A BRUTAL HUSBAND.—John Kelly, of New York, was discharged from the position which he held in the House of Mercy recently. Then he got drunk and went home frenzied with liquor and assaulted his wife with a chair, breaking it to pieces over her head. Then he made a noise in a clothes-line, placed it around her neck and endeavored to hang her to a strong hook in the wall. When the poor woman was nearly strangled he desisted from his purpose, and after kicking her in the most brutal manner left the house. The wife crawled into bed, where she remained, unable to help herself, until the next morning, when her husband returned. He was furious because she did not get up and get his breakfast, and dragging her out of bed, he gave her another terrible beating and left her more dead than alive. A daughter of Kelly called at the house and found her mother unconscious and apparently in a dying state. She reported the case to the police, and Kelly was arrested drunk on the street and taken into custody. The injured woman was removed to the hospital. Her skull is fractured, several of her ribs are broken, and her body and head are covered with cuts and bruises. The hospital surgeons say that she cannot recover.

HOW SOME BOYS OBSERVED MEMORIAL DAY.—Some boys went into a blacksmith shop last Monday in Marietta, Ohio, to heat a two inch iron pipe filled with water and plugged at each end, hoping by that means to blow the plugs out. The pipe was laid across the fire in the forge, and one of the boys applied himself to the bellows. Chas. Phillips, aged 17, was standing near by. In two or three places the metal was brought to a red heat, when suddenly a terrific explosion occurred. The hammered end of the pipe was driven through the fleshy part of young Phillips's right leg near the groin, and forced its way clear through until it extended out on the other side about three feet. The boy did not faint or flinch, but seized hold of the red hot pipe and withdrew it from the wound, burning the flesh on his hands clear to the bone. He is still alive, but the chances for his recovery are doubtful.
