Martyrs.

There is a vast difference between the penalty that comes from wrong-doing and the suffering which is a sacrifice for the sake of principle. The man who is in favor of a community of goods, and is put in the pillory for stealing his neighbor's chickens is not a martyr to his opinions. He may hold and teach his peculiar views from youth to old age, and be wholly unmolested; but the overt act of appropriating the property of another is an offense which society is very prompt to punish. Not his cherished opinions, but his open breach of the law has brought him to grief.

Willful men who set aside all restraint to have their own way, and are left to suffer the natural consequences of their obstinacy, are very apt to pose as martyrs, and claim that they are punished for an honest adherence to their own convictions. They will insist vehemently upon the right of every man to think for himself, and when their thoughts take concrete shape, and the overt action infringing upon the rights of another meets its proper penalty, will howl their lament that a man in a free country must suffer for opinion's sake.

We know a loud mouthed defender of the statement that all the days of the week were alike, who suffered, not because he clung tenaciously to this view, but because he was not at all tolerant of the views of the great majority who disagreed with him. The latter, believing in a Sunday rest, had passed a law forbidding any open disturbance of the public quiet during the hours they held sacred. This man, bidding defiance to the law, made as much noise as possible on the first day of the week, as his protest against its sanctity. He was arrested and punished, and thereafter issued a pamphlet setting forth his fellowship with those who, in the old-time, were burned at the stake for their religious opinions. But he was not punished for his opinions. He might have been ever so true to them and still not disturbed the peace of the village. There was nothing in his opinions that required him to plow a field opposite the village church while the majority of the people were assembled for worship. It would not have called for any sacrifice of his convictions to have paid a little respect to the cherished views of others and to have refrained from annoying them while clinging to his own belief.

A young man of considerable talent studied for the ministry and was ordained as a pastor over a Presbyterian Church. He soon began to develop great laxity of doctrine, and finally came to deny the divinity of Christ and the belief in future rewards and punishments. He was cited to appear before the Presbytery, but declined, saying that he was entitled to his own opinions and was in no way responsible for them to an ecclesiastical court. After repeated warnings and citations he was deposed from the ministry and debarred from the pulpits of that denomination. He and his followers made the welkin ring with the charge that he had suffered from religious persecution, and accused the ecclesiastical court with trying to put fetters on a freeman's spiritual life. The truth was that the church to which he had solemnly vowed his allegiance simply held that while joined to that body he must not repudiate its system of theology. Ordinary decency would have required him to resign his pastorate and retire from the organization whose doctrines he so bitterly opposed before he publicly proclaimed his views.

The friends Dr. McGlynn are weaving for him the martyr's chaplet because the Papal church has dismissed him from her communion. But no self-respecting body of believers would retain its connection with one who openly defied its authority and refused to submit to its discipline. It makes no difference in the argument whether the deposed priest is right or wrong in his peculiar views. He was not at liberty to disregard the call of his acknowledged superiors on the plea that they wanted to deprive him of his manhood's right to his own free thoughts. He should have answered the citation in person, and submitted his case, as he had pledged himself to do, to the judgment he had promised to respect; or else seceded from the church, and thus proclaimed his right to be free from all ecclesiastical control.

Dr. McGlynn was not excommunicated because of his views on the land question, nor even in consequence of his public utterances on that and kindred themes. But he was expelled from the body to which he had vowed his allegiance because he contumaciously refused to appear before the proper tribunal when duly cited and repeatedly warned of the result of his obstinacy. A man is entitled to his own opinions, but he has no right to claim membership in an organization while he refuses to submit to its well-known rules. To expel him for violating such rules is not to persecute him for his opinions, but to punish him for gross disrespect to statutes he has promised to obey.—N. Y. Journal of Commerce.
