SALE OF A RAILROAD.—The Alexandria and Washington railroad was sold at public auction at noon to-day in front of the Custom House building, to Col. F. L. Smith, for \$100,000.

The sale was made by M. F. Pleasant, master and commissioner, appointed to make the sale by virtue and under authority of a decree rendered by the Circuit Court of the United States for the Eastern District of Virginia, on the 5th day of April, 1884, in the chancery cause of Alexander Hay vs. The Alexandria and Washington Railroad Company and others, therein depending.

At noon quite a crowd assembled in front of the Customs House, among them being Messrs. J. N. DuBarry and H. H. Carter, of the B. & P. road; H. H. Wells and Randall Hagner, of Washington, and a number of private citizens.

The advertisement of the sale as it was published in the GAZETTE was read by Mr. G. R. Shinn for Messrs. R. T. Lucas & Co., after which Mr. Lucas announced that he was ready to receive bids. Col. Smith bid \$100,000 and after an ineffectual effort by the auctioneer to have the bid raised, the road was knocked down to Col. Smith and his associates, who, it is understood, purchased the property in the interest of the Pennsylvania railroad.

The sale of the road carried with it "All the rights, privileges, franchises and property of the Alexandria and Washington R. R. Company, except the fund now or hereafter to come into the hands of the receiver, and debts due the company. The road consists of a double-track railroad from a point in the county of Alexandria, opposite the city of Washington, near the south end of the Long Bridge, to St. Asaph Junction, two single tracks from St. Asaph Junction into this city, one passing through Henry street to Duke street, and the other through St. Asaph street, Princess street, with side-tracks, turn-outs, &c."

The terms of sale were: "Cash as to the following sums, viz: \$59,510.27, with interest thereon at the rate of six per centum per annum from January 19th, 1882, until paid; \$60,000, with interest thereon at the rate of six per centum per annum from July 1st, 1887, until paid; \$30,000, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from January 22d, 1882, until paid, and with interest upon each of the half-yearly coupons of \$35 each, attached to each of said bonds, and on each running from the 22d day of July, 1882, to the 22d day of July, 1877, both inclusive, until paid; \$79,415.92, with interest on \$30,696.29, part thereof, from September 15th, 1883, till paid, and \$22,758.62, with interest on \$9,511.18, part thereof, from September 15th, 1883, till paid, and as to the residue of the purchase money upon a credit of one, two and three years, with interest from the day of sale, evidenced by negotiable notes, the title being retained under the control of the court until full compliance has been made with the terms of sale and until all the money is paid, and subject to resale in case of default."

As the property did not bring enough to satisfy all the debts due by the company, it is understood that the claims will be paid according to their priority, and that six-ninths will be applied to the payment of the \$59,510.27, and the thirteen-ninths to the payment of the \$60,000, which will more than take the entire sum of the purchase money. After the property had been struck off a deposit of \$50,000 was made by Col. Smith and his associates in the First National Bank. According to the terms of the sale the purchaser is not to be let into the possession of the property until after the final ratification of sale, and the future order of the court to that effect.

SCHOONER RACE.—The fast-sailing schooners Henry S. Culver, (built at this city) Annie J. Pardee, W. L. Roberts and Charles L. Mitchell, all heavy-tonnage vessels laden with ice, took their departure at the same time from the Kennebec river, Maine, three destined for Washington and one for this port, and there being considerable rivalry among the four captains as to the sailing merits of their respective vessels, a race to see which one should arrive first resulted as follows: The W. L. Roberts (Captain Bray) and Charles L. Mitchell (Captain Frost) arrived within a few hours of each other. The Henry S. Culver and the Annie J. Pardee reached Washington from 36 to 48 hours later. It was merely a matter of speed and excellent seamanship that the first two schooners came into port ahead of their competitors in this grand trial of speed. The Mitchell arrived here on Thursday and completed discharging her cargo of ice to-day.

CORPORATION COURT.—Judge N. B. Meade presiding.—Judge Meade, who, with his family, is spending the summer at Marshall, Fauquier county, has returned, and will hold the July term of the Corporation Court, commencing on Monday next. This is a grand jury term, at which John C. Ryan will

indicted for being implicated in the killing of officer Arnold, and the four Kidwells and Barrett for the killing of George Wertebaker, but it is more than probable that neither of these cases will be tried at this term of the court. It is probable that when the court adjourns it will be till the September term, as the August term is usually omitted in order to allow all connected with the court a vacation.

PORT MYER.—Major Louis H. Carpenter, 5th cavalry, who is to command the new cavalry garrison at Fort Myer, in this county, reported at the War Department yesterday. He will at once assume charge of the post and of such preparations as can now be made for the two companies of cavalry of the 4th and 6th regiments which will compose the garrison. The troops are expected to arrive between the 15th and 20th of July.

