HORRIBLE DEATH.—Samuel Thomas, colored, of Washington, about forty years of age, a fireman on the steamer T. V. Arrow, met with a horrible death to-day while at work on that boat. Just before leaving Washington on the half-past one o'clock trip this afternoon, Thomas proceeded to the hurricane deck for the purpose of oiling the walking beam. Previous to starting, the engineer notified Thomas of the facts, and waited until he was seen to descend before he turned on steam. Subsequently the furnace door in charge of the deceased was found open and he missing, when a search was instituted, resulting in the discovery of the unfortunate man badly mutilated in the aperture under the crank pin, into which it is thought he fell in the course of his descent from the deck. Thomas had a chronic case of heart disease, and is supposed to have been attacked by vertigo while descending to the hold. His body was taken to Mr. B. Wheatley's undertaker's establishment, where an inquest will be held.

RED MEN.—The Grand Council of Red Men of Virginia resumed its session in this city this morning. The reports of the various committees were read and adopted. The committee on judiciary and state of the order made some important decisions of interest to the order. A charter was granted to White Cloud Tribe, No. 61, of Pocahontas. At 11 o'clock the Grand Council went into secret session for the exemplification of the unwritten work of the order, which was conducted by P. G. S. E. M. Solomon, of Norfolk, and P. G. S. H. L. Carter, of Richmond, after which the Grand Council resumed its session. An invitation was accepted to visit Occochee Tribe, No. 1, of this city, to-night, and afterwards to attend a banquet at the Opera House restaurant tendered the Grand Council by that tribe. At this evening's session the time will be occupied in the election of the Grand Chiefs of the Grand Council. Among the arrivals of delegates to-day were C. E. Lamb, of Portsmouth; W. P. Rochiecharlie, of Lynchburg, and W. E. Grange, of Richmond.

PERSONAL.—Mr. Leonard Marbury has gone to Shenandoah county to sell the property of the Powell's Fort Mining Co., situated in that county.

Mr. J. A. E. Moroney, of Michigan, who recently leased the Tontine hotel, in this city, arrived here to-day, and expects to reopen that well known hotel in a few days.

Mrs. S. Leterman, of Charlottesville, is visiting Mrs. Henry Strauss.

Rev. I. M. Mercer and Mr. Jonas Fisher, who left here on the 31st instant to attend the annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention, in Louisville, Ky., returned to this city yesterday evening. They report the attendance on the convention as quite large, and that the whole meeting was intensely interesting and profitable.

Col. R. H. Dulaney, who returned from Europe on Saturday, was in the city to-day.

DEATH OF A YOUNG LAWYER.—Fendall Marbury, jr., a son of Mr. Fendall Marbury, of Prince George's county, Md., died at his residence, in Baltimore, yesterday, in the 27th year of his age. He was a graduate of the Maryland University Law School, of the class of 1884. Since his admission to the bar he had been a resident of Baltimore. About a month or more ago his eyesight began to fail, and after unsuccessful treatment in Baltimore he went to Philadelphia, and was treated by an eminent oculist there. The Philadelphia physician said the trouble was due to an affection of the brain, and was likely to result fatally, which opinion subsequent events proved to be well founded. Mr. Marbury leaves a wife and many friends in this city.

COUNTY REPUBLICANS.—The republican convention to nominate candidates for county offices met in Johnson's Hall, in the county, last night. There was the usual wrangling, but finally a ticket was decided upon as follows: For treasurer, W. C. Wirt; sheriff, J. D. Payne, and commissioner of revenue, Willis Wormley. H. L. Holmes, the present commissioner of revenue, withdrew his name from the contest and announced that he would be an independent candidate. J. E. Clements, for Common wealth's attorney, and R. W. Johnston, for clerk of the court were endorsed by the convention. The principal contest was between Birch and Payne for sheriff, but the latter won by 10 to 5.

CALISTRINE DRILL.—The annual drill of Mrs. Little's calistrine class took place at Landon's Opera House last night, to the great delight of the large audience present. The difficult movements of the marches, led by Miss Daisy Washington, were executed in a most agreeable manner, eliciting much credit upon both teacher and pupils. The postures and posing, led by Miss Florence Wirt, were particularly well given, that young lady executing every gesture in the most graceful and easy manner, and were decidedly the most interesting feature of the entertainment.

