolina, to take a position on the Washington & Western Railroad. Mr. Alexander Kilgour, of this city, is in St. Paul, Minnesota, on a prospecting tour, with a view to locating in that place. Deputy Treasurer James R. Caton left here last night for Richmond to settle the accounts of the Treasurer of this city with the State Auditor.

The patent buoy light which has been in the river off the ship yard, for some time past, was removed yesterday. A coaster ran over it a short time ago but only damaged it slightly. Miss Mary Winsor and Miss Mary Joyce left here last night on the steamer George Leary to visit their friends, the Misses Maupin, daughters of Dr. Maupin, of Portsmouth.

The steamer Mystic left the ship yard to day for Washington. The mystic is in first rate condition, having been fitted up with a view of running excursions during the summer. Mr. John Padgett struck a colored wagon driver on the head with his fist for some impudence, at the ferry wharf this morning, and besides badly bruising his hand broke one of his fingers.

Two girls from Washington, charged with robbery in that city, were arrested here this afternoon by Officers James Smith and Crump, and turned over to Detectives McDevitt and Acton. A young man who gave his name as Kilgour, and stated that he was from Alexandria, attempted suicide in Norfolk by taking lithiumum Tuesday night last. The rash act was discovered in time to prevent a fatal result.
