There was another false alarm of fire about 8 o'clock last night.

The tug Hartley, which was recently repaired here, left this morning with a tow of dredges for the James river.

A marriage license was issued in Washington yesterday to George Madden, of that city, and Jane Nelson, of Culpeper.

A little boy named Harry Mander, who lives on the corner of Duke and Lee streets, while walking on stilts, yesterday evening, fell and broke his arm.

The report in circulation on the street to-day that the knights of labor at a meeting last night had nominated a full municipal ticket to be voted for at the May election, was denied by an officer of the lodge.

Mr. E. S. Corsa, of this city, is now engaged in making a model of a yacht, which is to be one hundred feet long, and which will be built in this city by the Norton company.

It is understood that Mayor Smoot will call a special meeting of the City Council, on Tuesday night next, to petition the Legislature to amend the city charter in regard to the paving of streets, etc.

As the weather becomes warmer the applications for assistance at the office of the Overseer of the Outdoor Poor become fewer. The office ceases to exist after the 1st of April till the 1st of October next.

It is understood that there are now full hands on six fishing shores on the river, and others are nearly ready to begin operations. The system of using steam to haul seines has much diminished the number of hands employed on the shores.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

NEW YORK, March 26.—The stock market was fairly active but inclined to weakness at the opening this morning, first prices showing insignificant changes only from last evening's final prices. The market was quiet to dull, and prices were somewhat irregular, with very little movement in either direction. The general list showed little or no change, and at 11 o'clock the market was quiet and steady at prices not materially different from those of the opening. Money easy at 3/4.

NEW YORK, Mar. 26.—The weekly bank statement shows the following changes: Reserve, decrease, \$1,148,500; loans, decrease, \$3,408,500; specie, decrease, \$2,249,900; legal tenders, increase, \$240,800; deposits, decrease, \$7,442,400; circulation, decrease, \$11,100. The banks now hold \$6,186,850 in excess of the 25 per cent. rate.

Produce is without quotable change, but is easy, with a tendency to lower figures.
