O'Brien in Toronto.

Editor O'Brien arrived in Toronto at exactly 11 o'clock yesterday morning.

The train was boarded about fifty miles down the road by a party of newspaper men, who presented him with copies of the morning papers in which it was predicted a riot would follow his arrival.

All along the line of the road immense crowds had congregated, who peered into the cars and scowlingly pointed out the famous editor. As the train rolled into the depot President Mulligan, of the National League, who is a law partner of Sir John Macdonald, premier of the Dominion, rushed into the car and grasped O'Brien by the hand. The platform was crowded, and as O'Brien was recognized he was greeted with a roar of cheers, which rose higher and higher in volume. A few slight coos and almost inaudible hisses were mingled with the cheers. It was remarked upon very much, this cooing. Slight hisses have been heard now and again, but no hooting. Mr. O'Brien was impressed with how very much it resembled the oracular performances of the Sandy Row Orangemen in Belfast. "They have imported the custom," said he, "and have improved upon it, which, God knows, is not saying much." It did not seem to trouble him a bit, however, and he passed into a carriage with members of the committee, amid files of policemen on foot and mounted, under command of Inspector Ward. The horses pranced about, and kept scattering the crowd and the uniformed men with spiked helmets, who were each supplied with several rounds of ball cartridge, and from under whose belts the polished barrels of gleaming six-shooters peeped out in ominous readiness. But there had been no need for them so far. The Rossin House is only a few blocks away, and as the party drove there the crowd increased and the enthusiasm grew greater. The spacious rotunda of the hotel was one mass of humanity, and away out into King and York streets and all around could be seen a desecrated occupying every available inch of space. To reach his room was impossible; to register was impossible, so Mr. O'Brien was hoisted on the shoulders to the broad staircase, and there, amid intense excitement, was presented with an address by D. P. Cahill, secretary of the local branch of the National League. During Mr. O'Brien's reply there were frequent attempts at interruption by several of the crowd cooing, but, as before, the overwhelming majority were O'Brienites, and their cheers sounded like a chorus.

The address warmly welcomed O'Brien to Toronto, and extended on behalf of the Irish nationalists a sincere wish that his undertaking would be a success. It assured him that all liberal minded men sympathized with his mission. The address also referred to O'Brien's gallant and vigorous defense of the Irish in all their struggles.

Mr. O'Brien responded, thanking the Irish nationalists for their address of welcome. He wanted only fair play in Canada, and he was sure it would be accorded him.

O'Brien and friends reached Queen's Park at 4:30 o'clock, but the meeting did not begin until about 5. There were about 12,000 people on the ground, and the excitement at times was intense. The entire police force was on the ground, and at a convenient distance troops were held in readiness to suppress any outbreak. In and out of the vast crowd rode mounted police seeking by the effect of their presence to keep in check the excitement which at times threatened to burst its bound and end in trouble. When O'Brien began speaking the opposing crowd started up "God Save the Queen" and the national anthem was repeated again and again from the throats of at least three-fourths present. Not a sound could be heard from the speaker's stand at ten paces distant so great was the tumult. O'Brien continued speaking, however, though his remarks were inaudible. A few small collisions occurred followed by prompt arrests. An appeal by O'Brien to the crowd to avoid any disturbance was followed by hand to hand fights, but the police soon restored order. The crowd now and then varied the national anthem by cheers for Lansdowne, "Rule Britannia," &c., followed by deafening cheers. Even those on the platform failed to catch Mr. O'Brien's words. In his speech he said: "I am not at all sorry that the gentlemen of the Toronto corporation have broken their contract as Lord Lansdowne broke his, and have refused us the hospitality of St. Andrew's Hall. There is one hall, thank God, from which they cannot shut us out—this open vault of heaven, which the great Architect of the universe has built, and we have a tale to tell which we need not be afraid or ashamed to tell in the free air of heaven and the open light of day. One thing is now, I think, certain, and that is that the Canadians demand an answer to the specific and terrible accusations we have made against him. An answer there must be, or Lord Lansdowne stands condemned; an answer very different from the vague platitudes with which he fills his letter in the Toronto papers to-day." He thought the refusal of a public hall or boycotting was not an answer, and believed Lord Lansdowne fully realized that the ironings of the orators at Saturday's meeting were not answers to the charges. He referred to the attack on Rev. Mr. Kane, and with pleasure alluded to the refusal of the Canadian Parliament to pass resolutions of confidence in Salisbury's government, and the alacrity with which resolutions denouncing home rule were adopted.

The opponents of home rule in Canada were in the minority.

He treated with contempt Goldwin Smith's allusion to him. He was willing to be judged by his countrymen, and thought the news from northeast Cork showed how he was regarded in his own country. The question now was whether Lord Lansdowne was carrying out a most cruel and inhuman system of eviction in Ireland rather than yield concessions which were recommended by arbitration authorized by his own agent. Until that question is answered his cause will be damned by displays of physical and intellectual rascality. He blamed the London Times and Telegraph for inciting to violence, and if the public peace had been disturbed while he was speaking they would have been responsible for it. The remainder of his address was an exposure of Lansdowne's cruelty in evicting his tenants, and a denunciation of the coercion bill.

A banquet was tendered him in the evening, and he was accorded an enthusiastic welcome. The Orangemen indulged in an other demonstration. They paraded up and down in front of the hotel cheering and hooting. Mr. O'Brien left for Ottawa to-day, where he will speak at a public meeting to-morrow evening.


