Opposing a New Priest.

Yesterday was an exciting one in the history
of the parish of St. Stephen's Roman
Catholic Church, in New York. The news
that Father Donnelly had been appointed
successor to Rev. Dr. McGlynn, pastor,
brought out immense throngs of people to
the sacred edifice. Crowds gathered around
the doors, and excitedly declaimed against
the removal of the pastor. The servants at
the rectory were the most indignant. On
Father Donnelly's arrival Saturday, they re-
fused to admit him by the front door, and
he finally gained admission through the
basement, and passed the night in the re-
ctory; so did Father McGlynn, who occupied
his own chamber, while the only sleeping
place that Father Donnelly could get from
the domestics was a cot bed hastily put up
in the parlor. It was generally understood
that Father Donnelly would announce his
appointment at mass yesterday. The 5:30
a. m. mass was thinly attended, Father
Curran celebrating. Father Donnelly ap-
peared as the celebrant at the six o'clock
mass. There was no open trouble. Father
McGlynn was present at all the morning
masses, occupying a pew among the
communicants like any other layman.
During one of the masses Father Donnelly
made a tour of the church slowly, as if look-
ing for recognition from his new parishion-
ers. No one paid the slightest attention to
him or inclined their heads for his blessing.
The collectors refused to serve, so no collec-
tion was taken up. The usual Sunday col-
lections net from \$2,600 to \$5,000. At noon
the mighty congregation poured out of the
church. Outside the tumult began. On
every hand in the immense crowd were
heard expressions of disapproval and of
sympathy for Dr. McGlynn. After a time
the excited people gradually dispersed.
Father Donnelly left the rectory at four
o'clock in the afternoon and went to the
Archiepiscopal Palace, where he remained
in conference with the Archbishop for sev-
eral hours. A reporter asked one of the
domestics at the rectory for Father Donnelly.
She replied: "This is no place to be
looking for Father Donnelly." Then sump-
tuously continued: "If you want to see him,
why don't you go to his house? He has no
right here at the house of Dr. McGlynn."
Patrick Johnson, the church engineer,
resigned Saturday and turned his keys over to
Father McGlynn. The choir boys refused
to attend the services yesterday. For sev-
eral days past Dr. McGlynn has not been
well. After he left the church at noon he
went directly to his room in the re-
ctory. Dr. Shady, his regular physi-
cian, was summoned, and found Dr.
McGlynn prostrated by the excitement
of the prolonged struggle. He was ordered
to be removed at once to some place where
he could have rest, and accordingly last night
he was taken to the residence of a sister in
Harlem. An indignation meeting was held
last night in the basement of the church.
Every seat was filled and the aisles packed.
The meeting was called to order by a prom-
inent member, who besought the audience
to be orderly. It was announced that a
meeting would be held to-night in the
church for the members, and that a mass
meeting of all the Catholics in the city
would be held at the same time in Cooper
Union. Much excitement prevailed, and
several speakers indignantly denounced
what they termed the persecution of their
pastor. Many women were so wrought up
that they sobbed aloud. A committee was
appointed to draft resolutions to present to
the meeting to-night. Impassioned address-
es were made urging the people to stand by
their pastor to the last. The speakers pre-
dicted a triumphant vindication of Dr. Mc-
Glynn. This was received with enthusiastic
applause. The audience cheered, stamped
and shouted. It was announced that a fund
would be started to-day to provide for the
pastor, who has used up all his means to
aid the poor. The audience then dispersed.
The vesper service yesterday was poorly at-
tended.

Circassian Story of a Kiss.

was walking along one road, and a woman

The man was carrying a large iron kettle
on his back; in one hand he held the legs

lonely place, and you might overpower me

"How can I possibly overpower you and

this goat? I might as well be tied hand
and foot." "Yes," replied the woman. "But
if you should stick your cane in the ground
and tie your goat to it, and turn the kettle
bottom-side up and put the chicken under

of my resistance." "Success to thy in-
genuity, O woman!" said the rejoicing man
to himself. "I should never have thought
of this or similar expedients." And when
they came to the ravine, he stuck his cane

it while I cut some grass for the goat;" and
then—so runs the legend—lowering the ket-
tle from his shoulders, he put the fowl under
it, and wickedly kissed the woman, as she
