Mr. Royall's Views.

[From interview in Richmond Whig.]

Q. Did you notice an interview with Mr. Thomas

Potts, foreman of the late grand jury of the

Hustings Court?

A. I did.

Q. You propose, I suppose, of course, to push

the suits against the grand jurors which you have

instituted?

A. I do; and I propose to sue each member

of each grand jury each time it indicates any

one of my clients under an unconstitutional law,

and to press each one of these suits to a final

conclusion in a court in which I can get impartial

justice, as the law of the land fixes the rights

of myself and my clients.

Q. Is not the State law against barratry simply

the revival of a law against an offense recognized

by the common law, and if so, why do you regard it

unconstitutional?

A. It is by no means a revival of the common-law

doctrine in respect to what was called barratry,

maintenance, and champerty was part of the feudal

system. Under that system the baron or lord of a

manor sat in his court, a petty prince and autocrat,

commanding the duty and obedience of his vassals

and compelling submission to his will by the mailed

hand and spear in rest. Neither he nor his co-barons

would tolerate the processes of the law interfering

between themselves and those whom they designed

to oppress. Hence the fashionable society of the day

came to look upon those who sought redress from

injuries according to law in the interest of justice,

as contemptible fellows, and their attorney-advisers,

as barrators, champertors and maintainers. The

idea was that differences of opinion about rights were

to be settled by battle axe and sword. But, as our

civilization has advanced, we have all come to the

conclusion that differences of opinions respecting

rights should be settled by the peaceful methods of

the law. Hence, as our civilization has advanced, the

old ideas respecting barratry and the like have come

to be looked upon as a semi-barbarism. We now

think that when a man feels himself aggrieved it is

his first duty to resort to one learned in the law for

advice as to what are his rights and his duties.

As to why I regard this act unconstitutional, I have

to say: Of course we all know that the act was

designed to deprive persons who asserted their

rights growing out of the States' tax-receivable

coupons, of the benefit of counsel in asserting their

rights as means of destroying the efficacy and
