POPULAR ERRORS .- Archbishop Corrigan made his canonical visitation to the Church of the Sacred Heart, New York, Sunday morning. Low mass was celebrated, at the conclusion of which the Archbishop spoke on the popular errors, which, he said, were widely prevalent at the present time. The first of these was the idea that private ownership of land was unjust. This idea the Archbishop characterized as a fallacy against both philosophy and common sense, and as against the teachings of the Catholic Church. Those who claimed that land, like supplying and air was the free gift, of God. sunshine and air, was the free gift of God, and equally the property of all, overlooked and equally the property of all, overlooked the great difference that sun and air cannot become private property as can land. He declared that every man had a right to ac-quire, by honest means, as much property as he could, and cited the Indians as an ex-ample of the disastrous results of the freeland policy. He also said that the idea was in direct opposition to a decree of the Pope, and that those who favored it knew that they were infringing on the ordinance of God. The second error which the Archbishop wished to combat was that the Pope had the right to command and be obeyed only in matters of faith and morals, and when speaking as infallible, but not in matters of discipline. This idea had been decreed faise by the Vatican Conneil, who had ordered that 'if any one should say that the Pope had a right to command in matters of God. The second error which the Arch-Pope had a right to command in matters of for had a right to command in maters of faith and morals, but not in discipline, let him be anathema." The Pope, however, does not interfere in matters of politics unless the government interferes in matters of conscience, and he has warned all bishops and archbishops that they must be obedient to the government under which they are.
