### Decadence of the Strike.

The great labor agitation has produced a  
stop of strikes. Generally, they have been  
failures. Why? Simply because they were  
not well grounded. Thousands of men have  
left work because a few demanded better  
wages. Whole trades have abandoned their  
benches at the dictation of men whom they  
never saw nor heard of. Employers who  
have had naught but the pleasantest rela-  
tions with their workmen have suddenly  
found themselves waited upon by outsiders  
with demands which they could not grant,  
and for which their men have never asked.

Refusing, the latter have struck, saying  
while they did so that they preferred to re-  
main, but must obey orders from some irre-  
sponsible source. Offers of arbitration and  
settlement are refused. Workmen are denied  
permission to adjust their differences  
directly with those who employ them, but  
outside parties, with no stake and no inter-  
est in the matter except self-interest and  
self-glorification, claim the right to absolute-  
ly control the workmen. All this is outside  
of the outrages, the boycotting, and the  
rioting which unfortunately have accompa-  
nied some recent strikes. But these latter  
are violations of law, to be punished  
as such, and have nothing to do with the  
strike question considered by itself. Now,  
the result of such a system must be failure,  
unless practically all the mechanics and  
workmen could be gathered into the  
labor organizations and induced to promise  
to obey the orders given them by such  
thoroughly unreliable and in many cases  
dishonest men as manage strikes. More  
than this, they must be made to swear to  
refrain from working, even though they  
want to work, so long as ordered, no mat-  
ter if they have no grievance; they must  
swear to sit in idleness while wife and child-  
ren are starving, and promised aid from  
"relief funds" is not forthcoming. The  
workman of this country must throw  
away his independence, become a soldier  
under strict discipline, work or not work,  
and all for what? To give to men  
not so intelligent as himself, with  
nothing at stake save the salary he  
pays them, the arbitrary disposal of  
his right to work. To alienate himself from  
the men whose interests are identical with  
his, and practically to make himself a con-  
tract laborer, the contract to be made not  
by himself, but by another. This is what the  
success of the strike movement under the  
"walking delegate" system would mean.

No wonder that every trial renders its ab-  
solute failure more conspicuous. No wonder  
that the laboring men are tired of this resort  
to the arbitrament of force, where they have  
all the suffering in case of defeat, and very  
little reward for victory. A strike is mani-  
festly unsuccessful. Everybody knows it;  
the strikers know it. Other men take their  
places. Things go on. They wait patiently  
for the promised victory; wait patiently,  
and then, deceived and betrayed, they rise  
and vote the strike off. But this is too late  
for them. The "walking delegate" has  
flown. They remain to shift for themselves  
in South Boston, and ask for work. But they  
cannot expect to be hired again if other men  
can be found who are loyal first to their own  
interests and then to their employers. Broth-  
erly love and co-operation are not built  
up in this country the past year have paid  
their tribute of endurance at the shrine of the  
"walking delegate." They had best  
now begin to look out for themselves. The  
net result so far has not been satisfactory.  
Employers are not being intimidated, and  
the strikes do not accomplish what arbitra-  
tion could easily have effected. Worse than  
that, various important industries for self-  
protection are planning how to avoid the  
localities where strikes abound. The strike  
as at present conducted is a two edged  
sword. It breaks down all sense of amity  
and harmony between employers and em-  
ployees.—Boston Advertiser.

**BREAD RIOT.**—Five hundred and nine  
teen of the Italian passengers of the wrecked  
steamer Scotia arrived on the sea barge  
Haggerty at Castle Garden, New York, late  
Saturday afternoon. The scene that follow-  
ed beggared description. They rushed into  
the rotunda pell-mell, shrieking and howl-  
ing for food like ravenous wolves. They  
crowded around the lunch tables, climbing  
over each other and trampling on the  
helpless women and children. Pandemonium  
reigned supreme for fully an hour. It is  
customary to register all immigrants before  
they enter the rotunda, but the red tape  
was broken on this occasion by Super-  
intendent Jackson. The force of the mass  
of people was so great that the officers who  
were stationed to keep order were swept  
aside like straws. The seething mass could  
not be restrained. Mr. Jackson gave orders  
to give them all the food they needed, and  
charge it to the commissioners of emigra-  
tion. Then the distribution of food began.  
The strong men crowded to the front  
with uplifted arms and their eyes starting  
from their sockets, crying in Italian "Bread!  
bread!" The surging mob was utterly un-  
controllable; women and children were  
trampled on, crowded and pushed away.  
The officers of the garden aided in the dis-  
tribution by throwing the loaves over the  
heads of the nearest to the outskirts of the  
crowd. Every time a loaf was fired into  
the crowd, twenty or more scrambled, and  
in some cases, fought to get it. That dry

bread was a luxury, was evident from the  
way the starving people gorged themselves.  
In a short time all the food was gone except  
some Bologna sausage. The women and  
children were cared for, and milk and bread  
added to their portion. Outside the railing  
were 642 passengers from the Etruria, 852  
from the Waesland and 660 from the La  
Bretagne. Nearly 3,000 people were in the  
rotunda. The babel of tongues was fright-  
ful, as the people were of all nationalities.
