FISH.—Since yesterday's report about 150,000 herring and 1,500 shad have been received at Fishtown. Herring sold at from \$3.50 to \$4.50 per thousand; shad at from \$12 to \$15 per hundred.

The Richmond train was delayed in its arrival here to day, on account of late Southern connections.

The Corporation Court so far this session has granted forty-three licenses to persons in this city to sell liquor.

The W. & O. railroad is soon to build a new passenger depot in Leesburg. The new building will be erected at the foot of King street, in that town.

Mr. Henry Englehart, of West End, brought to this city this morning and left at the residence of Mr. F. Schwab a hen's egg which weighed one-quarter of a pound.

Commencing with yesterday an additional mail was put on between Baltimore and Richmond. It goes by the Virginia Midland and Chesapeake and Ohio roads, lying over at Gordonsville for the connecting train.

The republicans of Jefferson district in the county, will hold a meeting to-night for the purpose of selecting delegates to the convention to be held hereafter to nominate county officers.

A little white boy fell overboard from Lannon's wharf this evening and narrowly escaped drowning.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

New York, April 21.—11 a. m.—The opening of the stock market this morning was firm to strong, first prices showing advances over last evening's final figures of from 1/8 to 1/4 per cent. There was a good and well distributed business in most of the list. The market was at first heavy, and a general fielding of values over the entire list took place. The losses were generally for insignificant fractions. Late in the hour a firmer tone prevailed and slight gains over the lowest prices were made, the market becoming quiet though. Money easy at 5 1/4.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, April 21, 1887.—There is a more liberal offering of Flour, but prices are without material change. We again note a constant, not to say active, demand for perfectly sound flinty grades of milling Wheat, and figures for such lots are well sustained, but ordinary and damaged samples are tame and sluggish and sell as to condition; hence the wide range in quotations, sales being made from 60 to 95c per bushel. Corn, Rye and Oats are firm. Produce is in light receipt and good demand.