WORK PROGRESSING.—The work of taking down the spans of the old Aqueduct bridge and removing the material to the property yard in Georgetown, has been in progress for some time. The contractor, however, needing the use of that portion of the bridge near the Virginia shore, has obtained the permission of the District authorities to leave that section unclaimed until the new bridge is so well under way that these spans are no longer needed, and then they will be taken down and turned over to the District. An order to this effect was made to-day.

IT MAKES NO DIFFERENCE.—The Winchester Times after opposing the passage by the Legislature of the Mineral railway bill now, that it has passed, says, "It seems improbable that the road will ever be built, as it will be obliged to cross almost at right angles a network of mountain ranges, and even if it is built it is difficult to see how it can injure Winchester very materially."

FISH.—Since yesterday's report about 40,000 herring and 500 shad have been received at Ft. Howard. Herring sold from \$3 to \$5 per thousand and shad at from \$8 to \$12 per hundred. Some of the fishermen say that when the current in the river subsides the catch of fish will increase again.

REHEARSAL.—The Alexandria Musical Association will give their last public rehearsal to-morrow night. Owing to the limited seating capacity of the hall tickets admitting one person only have been issued, and no one will be admitted without a ticket.

Legislative.

The Senate spent yesterday considering a bill with reference to working convicts on railroads.

The majority of the bills passed by the House on Tuesday and communicated to the Senate in the usual morning message were twice read and placed on the calendar.

Mr. Berry, from the committee on general laws, reported the petition of "colored citizens" of the State asking the passage of a civil rights bill, with the following endorsement: "The committee report that the bill asked for by said petition is not passed, and that it is inexpedient to legislate on the subject."

The Senate, by a vote of 16 to 11, refused to take up the bill requiring the railroad companies chartered by the State to have their general offices in the State.

The bill in relation to the jurisdiction of justices, the object of which is to place small claims on the same footing with large ones, in that the defendants may take them up to the Circuit Court, was ordered to be engrossed.

In the House of Delegates in response to a resolution asking for the amount of costs and attorneys' fees paid in defending coupon cases that have been settled, the Auditor sent in a long itemized account which, added up, gave the costs as \$8,761 05; attorneys' fees, \$7,800.

The joint resolution to destroy the plates and bonds of the Kendall Bank-Note Company was adopted.

A bill was passed "That if any officer of this State receive (except for verification and identification) any paper or instrument purporting to be a coupon detached from a bond of this State, for any taxes, debt, dues, or demands due the State until the same shall have been verified in the mode prescribed by law, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined for each offence not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000."

UNION VETERANS AT FREDERICKSBURG.—The surviving veterans of the Sixth Army Corps, who are to participate in the ceremonies connected with the unveiling and dedication of the Sedgwick memorial tablet near Spotsylvania Courthouse to-day, reached Fredericksburg yesterday, and were met at the railway station by the Fredericksburg Grays and a delegation of citizens, and escorted to their headquarters. In the evening there was a "camp fire" in the court-house. There was a large attendance of citizens, including ladies. A letter was read from Governor Lee expressing regret that his public duties would prevent him from attending the dedication. Comrade W. J. Wray delivered an address, which was followed by music, recitations and speeches from Governor Ormsby, of Vermont; Rev. J. P. Smith, of Fredericksburg, formerly of Stonewall Jackson's staff; Adjutant General Stricker, representing the Governor of New Jersey, and others.

The visitors were warmly welcomed by the people of Fredericksburg, and especially by the ex-Confederates.

The veterans went to Spotsylvania Courthouse to-day. Friday after breakfast, they will leave Fredericksburg for Washington.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL. NEW YORK, May 12.—The stock market opened active and strong, first prices ranging from 1/2 to 3/4 above last evening's final figures. The market was barely firm, however, for most of the active stocks, little improvement being made in prices. There was a slight reaction toward the end of the hour, accompanied by a decrease in activity, but later the firm tone was again resumed, and at 11 o'clock the market was moderately active and firm. The business done was well distributed. Money easy at 4 1/2.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, May 12.—Flour continues steady and firm, with a fair demand from the jobbing traders at current figures.