Capt. Anderson's company of the 6th cavalry is expected to leave its post in New Mexico on the 9th instant. Capt. Lawton's company of the 4th cavalry was ordered to start east as soon as its services could be spared. As everything is now quiet in the Department of Arizona, it is thought that it will be able to leave about the same time.

The present accommodations at Fort Myer are not sufficient for two companies of cavalry, but necessary improvements will be completed before cold weather. The officers' quarters are large enough, but it will be necessary to build another barracks for the soldiers. Besides one of the large storehouses was transformed into stables for the accommodation of the horses. Major Carpenter thinks that Fort Myer will make a model cavalry post, and everything possible will be done to bring it to a high state of efficiency.

Capt. Henry P. Birmingham, assistant surgeon, has been relieved from duty at Fort Columbus, N. Y., and ordered to duty at Fort Myer as post surgeon.

THE A. M. A. EXCURSION.—For comfort and enjoyment during the heated term nothing can surpass an evening excursion down the river with the accessories of delightful music and pleasant company. An opportunity such as is described will be afforded next Tuesday night, when the Alexandria Musical Association will give their first moonlight excursion to River View.

The winter rehearsals of the Association have been a source of pleasure to their many friends, and now that an opportunity is offered to in some measure return the courtesy extended, it is thought a large number will, by their presence, testify the esteem in which the Association is held.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

The property advertised for sale to-day in the suit of Francis vs. Latham was withdrawn.

Monday will be the last day on which the ten per cent. discount can be saved on city tax bills.

Mr. J. S. Fowler will soon erect a handsome brick dwelling on the east side of Washington street, between Duke and Wolfe.

Col. C. C. Wertebaker, in a card, says that young George Wertebaker, who was killed on Tuesday night last, is not his nephew, but a distant relative.

Messrs. L. R. Houchens & Co. have been given the contract to cover the bridge over Rockfish river, between Charlottesville and Lynchburg. The firm have covered nearly all the new deposits constructed on the Virginia Midland road and a large percentage of the bridges.

A dog supposed to be mad was shot by officer Pettico, on lower Wolfe street, this evening.

SPEED OF OCEAN STEAMERS.—The reduction of the Atlantic record by the Umbria to six days and three hours between Queens-town and New York is inciting the rival lines to redoubled efforts.

The Cunard now holds both first and second place with the Umbria and Etruria, the latter of which has crossed in six days and five hours, the fastest passage on record until surpassed by her sister ship. No boats now in service may be able to equal them, but the St. James Gazette says that "the new North German Lloyd's liner, now building at Fairfield, it is calculated will do much faster voyages to and from Southampton and the German and International companies' boats, two keels of which have just been laid, will bring the record down to five days and a half."

This prediction remains to be verified, but if the Gazette could assure us that the new boats would not attempt to go fast in a fog we would not insist upon their beating the record. Rational people are more anxious to cross the Atlantic safely than to increase the chances of collision.

Charles Herron, aged 18 years and living in Alpena county, Michigan, was cleaning out a well the other day when it caved in, burying him to a depth of twenty-three feet; but he was rescued practically uninjured after remaining in for fourteen hours. Some planking and a chain kept open a slight communication with the outer world, supplying him with barely enough air to sustain life.

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

NEW YORK, July 9.—There was a weak opening at the Stock Exchange this morning, declines from last evening's final prices extending to 3/4 per cent. The market was dull, with a generally heavy tone, though fluctuations were narrow and unimportant in the general list.

There was a better tone in the list late in the hour, and at 11 o'clock the market was steady to firm, though extremely dull. Money easy at 4 1/4%.

NEW YORK, July 9.—The weekly bank statement shows the following changes: Reserve, increase, \$2,701,375; Loans, decrease, 3,379,900; Specie, increase, 4,241,999; Legal tenders, decrease, 1,059,100; Deposits, increase, 1,925,700; Circulation, decrease, 188,700.

The bank now holds in excess of the 25 per cent. rule, 6,352,450.

BALTIMORE, July 9.—Virginia 6s consolidated with coupon 49; past-due coupons —; 10-40s with coupons 39 1/2; new 3s 63 1/2 bid to-day.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, July 9.—The Flour markets are totally devoid of features of interest; neither millers nor holders of stocks, however, are making much effort to sell except at current figures any but such grades as will not stand the heated term. The wheat markets show but little change; futures continue to fluctuate within very narrow limits and the feeling is unsettled, both sides waiting for something to turn up; we again report a strong demand for prime wheats by both home millers and dealers, and prices for such samples are well sustained, but garlicy, starchy and damaged lots, which form so far the bulk of the receipts, may be noted dull and lower.

Corn, Rye and Oats are steady. Eggs are weak and in good supply. Other produce is easy but unchanged.
